Indian Act 1876 or citizens aren't indian

superseding the Gradual Civilization Act and Gradual Enfranchisement Act the post-confederation Indian Act introduced status

intended as transition
less than citizenship
denied the franchise
land ownership constitutional rights
but granted
reserve lands and treaty entitlements
government obligations that would
disappear with enfranchisement
because citizens aren't indian

our Act defined you two ways:

Indian: first any male of Indian blood reputed

to belong to a particular band second any child of such

third any woman now or formerly

legally married to such any illegitimate child may at any time be excluded membership by the band

any Indian having five years abroad

shall cease to be a member thereof or of any other band any Indian woman marrying out

ceases to be an Indian

if she marry into another band she belongs to his band alone no half breed in Manitoba shall be accounted an Indian

non-treaty Indian: any person of Indian blood belonging to an irregular band or following the Indian mode of life even if a temporary resident in Canada

but our Act defined us simply

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person: an individual other than an Indian

Indian Agents swept aside traditional governance to save your souls oversaw the diminution of people forced enfranchisement and revoked status for any Indian man or married woman the full age of twenty-one who from the degree of civilization attained character for integrity morality and sobriety appears qualified to become a proprietor of land may be granted a location ticket as a probationary Indian for the land allotted by the band and becomes enfranchised

any Indian admitted to any degree by any university or to practice law or enters holy orders becomes enfranchised

but citizens aren't Indian
so for land and vote
we required you to
declare the name and surname by which
he or she wishes to be enfranchised
and thereafter known
erasing hereditary and spirit names
clan and tribal connections
the languages that described this land
before us

disenfranchised from the land we sought as settlers lost in a history selected we are the colonized to reconcile this ledger we must still account and comprehend partly repealed but not erased these laws stain our history as the red of our debt still colours the present
