


Friday, May 31 at 7:00 pm Knights of Columbus Hall Gala Dinner **Anthony Wilson-Smith** President and CEO Historica Canada

Anthony has been in his present position since joining the organization in 2012. Prior to that, he had a long career in journalism, serving as a national and foreign correspondent and then Editor-in-Chief of Macleans Magazine. After

leaving journalism, he held senior executive roles at a major federal Crown Corporation and one of Canada's largest financial institutions. A Montreal native, Anthony has worked in more than 35 countries abroad as well as all of Canada's provinces and territories, and appeared as a political and social commentator on national and international media on networks including CBC, CTV, Global Television, Radio-Canada, Great Britain's BBC and ITV, and C-SPAN and ABC television news in the United States, along with the Moscow News in Russia. He has been honored for his work in the mental health sector and for encouraging diversity, and in 2018 was awarded The Sovereign's Medal For Community Service.

Saturday June 1 9am Session Lime Burning in Ontario -Characteristics and Cultural Value Christopher Andreae Historica Research

Ontario's lime burning industry, dating from c1830 to c1930, is scattered across much of southern Ontario. Public awareness of its

cultural value ranges from oblivious to curious. The industry was located primarily in rural areas and generally did not leave adverse environmental impacts on the countryside - unlike many other industrial activities. Heritage planning issues

associated with lime burning are applicable to most other "old" provincial industrial sites.

Christopher Andreae has more than 40 years of professional experience in historical archaeology, built heritage assessments and cultural heritage landscape studies. He has worked on a wide variety of projects including domestic commercial and industrial buildings, road and railway bridges and other historic transportation infrastructure. He is a founding member of Canadian Association of Heritage Professionals, a former president and currently a director.


Friday, May 31 at 10:45 When Disaster Strikes

Disaster Strikes: Lessons Learned from Post-Tornado Goderich Communities across Ontario have faced disasters in their heritage downtowns whether it be fire, floods or other. In August of 2011, the Town of Goderich was tasked with responding to the greatest disaster ever to impact a heritage conservation district in Canada, an F3 tornado which devastated many parts of the town, including the historic Square. So what was learned? This session will focus specifically on the impacts on the Square, the challenges and opportunities encountered, and the lessons learned through the rebuilding process and in the years since. Hear from: Town Chief Administrative Officer, Larry McCabe; local architect and affected landowner, Allan Avis; local insurance broker and affected landowner, Wayne Lyons; and County Planner, Denise Van Amersfoort.

Saturday, June 1 1:45pm session - A Farm Fresh Take on Rural Tourism

Hear about three projects that are re-positioning agriculture and rural heritage into new tourism products. The Ontario Barn Quilts Trail (barnquilttrails,ca) draws attention to Canada's disappearing rural landscapes, timber frame barns, and the family farm. These eye-catching folk art works attract visitors and helps rural communities put themselves on the map. The Bruce-Huron Produce Auction is a seasonal food hub owned and operated by members of an Old Order Mennonite community. Their goal is to increase family farm revenue by working together to offer their produce in wholesale lots to attract retailers, restauranteurs and wholesalers. Learn how this aggregation and distribution of locally produced product feeds an authentic value chain, so important to culinary tourism. Taste of Huron (tasteofhuron.com) is a brand that identifies local food products and fresh and delicious food & beverage experiences in Huron County. Recently revitalized—Taste of Huron is the long time Huron County culinary tourism brand and its value is recognized by local producers and consumers alike.
