

- Many projects outlined later or in provided info


Nature Canada Certification Aim

Nature Canada has developed a certification standard to certify eligible cities as a "Bird Friendly City", to recognize and celebrate the contributions they have made to save bird lives in their municipalities. The goal of certification is to provide local partners with a clear standard that reflects what a city needs to do to make it safe for birds. Certification is a badge of honor and a source of community pride. It tells the world that your city or town does things to help birds and reverse their declines in your own backyard. We are looking towards World Migratory Bird Day 2022 as a timeline to certify at least thirty eligible Canadian cities as a Bird Friendly City.

Reasons for the City of Barrie to Achieve Bird Friendly Certification



- The City of Barrie will be promoted across Canada on the Nature Canada Website as a Bird Friendly City
- Ecotourism-bird watching a booming activity during pandemic. Quiet, clean, non-destructive.
 People travel, stay near birding sites

Certified Cities in Ontario include: London, Toronto, Burlington, and Hamilton

Pending Certified Cities include: Windsor, Peterborough, Guelph, and

Orillia

The City of Barrie already qualifies for at least entry-level (as long as 3 mandatory criteria are met by the City of Barrie)

Initiatives that help birds help people:

- Birds
 - Insect control help prevent disease in humans, pets, and livestock
 - Insect control preventing crop damage
 - Pollination of Crops
- Trees and Native Plants
 - Healthy ecosystems
 - Combat climate change
 - Filter air and water
 - Prevent extreme weather disasters
 - Soil retention for crops, lower irrigation needs
 - Help fishing and other recreation activities
 - More efficient than manmade water filtration systems
 - Totally organic non polluting
 - Source for most medicines



Why the City of Barrie Qualifies for Certification

Threat Reduction Measures Taken by the City of Barrie

- Controlled Cats Roaming at Large
 - Animal Control By-Laws
- Reduced Disturbance of Birds from Pets
 - Leash By-Law
 - Chain link fences between residential and natural areas
- Reduced Window Collisions
 - New urban design guidelines including bird-friendly designs
 - Anti-strike measures on new buildings
- Reduced Light Pollution
 - Illumination study aspect in planning and development that included compliance with Dark Sky Policies
- Reduced Pesticide Use
 - Barrie is a Bee City due to Pesticide Reduction Policy
- Reduced Plastic Waste
 - Single use plastics ban
 - Rethink waste on City of Barrie Educational Page
- Reduced Vehicle Collisions by Reducing Vehicles Near Important Bird Habitat Areas
 - Public transit to the Waterfront
 - Increased active transport routes (biking lanes and walking trails on the Waterfront)





Habitat Protection, Restoration and Climate Resiliency

- Natural Areas Protected
 - Plans to increase (separate from recreational area)
- Removal of Invasive Species
 - Invasive phragmites removal by RVH, NVCA, Nature Barrie Phragbusters, Georgian College and City of Barrie, at RVH, Georgian College, and E end Northshore Trail
- City Climate Change Adaptation Strategy and Implementation Plan
- Naturalization in Parks and Natural Areas
 - Increase urban tree canopy
- Plant Native Flora on Municipal Lands
 - Boulevard Gardens
 - Communities in Bloom

Habitat Protection, Restoration and Climate Resiliency

- Improve Breeding or Stopover Habitat
 - City of Barrie Adopt-A-Park or Trail Program
 - Rotary Islands: promote fish habitat and a protected area of shallow water for dabbling ducks
 - Gables Park: A designated Natural Urban Park. Improvement to Kempenfelt Bay shoreline to prevent erosion. By City of Barrie and Nature Barrie
 - Minesing Wetlands by NVCA
 - Tiny Marsh Important Bird Area MTM, Ducks Unlimited

Boxes are located near farm crops, back to prevailing winds, small entrance holes on a greased support pole to deter predators (cats, racoons, squirrels)

Currently 80 boxes surrounding Barrie

Tree swallows love our nest boxes and are our most prolific nesters.

Boxes are also homes for House wrens and Chickadees

Chimney Swifts

- Threatened in Ontario, Endangered in other provinces, example Nova Scotia
- Threatened defined as will become Endangered if steps are not taken to address factors threatening it
- These Swifts use chimneys because hollow trees are no longer available in most areas
- Chimneys used for roosting or nesting are protected by law
- Federal law Government of Canada's Migratory Birds Convention Act of 1994
- Provincial law Endangered Species Act
- Eat 1000s of insects every day!

2021 Chimney Swift Survey Statistics & Blitz Counts

- Spring Arrival Date: April 29th
- Departure Date: September 3rd
- 25 chimneys continued to be occupied by swifts
- 81 counts at 5 large roosting chimneys
 - Queen's Spring & Summer Roost
 - Donaleigh's Small Roost
 - BCC Nesting
 - UCHS Nesting
 - Jail Nesting and Fall Roost

I, BARRY WARD, Deputy Mayor of the City of BARRIE,

do hereby proclaim

May 14, 2022

as

World Migratory Bird Day

WHEREAS; The theme for World Migratory Bird Day in 2022 is "Dim the Lights for Birds at Night"; and

WHEREAS; Bird populations are in great decline, and their habitats in peril, it is of paramount importance to reduce the impact of light pollution on migrating birds. Artificial light is increasing by 2% per year

globally and has profound impacts on many species. Migrating birds can suffer disorientation at night, leading to potentially fatal collisions with buildings, disruption of birds' internal clocks and interference with their ability to complete the arduous long-distance journeys that have occurred across our

continent for millennia; and

WHEREAS; Barrie by virtue of its location on the sheltered shores of Kempenfelt Bay, is an important destination

for migratory birds that stop off here to feed and rest; and

WHEREAS; The Barrie Bird Friendly Team, Nature Barrie, and Nature Canada invite you to celebrate, discover, and welcome our returning migrating birds, and address the problems that night-time lighting creates
