Recreational community building, social engagement, mutual support network



Study Background


- Federally funded 6-year study

The Ambassador Program (Intervention)

NIC's Ambassador program takes a relationship-centered, participatory approach to community building which reflected in the following program values:

- Resident-led: Inspiring local seniors to lead change in their own communities.
- Collaborative: Fostering an open, safe environment to address aging in place goals.
- **Strength-Based**: Appreciating that everyone in the community is valuable and has something to offer.
- **Inclusive**: Honoring the diversity of communities and the voices and cultures that have historically been excluded from decision-making.
- Accessible: Accommodating those with language, mobility, hearing and vision impairments, and cognitive issues.






The Ambassador Program

- The program is an **8–9-month process** where a group of 3-5 tenant Ambassadors learn how to bring their community together and offer programs focused on health and wellness needs identified by the building tenants themselves.
- The **Community Connector** supports the Ambassador group members through this process and provides information on local supports and services they can leverage to start programming in their NORC.
- Barrie Housing sites will also have access to a Community Librarian to help connect tenants to library services and programs.
