
Breaking Down Barriers Awareness Program

Innisfil Accessibility Advisory Committee



About the Program

- Created in 2013 to provide hands-on demonstrations relating to barriers people with disabilities face every day.
- The Innisfil Accessibility Advisory Committee Members donate their time, with assistance from public volunteers.
- The only program of this kind in Simcoe County
- Designed for Grade 5 students.
- In the fall of 2023, hosted five in-person demonstrations at Innisfil schools, with nine in 2024.







Purpose of Program

- Creates long-lasting partnerships.
- Raises awareness about different abilities that people may live with daily.
- Helps children learn about barriers and aims to change the stigmas associated with disabilities.
- Reinforces the importance of universal access and inclusion for everyone.





Wheelchair Demonstration

- Activity requires two instructors.
- Ten wheelchairs (extra wheelchairs are on site to accommodate additional students)
- Purpose: to allow students to experience what life would be like using a wheelchair for mobility.
- Students learn to turn, move forward and backward, maneuver a wheelchair through doorways, and access a washroom.

Learning Outcome: Students gain a better understanding of physical access and will be challenged to be more aware of the physical accessibility in their community.





Hearing Demonstration

- Activity requires two instructors.
- One laptop, ten headphones, connection equipment for the laptop, and an electrical outlet.
- Instructors explain how the recordings will play.
- Purpose: to demonstrate hearing loss and potential reasons for hearing impairments.
- Students will hear a recording that provides different sounds that reflect types of hearing impairments and loss.
- After the demonstration, the instructor explains hearing safety and provides examples of different types of hearing loss and suggestions for ways to prevent hearing loss.

Learning Outcome: Students will learn about ear health and hearing disabilities.





Vision Demonstration

- Activity requires two instructors.
- Ten blindfolds, two white canes, and two small orange pylons
- Students are required to wear blindfolds (or have eyes closed) for the entire demonstration.
- Purpose: to demonstrate barriers for blind and low-vision people.
- Instructor assigns a number to each student. Instructor demonstrates the proper use of a white cane and how to locate a pylon approximately 20ft in front of the students.
- Using a white cane, students will walk blindfolded, listening to the instructor's voice and instructions until they locate the orange pylon.
- Students then navigate back to their chairs and hand the cane to the next person, all while wearing blindfolds.
- Instructor assists students using voice prompts to demonstrate challenges without vision.

Learning Outcome: Students will learn how to identify someone who is blind or living with low vision, how to help a blind person who may ask for directions, and how to approach someone who is blind or has low vision.





Interactive/Sensory Demonstration

- Activity requires one or two Instructors.
- Wooden puzzles, ten pairs of gloves and blindfolds
- Simulation goggles to learn about eye conditions and diseases.
- Deaf/Blind calendar kit
- ASL (American Sign Language) learning posters
- Purpose: students learn about eye diseases and prevention, how to adapt if you lose one of your six senses, and how to communicate using ASL and adaptive ASL.
- Students are asked to put on gloves and blindfolds and try to put together wooden puzzles using other senses as a task that will give the impression of someone who may have sensory challenges.

Learning Outcome: Students will learn about various vision disabilities and eye diseases and how to care for their eyes. They will also learn about various sensory challenges and cognitive functions, including dementia, autism, and fall prevention.









Resources and Equipment

Wheelchair Demonstration :

Wheelchairs – we have thirteen

Hearing Demonstration :

Laptop, ten noise-cancelling headphones, cables and jacks to connect headphones to the laptop, and audio recording of common environmental sounds at varying levels

Vision Demonstration :

Two white canes, ten blindfolds, and objects to toss on the floor to be 'found' by cane users, such as keys

Interactive/Sensory Demonstration :

Ten wooden puzzles, ten blindfolds, gloves, Zimmerman Low Vision Simulation Kit, experience calendar tool, and ASL learning posters
