Barrie has grown over the years and has a population of 952 000 people. Our city has still kept many of it's old landmarks, parks, and recreation areas among the growing population. Towns such as Orillia and Midland have now become a part of the Greater Barrie Area (GBA).





Only 40% of Barrie's population uses automobiles. Most people use public transportation. Barrie Transit sky pods are available all over the city which replaced the old buses back in 2220. Barrie Transit sky pods swiftly carry passengers to many Barrie area locations such as the Bayfield Malltropolis, The Kozlov Shopping Paradox, The Georgian Shopping Dome as well as the Royal Victoria Hospital and Georgian College/University Complex.





Automobiles are electric and plug in charging is available at all our cities parking spaces.





Barrie is also very proud of our construction of the skyway 400 which was completed in 2224. It conveniently gets people to and from Toronto daily in less than 15 minutes. The system runs along the old 400 hwy and has cut down on most of the pollution in the past, caused by automobiles.













Barrie has moving sidewalks on many of it's major streets. People use public transit, walking, biking and many enjoy Segway vehicles as they are a simple and affordable mode of transportation.











Barrie has a variety of different kinds of houses including click together condos, town homes and single dwelling homes.









Early in the 23rd Century, Barrie became a leading city when it discovered the invention of Solar Powered Hydro Conductors (SPHC's). Barrie currently has almost 50% of it's cities hydro needs provided for, by using the solar rays captured from the SPHC's. The outlying fields and farmland surrounding the greater Barrie area have many purposes. The land is not only used for farming and agricultural needs, but also home of many of the Solar Powered Hydro Conductors. Other major cities within Canada are following in Barrie's footsteps!





Farmland around the Barrie area as seen in photos, S.P.H.C's were erected by the city in 2211. The SPHC's resemble light posts. The dynamic and attractive design is perfect for collecting energy and making it a very important part of Barrie's affordable living community.



Even though 50% of all electricity in Barrie is powered by SPHC's, we still use other ways to get hydro. There are still large solar panels on many roof tops and the city uses wind turbines as well.











Barrie has been committed to finding solutions to the environmental challenges that face our city. We have taken a "go green" attitude and believe that we have succeeded in keeping our city eco friendly.



One other modern day advantage to homes in Barrie is the T.R.A.P (Trash Receptacle Animation Particalizer) This machine can transform all green bin trash into energy efficiency. Most homes in Barrie are equipped with the TRAP system.







Barrie is a wonderfull city with it's natural surroundings and first class recreation. Our walking trails and parks and beautiful Kempenfelt Bay are among the most loved. Residents also enjoy skiing and snowmobiling in many area trails.
