Significant accounting practices

Significant accounting policies are those that are most important to the portrayal of the City's financial position and financial performance.

In the course of our audit of the financial statements, we considered the qualitative aspects of the financial reporting process, including items that have a significant impact on the relevance, reliability, comparability and understandability of the information included in the financial statements.

Significant accounting policies

In our judgment, the significant accounting practices, selected and applied by management are, in all material respects, acceptable and appropriate to the particular circumstances of the City.

Management judgment and accounting estimates

In our judgment, the significant accounting estimates made by management are, in all material respects, free of possible management bias and of material misstatement. The disclosure in the financial statements around estimation uncertainty is in accordance with PSAS and is appropriate to the particular circumstances of the City.

Significant estimates recorded in the financial statements include:

Post-employment benefits liability \$39,206,241 (2013 - \$33,685,771)
Landfill closure and post-closure liabilities \$6,263,920 (2013 - \$21,016,034)

In addition, estimates were used in determining the valuation of tangible capital assets when initially recorded on the City's consolidated financial statements and estimates are also used in determining the useful lives of various categories of tangible capital assets.

Significant change in estimates-landfill closure and post-closure liabilities

In 2014, the City made a significant change in its estimate related to landfill closure and post-closure liabilities which resulted in a net decrease of the landfill closure and post-closure liabilities in the amount of \$14,752,114.

The City excavated down to native soil and began the final stage of Phase 3 of the Landfill Re-Engineering Project. We understand that the soil and waste that was excavated was reprocessed with new technologies that reduce the wastes volume to 1/3 its original size (increasing landfill capacity significantly). Management has asserted that the final phase of the Landfill Re-Engineering Project was initiated in fiscal 2014 and that all of the waste reprocessing and excavation had been completed. Accordingly, the City of Barrie reassessed the landfill closure and post-closure liabilities based on the increased landfill capacity and useful life of the landfill site as at December 31, 2014. The additional capacity is expected to increase the service life of the landfill site from 2024 to 2035.

The net decrease \$14,752,114 was recorded as a reduction of the current year expenses on the consolidated statement of operations and accumulated surplus rather than as a restatement of the beginning of year accumulated surplus as management has asserted that there was measurement uncertainty with respect to this matter prior to the year ended December 31, 2014.

Effective January 1, 2014, the City sold 20% of its interest in Lake Simcoe Regional Airport Inc. for \$1,300,000. The book value of this 20% interest was \$4,448,026. This transaction resulted in a loss on sale of \$3,148,026 which is recorded as part of general government expenses and not shown separately on the Statement of operations or the Statement of cash flows.

This representation letter is provided in connection with the audit by Deloitte LLP ("Deloitte" or "you") of the consolidated financial statements prepared by City of Barrie (the "City" or "we" or "us") for the year ended December 31, 2014 and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information (the "Financial Statements") for the purpose of expressing an opinion as to whether the Financial Statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position, results of operations, changes in net debt and cash flows of the City in accordance with Canadian Public Sector Accounting Standards ("PSAS").

We confirm that, to the best of our knowledge and belief, having made such inquiries as we considered necessary for the purpose of appropriately informing ourselves:

Financial statements

- 1. We have fulfilled our responsibilities as set out in the terms of the engagement letter between the City of Barrie and Deloitte dated January 7, 2015 for the preparation of the Financial Statements in accordance with PSAS. In particular, the Financial Statements are fairly presented, in all material respects, and present the financial position of the City as at December 31, 2014, the results of its operations, changes in net debt and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with PSAS.
- 2. Significant assumptions used in making estimates, including those measured at fair value if applicable, are reasonable.

In preparing the Financial Statements in accordance with PSAS, management makes judgments and assumptions about the future and uses estimates. The completeness and appropriateness of the disclosures related to estimates are in accordance with PSAS. The City has appropriately disclosed in the Financial Statements the nature of measurement uncertainties that are material, including all estimates where it is reasonably possible that the estimate will change in the near term and the effect of the change could be material to the Financial Statements.

Financial statements (continued)

The measurement methods, including the related assumptions and models, used in determining the estimates, including fair value, were appropriate, reasonable and consistently applied in accordance with PSAS and appropriately reflect management's intent and ability to carry out specific courses of action on behalf of the entity. No events have occurred subsequent to December 31, 2014 that require adjustment to the estimates and disclosures included in the Financial Statements.

There are no changes in management's method of determining significant estimates in the current year.

- 3. - 28. We have identified to you all forgivable loans and loans with concessionary terms and have appropriately reflected these instruments in the financial statements.

Environmental liabilities/contingencies

29. We have considered the effect of environmental matters on the City and have disclosed to you all liabilities, provisions or contingencies arising from environmental matters. All liabilities, provisions, contingencies and commitments arising from environmental matters, and the effect of environmental matters on the carrying values of the relevant assets are recognized, measured and disclosed, as appropriate, in the Financial Statements.

Solid waste landfill closure and post-closure liability

30. We have disclosed to you all operating and closed solid waste landfill sites that we own. We have recorded a liability which represents our best estimate of the future costs required for closure and post-closure care related to these sites.

Employee future benefits

- 31. Employee future benefit costs, assets, and obligations, as applicable, have been properly recorded and adequately disclosed in the Financial Statements. We believe that the actuarial assumptions and methods used to measure defined benefit plan assets, obligations and costs for financial statement purposes are appropriate in the circumstances.
- 32. We have disclosed to you any intentions of withdrawing from the multi-employer plan that could result in an effective termination or reportable event for any of the plans. We have disclosed to you any occurrences that could result in the termination of any of our multi-employer plans to which we contribute.
- 33. We are unable to determine the possibility of a withdrawal liability in a multi-employer benefit plan.
- 34. We have correctly accounted for the multi-employer plan in which we are a participating government or government organization, as a defined contribution plan

Government transfers

- 35. We have disclosed to you all correspondence relating to government transfers that the City has had with the funding body.
- 36. We have assessed the eligibility criteria and determined that the City is an eligible recipient for the government transfers received.
- 37. We have assessed the stipulations attached with the funding and have recognized the revenue in accordance with meeting the stipulations required.

38. We have appropriately recorded tax assets and revenues when they meet the definition of an asset in accordance with Section PS 1000, Financial Statement Concepts, when they are authorized and when the taxable event occurs. These amounts have been appropriately measured in accordance with PS 3510, Tax Revenue, and have not been grossed up for any amount of tax concessions

Tangible capital assets

- 39. Tangible capital assets have been recorded properly and consistently according to the standards in Section PS 3150, Tangible Capital Assets.
- 40. Contributed tangible capital assets have been appropriately recorded at fair value, unless fair value is not reasonably determinable, and in such case, have been recorded at an appropriate nominal value. All contributed tangible capital assets have been appropriately disclosed.
- 41. We have assessed the useful lives of tangible capital assets and have determined all tangible capital assets contribute to the City's ability to provide goods and services and therefore do not require a write down.

Government Business Enterprises and Government Business Partnerships.

42. The City has appropriately classified its investment in Barrie Hydro Holdings Inc., Barrie Hydro Energy Services Inc., and PowerStream Inc. and have disclosed to you any events that have occurred and facts that have been discovered with respect to such investment that would affect the investment's value in the consolidated financial statements.
