HISTORY

• Founded in 1996 as the Vulnerable Adults

Prevention Committee of Simcoe County

•1997 District Health Council changed the focus to seniors

•Province launched first Older Abuse Strategy in 2002

•Elder Abuse Ontario began to provide support in 2007

•Renamed PSAN-SC in 2007





NETWORK ABOUTUS

•49 members in Network represent over 20 agencies and organizations (health care police, mental health, retirement homes, hearing and vision

impairment, police) as well as 7 retired seniors

•5 member Executive provides direction

•Monthly meetings

•Not incorporated, no funding, no staff, no office

• All seniors in Simcoe County live with dignity and respect in a safe environment

MISSION

•To promote community participation in a network dedicated to promoting awareness, prevention and response to senior abuse in Simcoe County through advocacy, education and collaboration

Recent Accomplishments

- New website www.psan-sc.ca funded by Seniors Community Grant (SCG) 2019
- Abuse Prevention Kits developed in 2019 and tested by seniors
- 2020 Road Show funded by SCG to promote education and resources to rural communities in Simcoe County
- 2021 SCG funds approved to create virtual education and training (8 videos on website under Education tab)
- Changed Abuse Prevention Kits to Safety Kits for distribution by First Responders and others
- Over 1000 Safety Kits distributed in past year
- Attended 3 drive-through events in Bradford with South Simcoe Police as well as Georgian Mall with Barrie Police



VULNERABLE GROUPS

Being a Women

LGBTQ2S+

Previous abuse as a child, youth or adult

Dementia/Cognitiv e Impairment

Women with disabilities

Lower income or poverty

Depression

Dependent Socially Isolated

Living with someone with Addictions

Deteriorating health situations where one partner cares for the other

RECOGNIZING THE ABUSER



FAMILY:

spouse, partner, sibling, son, daughter, grandchild.

FRIEND/NEIGHBOUR:

Informal caregiver /neighbour who helps out once in awhile with care or errands.

CAREGIVER:

Paid agency providing formal support and services

The abuser may be the person who comes across as a very supportive family member.







TYPES OF ELDER ABUSE

- Financial
- Psychological
- Physical
- Sexual
- Neglect



EMOTIONAL ABUSE

Any action, verbal or non-verbal, that lessens a person's sense of identity, dignity and selfworth.

SOCIAL ISOLATION

- Power imbalance : Loss of control in decision making and choices
- No Access or denied to technology (computer/ipad/ phone) to connect with family, friends, agencies
- Fear, discomfort or nervousness around family members, friends, caregiver or other persons.
- Name calling, ridiculing, insulting, bullying



FINANCIAL ABUSE

 ${\sf Any}$ improper conduct, done with or without the informed consent of the older adult that results in a

monetary or personal gain to the abuser and/or monetary or personal loss for the older adult.

HARDSHIP

- Covid Fraud and Scams
- Families/adult children moving in with parents/grandparents and not financially contributing
- Lack or no access to banking information
- Misuse of Power of Attorney
- Theft, forgery





NEGLECT

The failure to provide care and assistance required for health, safety or well-being, and includes

inaction or a pattern of inaction that jeopardizes the health or safety of an older adult.

FAILURE TO THRIVE

- Lack of access to groceries and medications
- Physicians apt cancelled or phone consultations
- Denied access to services
- Failure to provide medical attention/treatments
- Inability to 'physically' check or observe changes in health, mental well-being of older adult





PHYSICAL ABUSE

Any act of violence or rough-handling that may or may not result in physical injury, but causes physical discomfort or pain.

PHYSICAL INJURY

- Hitting or punching, rough-handling
- Restraint or confinement
- Unexplained bruising on the face, arms/legs
- Broken glasses
- Over-medicating or withholding necessary medications
