RECOMMENDED MOTION

1. That Staff Report ACC001-24 concerning the results of the public consultations related to Marshall Green's report, entitled *The Southshore, Barrie Sports and a Revitalized Downtown*, be received.

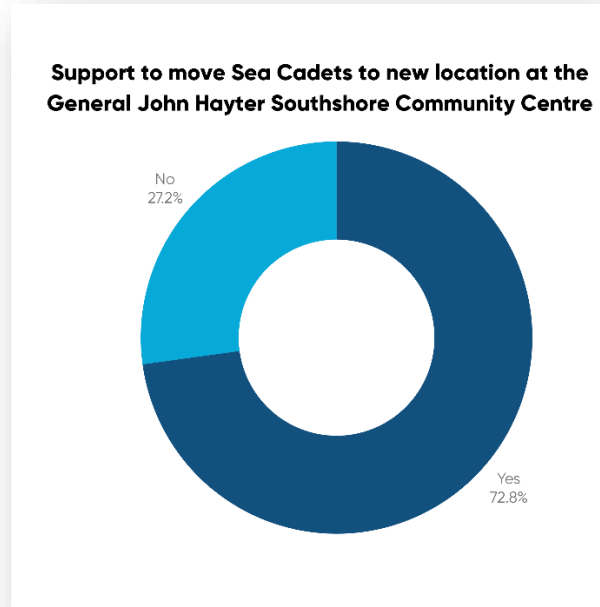
PURPOSE & BACKGROUND

2. On May 15, 2024, Barrie City Council approved motion 24-G-111 (Sea Cadets Parade Ground & Multi-Use Sports Field) to build a Sea Cadets parade ground and youth multi-use sports field in Allandale Station Park, east of Military Heritage Park.
3. The recommendation includes a new Sea Cadets parade ground for parade ground events and multi-use field that would offer opportunities for enhanced use of the waterfront for residents, visitors, and for event planning by the city and the community.
4. The project includes a 600m² addition to the General John Hayter Southshore Community Centre to accommodate the Sea Cadets. The Sea Cadets have long been located near the Spirit Catcher and finding another location for safety reasons for them has been before Barrie City Council for many years. This move will ensure the Cadets have a suitable location on the waterfront to ensure the safety of children and youth participating in their programs. It also aligns with Barrie's Waterfront Strategic Plan, which was updated in 2023.
5. Further to direction by Barrie City Council in May 2024, staff refined the location of the Sea Cadets Parade Ground and Multi-Use Sports field to reduce the impact on existing trees in the area, making the field smaller and closer to the road, to ensure the paved walking path is not impacted and to consider the use of natural barriers over fencing. A refined location was shared on June 18, 2024.
6. Mr. Marshall Green was asked to gather information about the parade ground and multi-use sports field including feedback from various stakeholder groups/organizations to help guide the waterfront and downtown vision. On August 14, 2024, Mr. Green shared his report, *The Southshore, Barrie Sports and a Revitalized Downtown*.

7. At the request of Council, Mayor Nuttall issued Mayoral Direction on August 15, 2024, to the CAO and staff to pause actioning Council's motion 24-G-111 to allow for public consultation to occur on Mr. Green's report.
8. The Mayor's Direction provided to staff: *Since the Council approval of motion 24-G-111 concerning the Multi-Use Sports Field, new information provided in Mr. Green's report and an exciting opportunity that emerged in early July, the City is actively working with a global entity on a promising venture that could significantly enhance the future of sport tourism in Barrie. I direct the CAO and staff to pause actioning Council motion 24-G-111 in order to allow for public consultation to occur and be presented back to Council later this fall.*
9. Public consultation began on August 22, 2024, and ran for five weeks, concluding on September 25, 2024. During this period, the city heard from approximately 3,307 residents.
10. An online survey was created on Building Barrie to gather feedback on Mr. Green's report and an in-person public consultation event was held September 24, 2024.
11. The public input opportunities were promoted in the following outlets beginning on August 22, 2024: website updates (homepage banner, event listing and update on the project page), eDigest, social media posts and paid advertisements, This Week in Barrie, digital monitors and media releases were used to promote the survey and in-person consultation.

ANALYSIS

12. The online survey was hosted on Building Barrie between the days of August 22, 2024, and September 24, 2024. A total of 3,101 surveys were completed. The complete survey results are provided as Schedule A.
13. On September 24, 2024, an in-person public consultation event was held between 4 p.m. and 8 p.m. at the General John Hayter Southshore Community Centre. There were approximately 206 attendees. A summary of feedback is attached as Schedule B.
14. Recommendation #1 from Mr. Green's report suggests that *"the site to be offered to the Sea Cadets for their parade ground be at the location and the size shown in Figure 1 to this report and that it have a suitable hard surface as might be recommended by that group."* Overall, 72.8% of residents are in favour of moving the Sea Cadets to a new location at the General John Hayter Southshore Community Centre to ensure the cadets have a suitable location on the waterfront to ensure the safety of youth participating in their programs.

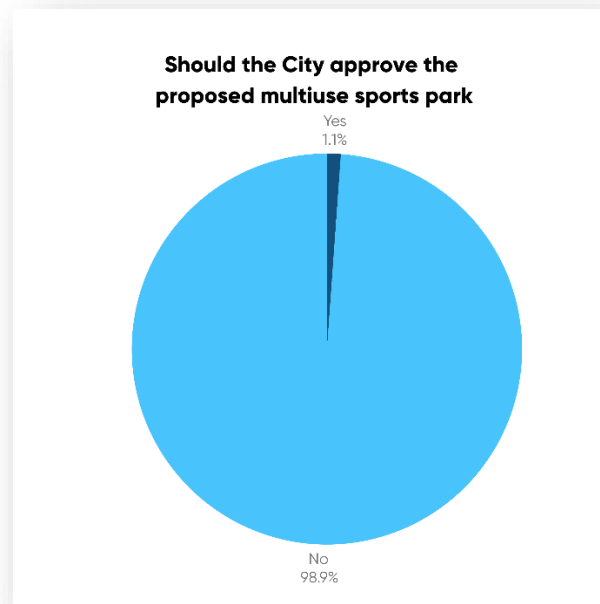


15. Respondents to the survey shared a variety of possible uses for the area when not in use by the Sea Cadets for sports groups or individuals at the proposed new location at the General John Hayter Southshore Community Centre.

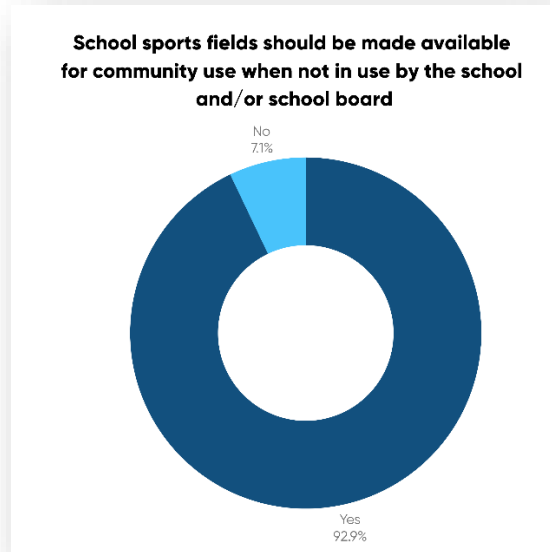
**Top Five Suggestions for the Parade Grounds
When Not in Use by the Sea Cadets**



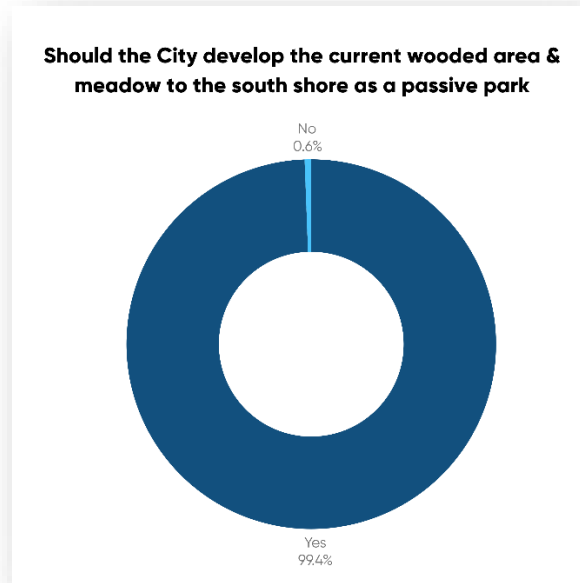
16. Recommendation #2 states that the “City not approve the proposed multiuse sports park on that site, nor, at all.” 98.9% of participants agree with not proceeding with the proposed multiuse sports park on that site.



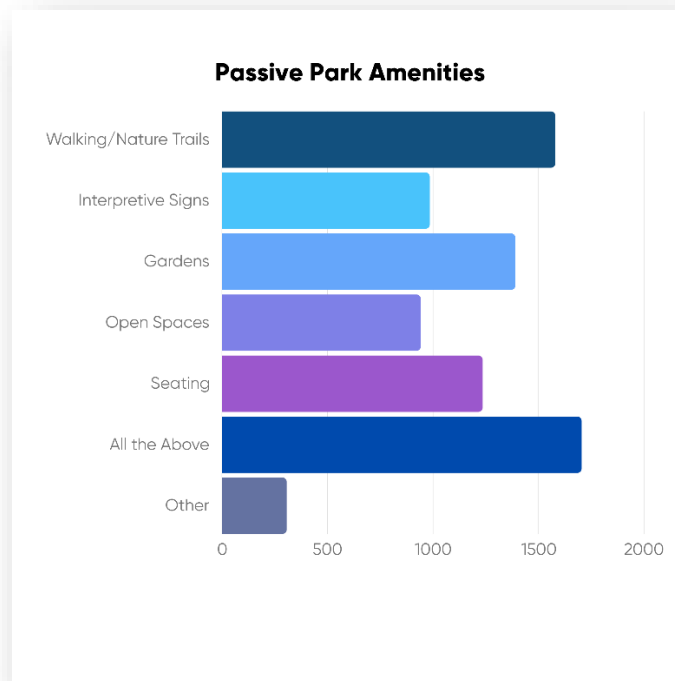
17. Recommendation #3 from Mr. Green’s report was that *“the City encourage representatives of the various sports organizations to meet cooperatively, with the assistance of City Recreation Staff, to organize the proper and most efficient use of the existing fields on City lands; and that the city make a priority in any future subdivision “park dedications” that the land be set aside for minor sports; and that the City Recreation Staff meet with school board officials to ensure that school sports fields are made fully available to minor sports organizations.”* 92.9% of residents agree with Mr. Green’s recommendation for school sports fields to be made available for community use.



18. Recommendation #4 states that *“the City develop the current wooded area and meadow to the south shore as a passive park that protects existing wildlife and with trail systems that are accessible; and that the park also include an educational component; and that citizens groups and service clubs in the city be engaged with the City’s Parks Department to develop the park; and that the lands ultimately designated for this part of the park be zoned “environmental protection.”* 99.4% of residents agreed with the recommendation in Mr. Marshall’s report.

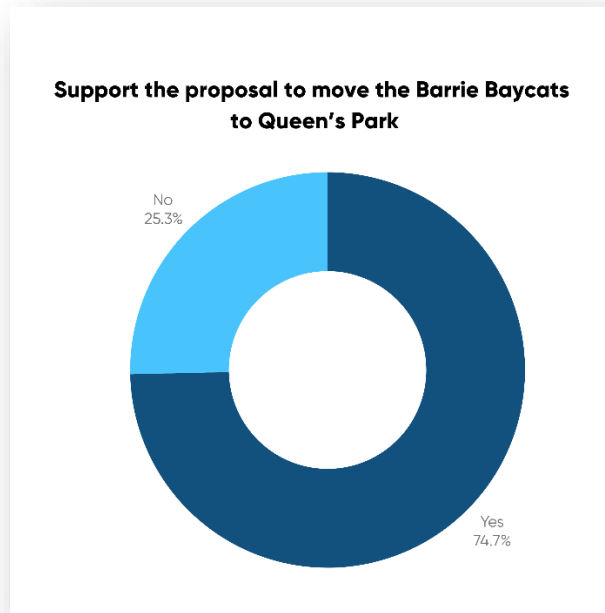


19. Respondents to the online survey support all the amenities recommended in Mr. Green’s report to enhance the area on the south shore as a passive park.

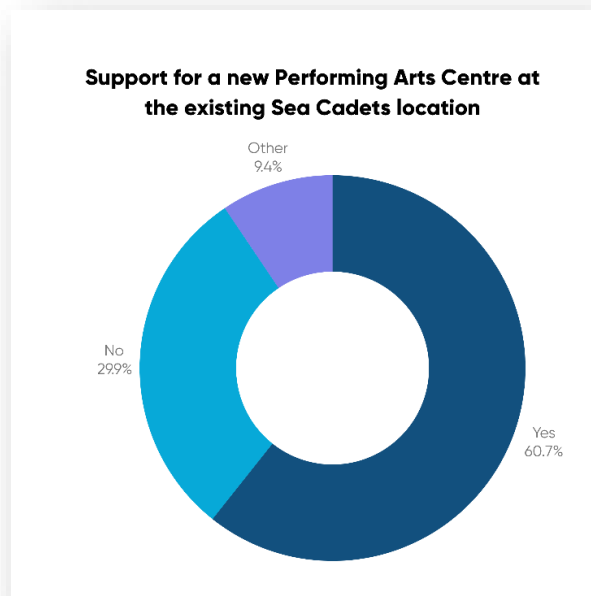


20. Recommendation #5 from Mr. Green’s report proposes that “the Barrie Baycats be approached to move from their existing home at the Midhurst Sports Park; and that the city work with the Baycats

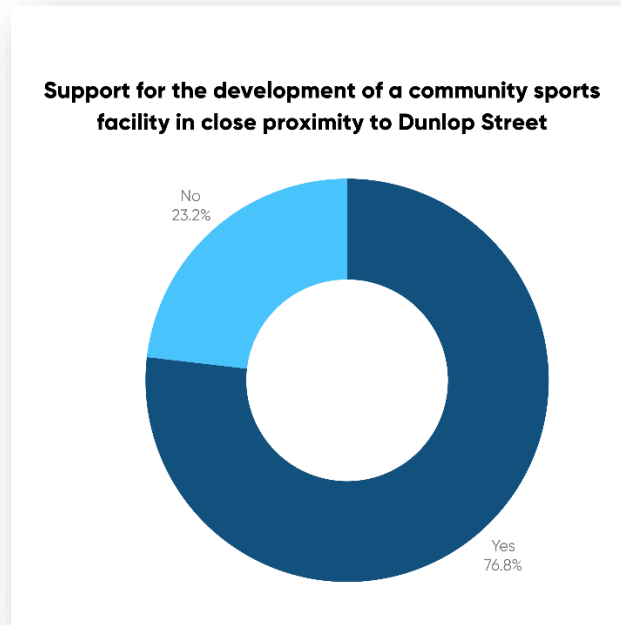
to reconfigure and renovate Queen's Park to accommodate the team." 74.7% of residents support the idea recommended in Mr. Green's report to move the Barrie Baycats to Queen's Park.



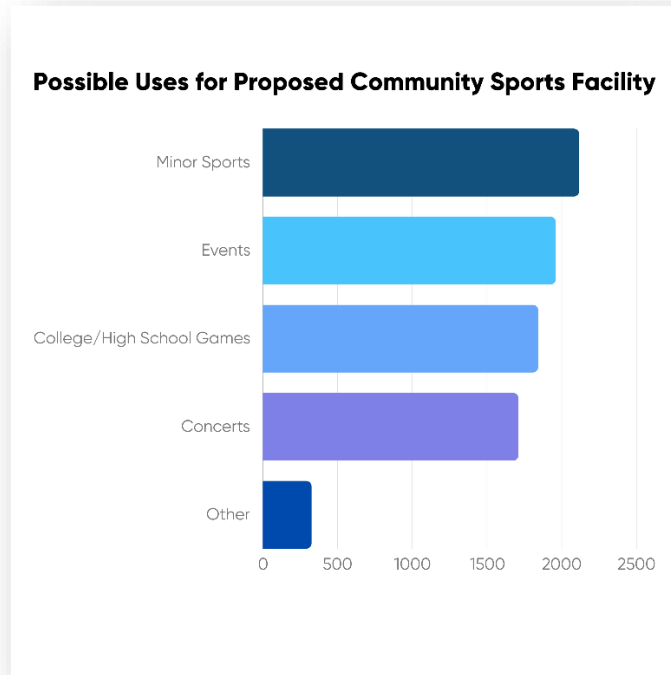
21. Recommendation #6 from Mr. Green's report is "that the former Sea Cadets site and required surrounding City lands become the site of Barrie's new Performing Arts Centre." 60.7% of respondents support Mr. Green's proposal that the former site of the Sea Cadets and required surrounding city lands become the site of Barrie's new Performing Arts Centre.



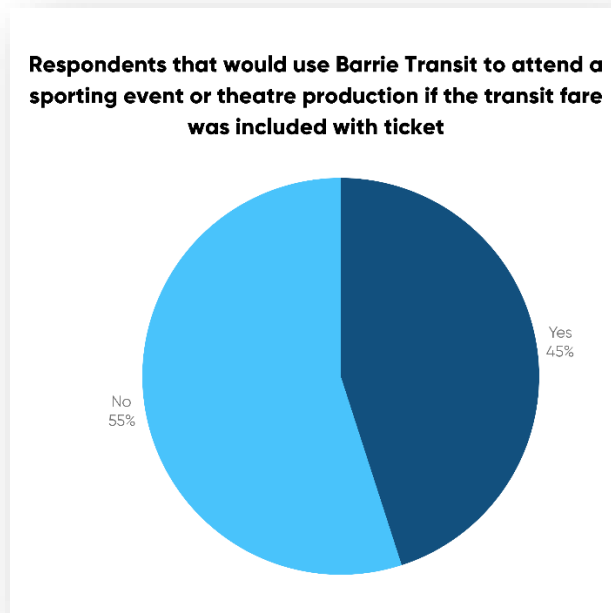
22. Recommendation #7 from Mr. Green’s report proposes “that subject to Council coming to a satisfactory formal agreement with the new entity, that the City owned lands that are part of the former Barrie Central Collegiate lands be made available for a soccer stadium to become the new home of the Simcoe County Rovers soccer team.” 76.8% of respondents support the development of a community sports facility in close proximity to Dunlop Street for a professional sports team and for use by the community.



23. Respondents shared a variety of possible uses for the proposed community sports facility recommended in Mr. Green’s report that could also be accessible to field sports organizations and for community use.



24. 45% of residents indicated on the online survey that they would use Barrie Transit to attend a sporting event or a theatre production if the transit fare was included with their ticket.



ENVIRONMENTAL MATTERS

25. There are no environmental matters related to the recommendation.

ALTERNATIVES

26. Council could choose to direct staff to hire consultants/architects on elements within the recommendations from Mr. Marshall's report.

- a) For example, to complete the schematic design (only) of this new Performing Arts Centre (new scope) for the existing Sea Cadets site it is estimated to cost approximately \$200K. No project-related due diligence work on the Sea Cadets site has been undertaken to date. The site is a source water protection zone sitting atop an active drinking water aquifer, which presents additional development challenges, and a review will need to be conducted. There will also need to be consideration of the future of the Spirit Catcher as part of this site.

27. Council could choose to pass one or all the recommendations contained in Mr. Marshall's report.

28. Council could choose to do nothing or to direct staff to take a different direction.

FINANCIAL

29. There are no specific financial implications from the results of the consultation. There will be financial implications to consider should Council decide to proceed with any of the recommendations in Mr. Green's report both from additional studies and site works and capital investments.

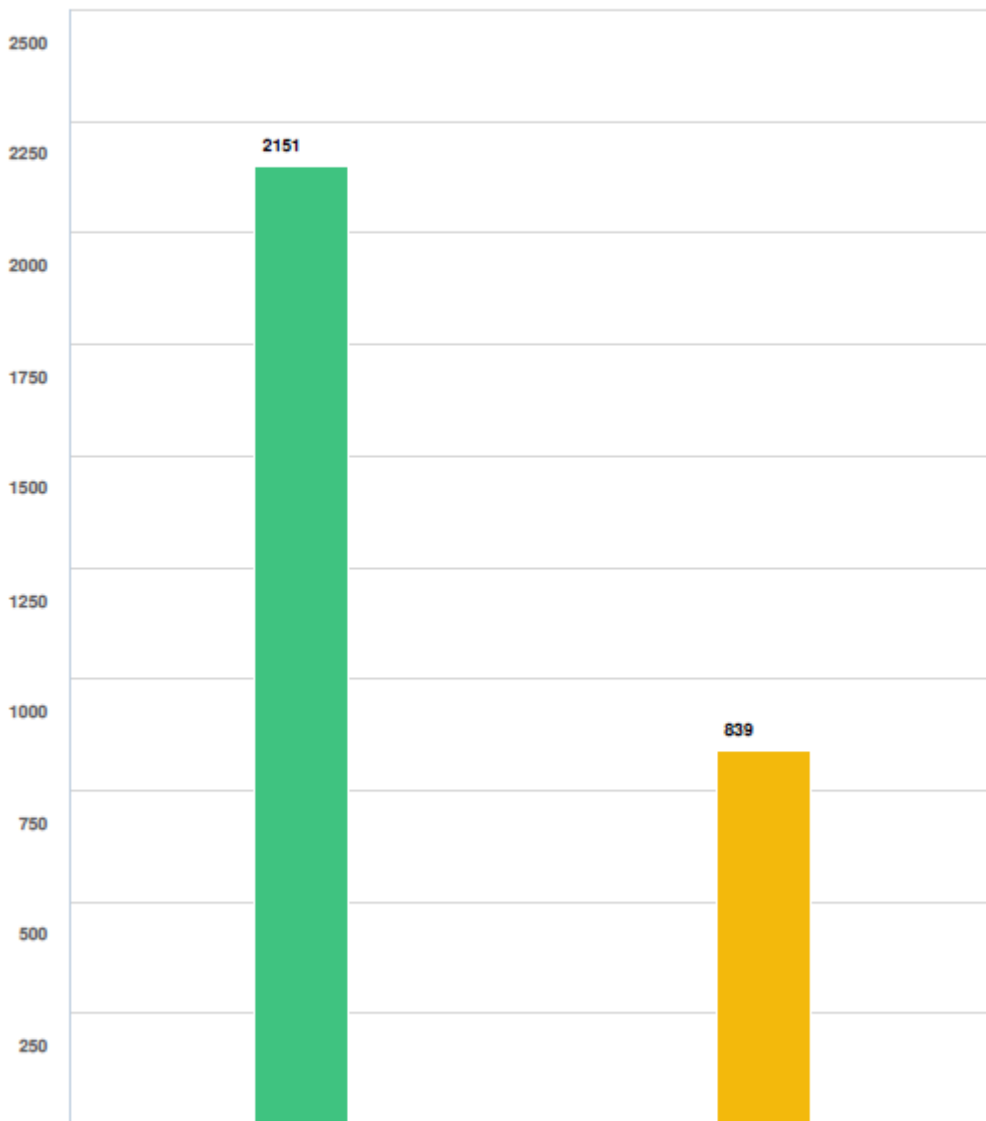

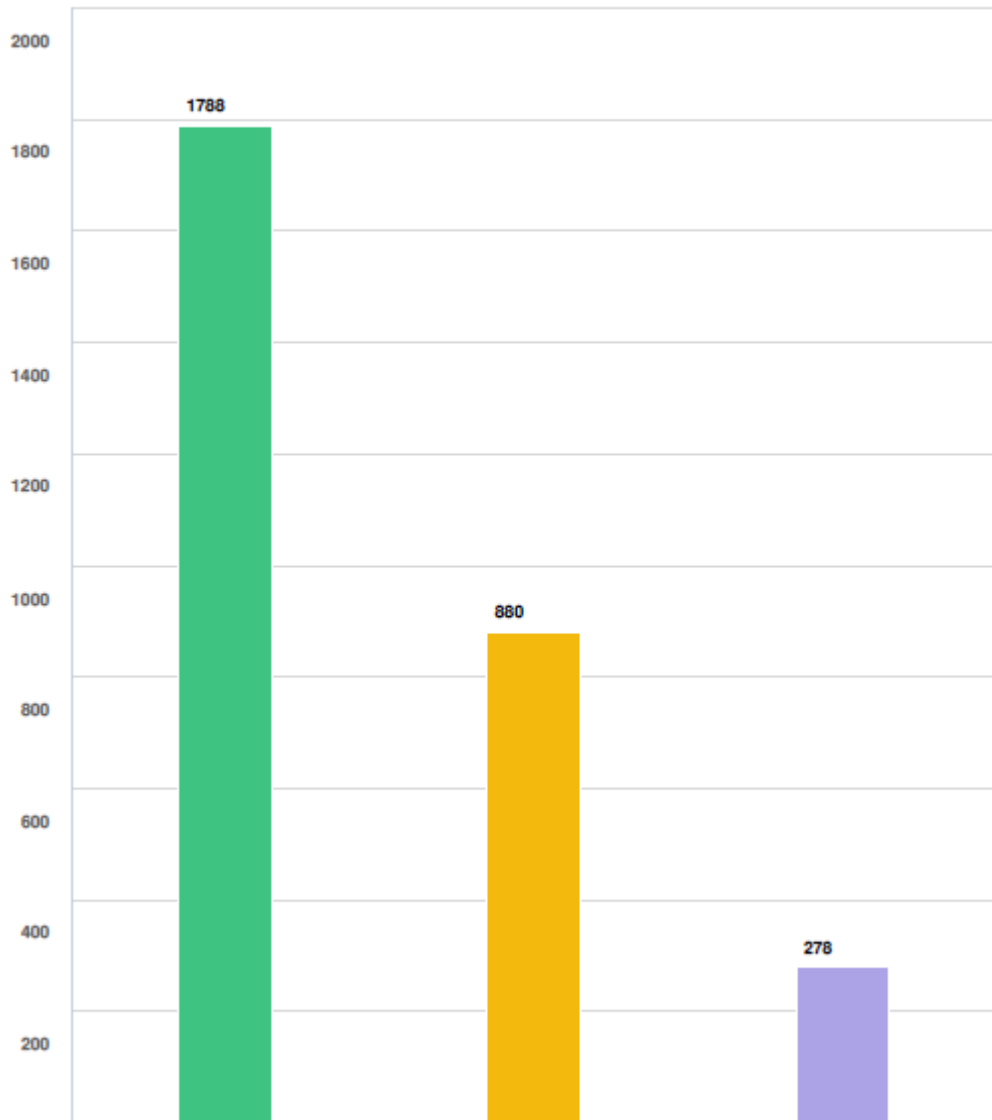

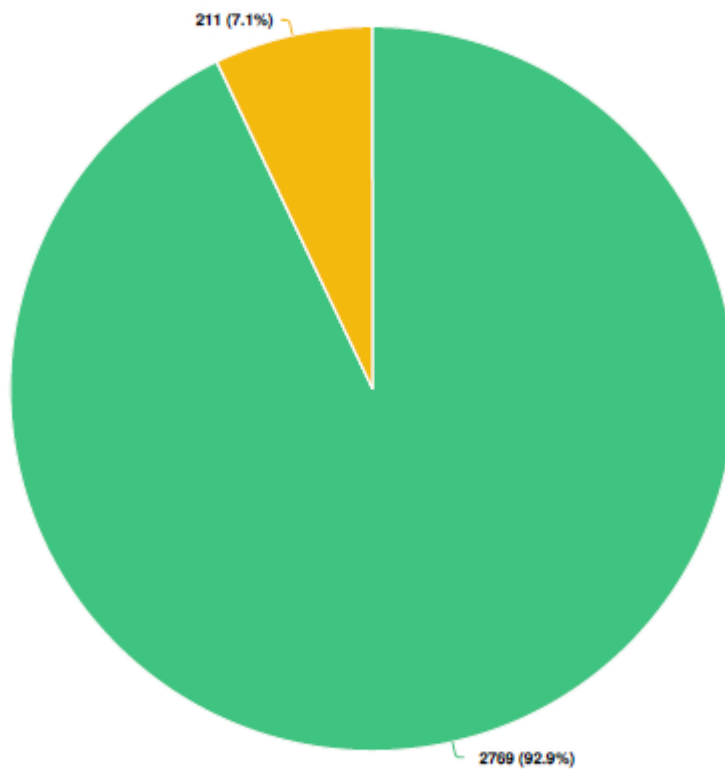

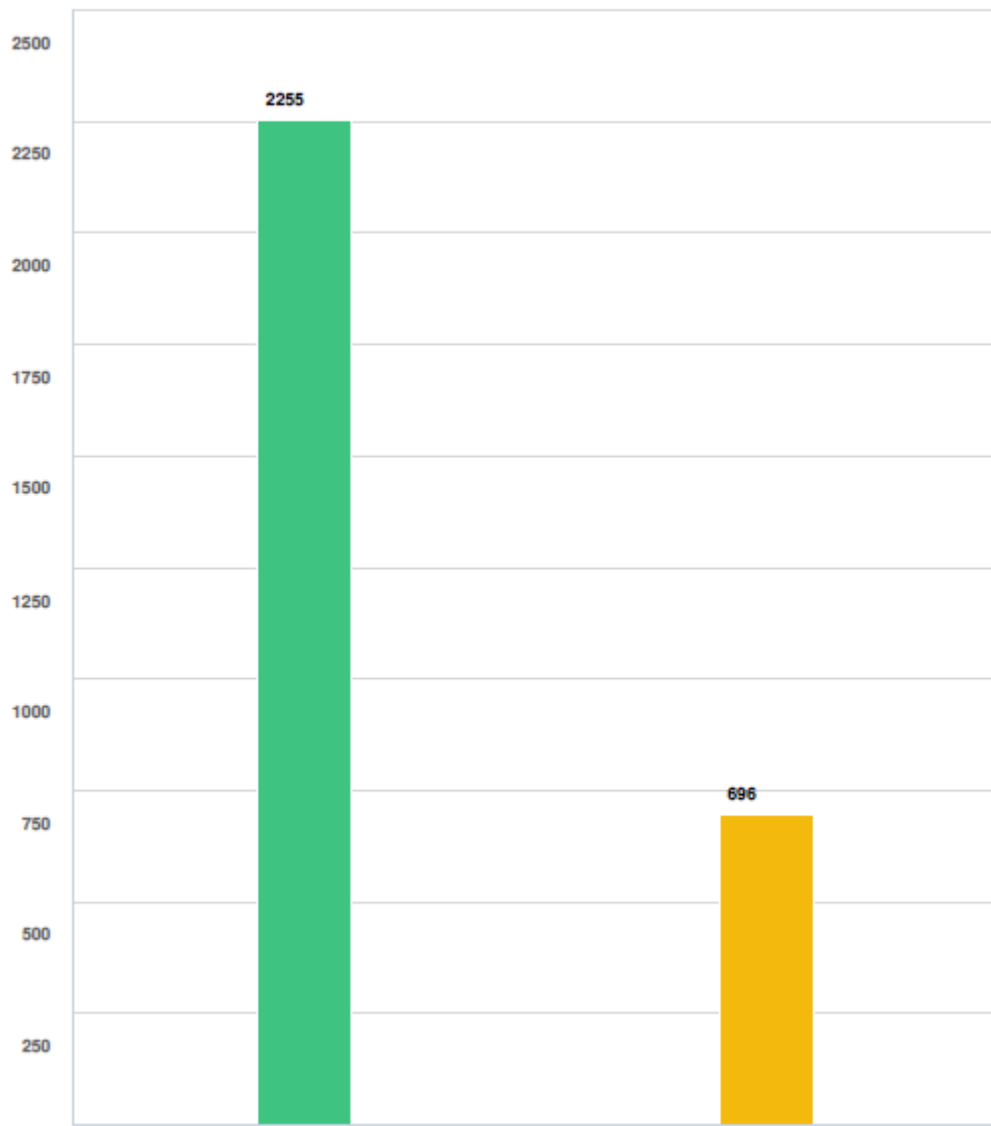

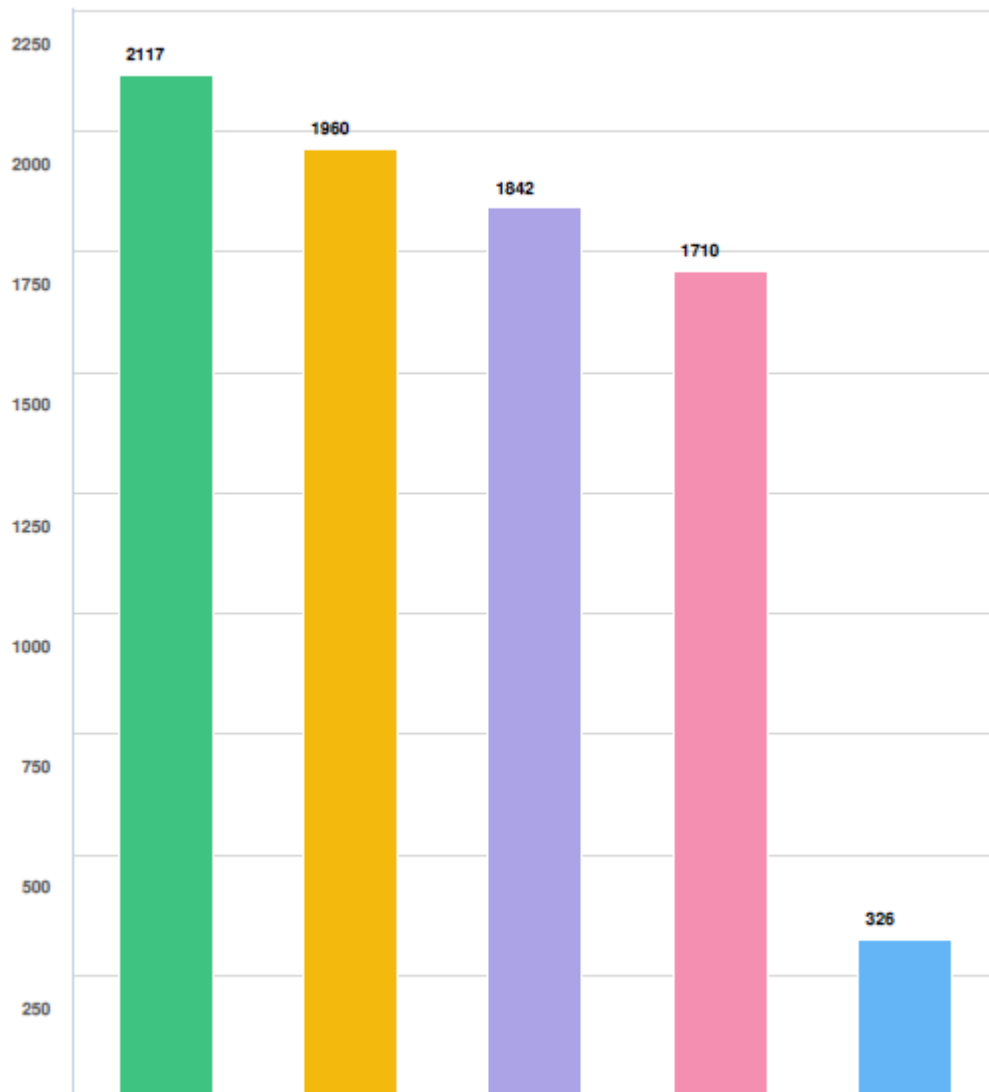

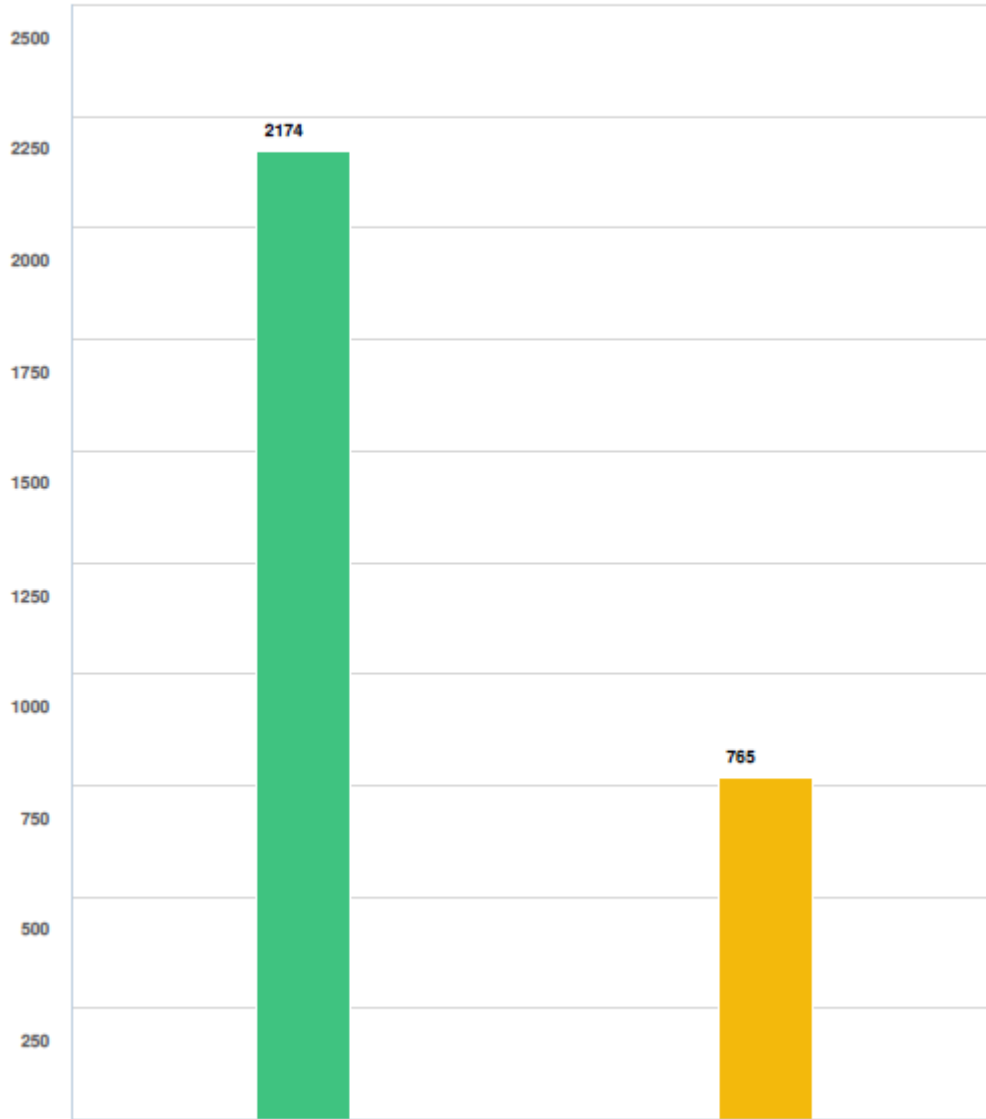

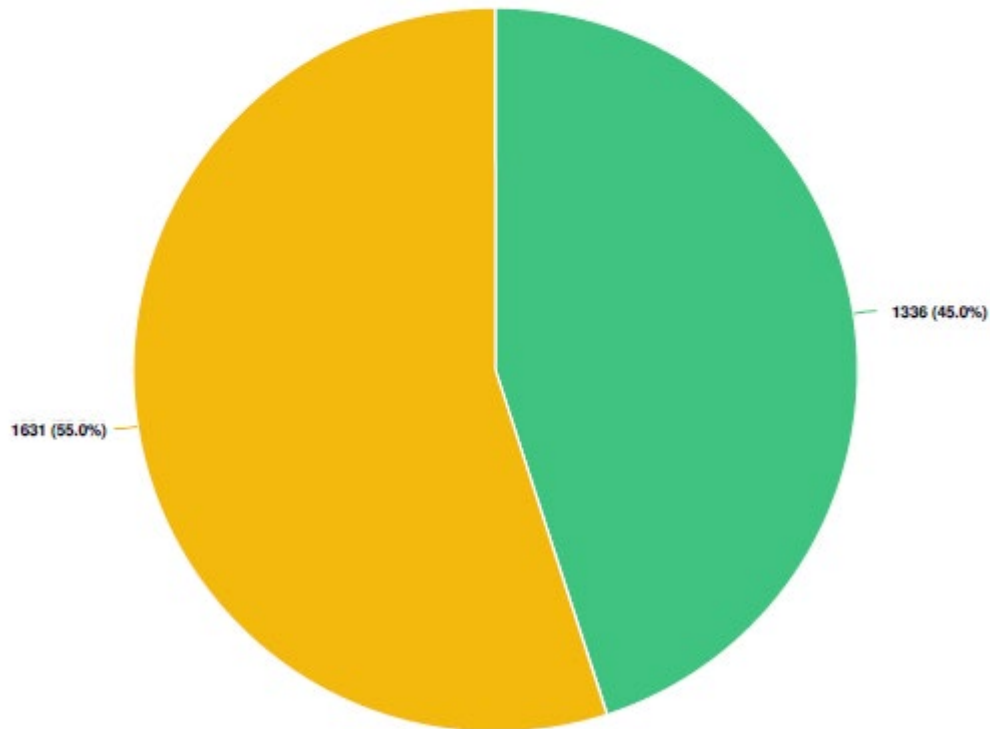

Any further comments on Marshall Green's report, The Southshore, Barrie Sports and a Revitalized Downtown?

I do not agree with much of Mr. Green's report. The old collegiate site is excellent for the (wonderful) proposed Pontarini design which accommodates parking, a green space and room for future expansion. (Exterior noise is not an issue in modern theatre design and construction.) Placing a Performing Arts Centre into the historic downtown will add to road congestion as well as parking problems. The original proposed site is closer to the transit hub making it walkable for most people using transit. As the population in this area rapidly increases, a neighbourhood park becomes even more necessary. The Park on Kempenfelt Bay is a lovely show park and meant for the entire city and the tourists coming to Art events. I have extensive experience in the Arts in Canada and have attended seminars presented by economists where it is demonstrated that the Arts are a much better investment in a city's economy . People attending sports events drive in, eat at McDonalds and drive out again. Barrie needs to evolve from being a city catering to hockey dad's and soccer moms and become one which recognizes the importance of culture to the economic and social well being of our city..Your job is to erase the term "Barrification" from the planning Vocabulary. Arts facilities bring in overnight visitors who stay in hotels, eat at real restaurants, shop at interesting stores and leave much more money in the local economy than the much more expensive sporting centres built for rich team owners and corporations like rogers. Further more a much larger majority of citizens attend concerts and exhibitions than sporting events. Leave Queen's Park as a community park and let the rich team owners buy farm land to destroy. Stick with the original Performing Arts Centre plan. It was a good one.

Most visitors to a sports field will DRIVE, PERIOD.This will discourage people from meeting friends/ shopping/ enjoying the waterfront. Downtown will be avoided, because you will be concerned that you will not get parked.

Barrie has had these issues going on for so long. Why did it take an outsider like Marshall Green to see the great possibilities here?

I believe that Marshall Green's intention all along is promoting the Performing Arts goals and has nothing to do with being concerned about the Sea Cadets or Sports in Barrie. That being said I believe there are a couple of glaring problems with his proposals.

1. Barrie BayCats...They have wanted to move into Barrie for a long time but the Queen's Park proposal just won't work. They would need 3-4 acres to create the proper venue for professional baseball and the Queen's Park location is just not big enough. I would suggest working WITH the Baycats organization and try and find a piece of land that would work for them..... maybe the old Barrie Central location?
2. Queen's Park... definitely needs a "refresh" and then starts scheduling Minor Baseball both Girls and boys
3. "Global Sports Entity"- if we are talking about a Professional soccer team I would recommend using and updating the Georgian College facilities.... add washrooms and clubhouse..... create professional atmosphere and lots of parking already available. Bus routes already in place.
4. Sea cadets Parade ground- Parade grounds are traditionally very ugly and plain by

nature... to have that placed by the gorgeous South Shore would not be a good idea. I think it would really be a blight. Can the Sea Cadets go further along the shore to just past the Military park and build a proper access to the water and tuck in the parade ground in a sheltered area opposite the their water access? This would give them better autonomy and privacy.

5. School grounds for minor sports: this was the way it was done years ago and I am not sure why it stopped except there was talk about insurance and exorbitant fees... worth looking into.

6. The only thing that surprised me about Marshall Green's report is that he didn't specify that the Performing Arts Theatre should be named after himself! [...] this report [...] really had nothing to do with enhancing Minor sports in Barrie.

In order for the citizens of Barrie to use these items safely, changes need to be made to support those individuals who are living in crisis throughout Barrie's downtown. Many citizens, myself included, are refusing to use those areas due to these individuals we so not feel safe to take be down there on our own, or with our children. With individuals openly using drugs, and the debris from said experiences being left everywhere it does not create a sense of wellbeing in the area. Before we have the ability to move the baycats OR engage in an event space, these things need to be taken care of in a manner that supports individuals who need mental health and crisis support.

These concepts are great way to invite more individuals to our downtown. It would be great to see these spaces being used to show off what Barrie has to offer. But when you are fearful of the area (and to be honest Barrie is becoming a scary place to live. And I've literally lived here my whole life) the amazing spaces won't end up being used. No matter how great they are.

Please don't ruin it

stop with the development of the water front. Let's not over populate the area. Let's keep the waterfront used for walking, cycling etc.;

more transparency is required to make any knowledgeable decisions regarding a sports team;

sea cadets require not only a parade square but a place to store equipment and conduct training inside. Build them a proper building with access to the water or they should stay where they are and invest into the property currently leased by them;

the growth in Barrie as of late is rapid and is not well planned. Large tall condo buildings along the water front, condo buildings at Yonge and Mapleview, discussion of art centres on the water...slow it down and let's ensure Barrie is sustainable both environmentally but also long term. Ie. Mapleview/400 traffic issues, friday harbour traffic along mapleview etc

THE PERFORMANCE CENTER IS A MUST HAVE! We don't have anywhere to see a play, concert or any type of performance. It is ridiculous, when you consider the size of this city. The 5 points theater is an embarrassment .If parking is a concern, consider implementing a shuttle service to the performances...use the city buses..give this some thought. We have tons of sports facilities, but nowhere decent to see a play. You could go to dinner and a play, attracting business to downtown restaurants. If it does not go ahead downtown, build it near the old Barrie Central site, where you are considering yet another sports facility that we don't need.

the sea cadets building has always looked unkept and a mess - I've lived in Barrie over 50 yrs and I am no stranger to the waterfront . No wonder they can't parade there . Who ever is in charge of the upkeep - get them replaced . Keep added stress of anything that involves more view obstruction , need for more sparking and building structures away from the waterfront !!!! There are so many more open land spaces away from the lake front in need of attention and occupancy. And if you move the bay as to queens park - there's another open piece of land

that will go to waste and ruin . The only thing to make downtown better is to find help and housing for the homeless and get care for the people in need of mental health .

Very well throughout. We need to maintain our waterfront as a green space for the most part. We need very careful management of this city which will expand dramatically in years to come. Keep it attractive to good businesses and the people will come.

This survey was very biased and worded in a way that some respondents could not answer properly. Please have an epidemiologist review your data collection tools.
Thank you Mr. Green. Our downtown area is beautiful and should not be ruined with sport fields that take over green spaces. This report has great ideas that vitalists the downtown but also preserve Barrie's beauty.

9 : Comments : Question # 1 : Military Cadet groups are operated by and the responsibility of the Armed Forces and the federal government. Stay in your lane and stop interfering in other governments' jurisdiction. Residents of a municipality (such as a city) should not be forced to pay for something which is a federal government responsibility. Stop wasting city residents' money on something which the federal government should pay for.

Q2 : Barrie has spent large sums of residents' money on the McLaren Art Gallery and the Five Points Theatre already. City residents should not be forced to pay for yet another City Council pet project, such as another "performing arts centre" downtown, a few minutes walk from the one we already have (the Five Points Theatre) and a few minutes more from the Art Gallery. Stop wasting our money on silly, pointless, wasteful, frivolous projects that only a small fraction of residents will ever be able to or be interested in using.

Q5 : Residents should not be asked to write a blank cheque (for tens of millions of dollars?) to City government for an unknown corporate company (sports team?) to take over public property for the purpose of taking millions of dollars (event tickets fees, etc.) out of the City and residents' bank accounts just to pad their corporate profits. [...] Tell residents all the details first before asking us to write a huge cheque [...] City Council should begin being open, fully honest and accountable to all city residents; particularly about the financial costs it's proposals, plans and secret deals will impose on city residents for decades or even generations to come. City Council's [...] attitude toward the residents it is supposed to represent needs to be replaced with open, fully honest and fully accountable government and governance practices.

Q8 : Residents should not be forced to pay for a transit ticket with each art or sport even they want to attend; but transit use should be promoted to event ticket buyers (as an added benefit, if event customers want it). After the widespread service cuts the City made to regularly scheduled transit service, many city residents (who didn't have one before) have given up on city transit (just as City Council has) and bought a vehicle instead. Since the city has abandoned the residents of many parts of the city (with it's most recent reductions in regularly scheduled transit service); a transit ticket is useless to many residents because they are now unable to plan when they must depart home, arrive at a bus stop and arrive at a destination because City Council has cancelled regularly scheduled service (which is close to where they live or work, when they need it) in their neighbourhoods and the second class, unscheduled, unreliable, wait-and-hope transit service can't be relied upon to get residents where they need to be within a reasonable amount of time which can be planned for.

Nonetheless, the City should actively promote transit use for event customers to get from their home to and from each event by offering big ticket price discounts for groups of people (to leave their car at home and take transit to and from events). This benefits event customers because they can leave their car safely at home, they don't have to waste time

<p>searching for a parking space or pay for it and they can leave the event safely even if they have had a few alcoholic drinks (by letting the bus driver drive them home). There are some other ideas I have which would help the City get more cars off it's roads (especially during arts or sports events) and entice more people to take transit (especially to festivals, sports and arts events) instead and for which the City could charge more than a regularly priced commuter transit fare. A very well done report Marshall. Much appreciate the effort you have put into this in a very short time. I agree with all the recommendations EXCEPT the use of the waterfront parcel for an arts centre. NO buildings should be constructed between Simcoe Street and the water or Lakeshore Drive and the water. That waterfront area should remain open public space for complete and unfettered use by all members of the public. PERFORMING ARTS CENTRE Placing a building on the Sea Cadet site removes passive public use and destroys the visual waterfront. Architects promises of "world class" and "rival performing arts centres around the world" are either self serving, or dreamland or worse. Barrie may need a performing arts centre but a promised \$65million will become much larger. Guaranteed, The fill in the waterfront is an issue as is the peat and the environmental contamination they are likely to find from the old usage such as an oil, coal and fuel facility in the immediate area before 1970s. Saying nothing about the expense of foundations on the waterfront. Just ask the consultant that constructed the Lakeshore sewers. There are many nearby empty lots that could accommodate a new performing arts centre, say on Bradford Street. The Mayor's "not a \$100million" will come to fruition if they put it at the Sea Cadet site, Surely we can do better than adding \$65million - plus costs paid by the City to our already egregious \$300million debt. A visionary, forward looking proposal, which would put Barrie on an exciting journey. It would bring people to Barrie and revitalize parts of Barrie that are under-utilized.
A well thought out plan. However further discussion is needed on amendments to the plan.
A well-researched Report
About using Queen's park for the Baycats: While it's a great idea to have the team play in Barrie, and possibly downtown, it looks like the field required would overwhelm the park, leaving no room for passive, landscaped areas, as well as squeezing out both the playground and the path crossing from Parkside Drive to Toronto Street, an important link for neighbourhood residents.
The Performing Arts Centre location is ideal - close to downtown and its amenities, and taking advantage of a stunning lakeside location to be enjoyed by attendees, while leaving access along the lakeshore. There is plenty of parking in the area, and more can be developed on City land.
Absolute NO to Southshore sports field.
Absolutely do NOT build a stadium of any kind at the waterfront.
Absolutely no artificial turf area should be placed at Barrie Waterfront. As it is parking is an issue and having a Sports complex with artificial turf will simply make it worse for local enjoyment.
Absolutely no to the proposed sport's facility location at the Lake the old Barrie High School location would be ideal
Absolutely oppose the use of the waterfront for yet another empty sports field

Add fishing docks on the south shore to reduce busy area fishing but increase accessibility for the past time
Add paid by use ebike charging stations with supervision so that people from nearby towns can visit, charge their ebike and be able to make it back home.
This will increase local tourism without increasing the need for more parking.
\$10 to charge an ebike in absolute safety is more appealing to some people than a \$30 parking spot. People want to be outdoor in fresh air if the infrastructure is in place.
Adding a sports complex in downtown Barrie would be a huge mistake. The infant structure that is already there would not be able to handle this and these spaces around the water should be kept into large spaces and parks and places where people in the community can sit. A theatre or a sports complex can go in another area, but these areas should be kept in a way that people can enjoy the waterfront.
Address the drug and homeless situation first. Once that works, move on to revitalizing it! I hate bringing my kids downtown. Meridian place is a joke with junkies everywhere! Try fixing one problem before throwing another in the mix!
Address the homeless and drug use, a lot of people feel unsafe visiting downtown Barrie
Again Marshall is not a planner. So why are his comments being taken so seriously. Ask the city's planners and parks planners for their professional input.
Again to specify the city needs to provide more washroom facilities throughout its park areas and include a cricket field. While I don't know much about cricket I've talked with players who tell me the city has ignored their pleas for a proper cricket field.

Again your questions include a bias towards the Sea Cadets. You raised a safety case. What is it?

The factual information is absent from the report.

I strongly believe that any development towards a multi-use sports facility on the southern shore of the Barrie waterfront be terminated before it even begins. A natural green space is what most cities around the world hold as a necessary part of their infrastructure and community.

Agree that the best use of the southshore area is NOT a large sports field; keeping the majority of it as trails and nature type area is in the best interest of the City and the people.

All these great initiatives have a prerequisite: clean up homelessness, panhandling and high people accosting folks downtown. I'm a regular walker to downtown and beautiful places like meridian square are overrun with homeless people. It's awful.

All downtown spaces will be overwhelmed by the homeless community. These people deserve better, as do the people of Barrie who want to use the outdoor spaces downtown.

All excellent ideas, and needed in this growing City. Sooner the better for all.

All great ideas to bring more zest into the city! I like how it will drive more people to downtown area, where there are amazing restaurants, local shops, and beautiful scenery to admire. However, more police presence and patrol is needed to ensure that these spaces will not be overtaken as encampment sites, or worse, breeding grounds for violence and drugs. We are talking about these spaces for youth, which are vulnerable to these dangers. Please consider fines or arrests for anyone who uses these spaces for encampments, drugs, or irresponsible drug disposal.

All groups need to learn to compromise and work together for an outcome that helps benefit more people and children. The new proposals were full of common sense. It is ridiculous that so many school fields sit empty most of the time. There are ways to work around problems; it just takes sitting down and working on solutions. It is POSSIBLE when you put your mind to it and make it a win win for everyone. It enriches your community ten fold. We have to work together and come up with creative ideas and maybe even make concessions to get where we need to be. If these proposals could come to fruition over time, the downtown would be a much more vibrant place. There is lots more planning to be done to fill in other blanks. But it sounds like a terrific start!

All of Dunlop street, starting from High Street, continuing East, is completely run down looking, buildings need painting, drug addicts removed, meth clinic moved, better parking for longer than 2 hours to encourage shopping and staying downtown, the old Central high school location and abandoned buildings should become a University .

All of these developments are very much needed in Barrie, especially new fields to accommodate quickly growing participation in youth flag football leagues and the extreme need for more youth baseball and softball diamonds. (Youth should not be playing games at 9 or 10 pm because there's no other diamond availability.) However, locating any of these developments close to downtown is not at all advisable. It is no longer a safe area for families. Negative and threatening interactions with drug users and mentally ill individuals are so common, we generally avoid the lakeshore and downtown areas for our children's safety. Please reconsider locating all of these facilities outside of the downtown area. Many people will be hesitant to risk their safety to park or walk in these areas.

It may not prove practical to expand the SS Centre or be too expensive!</p>

<p>Appreciated the vision and collaboration/consultation represented in this report. The emphasis on using existing sports fields is welcomed. Cooperation among field sports organization would help to make better, more effective use of existing lands.</p>
<p>Are used to be so proud to call Barrie my home, Now it is a pit. Not enough police, it takes the police too long to even respond to serious problems. The entire city is a dump.</p>
<p>As a 50 year resident of Barrie I think residents need to be open and accepting of the changing nature of Barrie. We are no longer a sleepy 30k person bedroom community, these changes and upgrades are welcome.</p>
<p>As a city, we have a lot of underused sports facilities. Let's develop in-house and not expand the footprint into 'natural areas' especially along the waterfront. The idea of building a performance arts facility on the waterfront is very wrong-minded. Our waterfront is our most precious feature let's not deface it with buildings and more parking.</p>
<p>As a former track athlete from Barrie I used to have to drive to Midland or York to train. Our new high school has a proper rubberized track that is gated off and locked. This should be open to the public during non school times (summer and weekends when teams aren't using it). Still fenced but simply unlock the fence gate. Not everyone can afford to join the local track club or travel an hour away to other facilities. A track is a huge asset for our city (particularly for our youth and older age groups) and it is a massive shame it is sitting unused and empty majority of the time.</p>
<p>As a high school student currently attending a SCDSB school, I believe it is very important to utilize the empty space we have in our city without impacting forests and natural areas. I find it extremely difficult to understand why SCDSB will not let the community use their fields and tracks as someone who has been disappointed by the lack of open running and playing fields. <p>As a long time resident I am thrilled with these ideas. Barrie has long needed a vibrant downtown and these suggestions would help lead to that. We need reasons for people to want to go downtown or to visit from other cities.</p>
<p>As a long-standing member of The Huronia Symphony Orchestra, I am not alone in my incredulity that a city the size of Barrie has no proper performing arts centre. Many towns on par (Burlington), and smaller (Ancaster) have built beautifully appointed PACs. Time for that to change.</p>
<p>As a resident of queens park, the proposed changes take away most of the open space in the park and wall it off to only a select few. The only reason the baseball diamond is less used is because the city of Barrie and its council have neglected our neighbourhood for so long and let things get way out of hand. And then when people who do not live here complain the solution is to remove infrastructure and stop using the existing facilities. Now because you created a situation where it "isn't used" through neglect you want to wall it off from the community. It is I credibly frustrating. I live here and see how much that park is used everyday. You can't take that away.</p>
<p>As always, the main concern is the parking at the places near the downtown core. The more downtown is developed, the less parking areas we seem to have. It is not fun to go downtown for an event or even for dinner and have to always be jostling for parking or walking from blocks away. Yes, folks could take public transit but I challenge you believe that a majority will.</p>

As an emerging artist in Barrie, I have been impacted greatly by the Canadian Musicians Cooperative and their unique and cutting-edge programs. I think having them connect with the film festival and to create a hub for the arts in Barrie would be an incredible thing, both for the careers of young artists and for the community. I am also a new homeowner in Barrie and am planning to build a family here, having a centre for the arts like this with a theatre close to downtown is something young people like me are looking for when thinking about where we will put down roots

As for my concern about excessive pavement being enlarged near the downtown Art Center, I'm wondering if concert and theatre goers could park in various parking locations in downtown Barrie and be shuttled from those locations to and from the art center, even for a small fee.

As long as South shore does not become a sports complex or anything being built on the area surrounding the south shore.

As long as there is no effect on the environment and natural water shed

As long the city does something about the homeless problem's down town. As of yet it feels unsafe to go downtown alone especially if you have children. Barrie has become increasingly unsafe to walk alone outside let alone down town Barrie. Before the council decides on major construction sites, the mayor should be helping the homeless situation that has become an ever growing concern.

As mentioned earlier. Nothing should be built in the existing area around the lake. (Other than washrooms, change rooms) Filling it in with larger buildings or altering the area for sports takes away from the area. Leave it alone!

As much as I'd love to see the Baycats playing at Queen's Park, parking is already very limited. Would it be possible to locate them to the proposed location for the soccer field on Dunlop. Perhaps that location can serve multiple sports purposes. And if not, then at least make enough parking at this Dunlop location to accommodate the Queen's Park location. People can walk a couple of blocks to see a baseball game.

As reported, there are many properties underutilized in Barrie that could accommodate a soccer field. Not the Southshore area. This proposal was poorly thought out as Green's report verified. [...] As noted, no regard for the impact this development will have on Lake Simcoe, the cost to the taxpayer for maintaining an artificial turf field all year, traffic congestion, no plan for parking etc.... I hope City Council reconsiders.

As someone who walks across the waterfront almost daily unless the city is cleaned up as in the removal of homeless persons their encampments their garbage their use of heritage park benches and gazebo as places to do drugs more and more people don't want anything to do with downtown Barrie. Not many people will feel safe coming to the downtown after dark let alone during the day. The paths are filled with motorized vehicles and are an accident waiting to happen. Smokers under the no smoking signs. Drug users are openly doing them on benches in the bushes and around the buildings along the pathways. Tents and tarps are everywhere. Playing tennis, I have never seen it in use.</p> <p>There is no way that the original proposal for a sports field at Southshore should ever see the light of day.</p> <p>Stop expanding the armed forces memorial area. Enough.</p>
<p>Barrie Baycats should move to the Sadlon Centre area to share existing parking now used for hockey, easy highway access, shopping, restaurants and lighting. Also, an existing bus route. Bayview and Mapleview have already been widened to handle the additional traffic load. All noise is away from residential housing and located in commercial areas.</p>
<p>Barrie Baycats should pay for the Queens Park renovations and maintenance as they are semi-pro.</p>

It's only okay if it is done in a way that won't disrupt the existing environment and only encourages more wildlife

Barrie downtown needs cleaned up. It is filthy and dumpy. It seems anyone can open a store and not enhance the store front to reflect the community. It is like putting lipstick on a pig. Barrie needs investment but projects are always built too small, and limiting opportunities.

Barrie had a rich history of ignoring issues and raising taxes. Break the habit.

Barrie has become inundated with the homeless and drug users. It's not a place residents can attend in the evenings due to the criminality. This needs to be cleaned up.

Barrie has essentially 2 very busy streets, surrounded by several streets waiting to be developed. Why is everything trying to be crammed into one small space? Maybe some actual growth for the city would happen if you tried EXPANDING the downtown area. Why not make Blake St more appealing to the general public? Or Dunlop *west* of the 400? I don't think anyone in Barrie would appreciate an overly populated, Toronto-esque downtown core. I would very seriously consider moving if that was the case. A lot of us came up here to escape that urban hellscape.

Barrie has suffered from sports groups not working together. Mr. Green raises this in his report. Address it. Take steps to help these empires work together for our community.

The skateboard park at Queen's Park also needs to be opened up and made safer. Remove the fencing as a start, now.

Barrie is a growing community, by having all these proposals will add economic stability to the city.

Barrie is a rapidly growing city. It's very easy to clear cut a piece of land to build a new one better or whatever but we must remember that we are supposed to be environmentally conscious and we should be trying to preserve as many trees as we can as we move forward.

Barrie is about much more than sports. The city has many natural settings that provide residents and visitors with opportunities to enjoy beautiful natural surroundings. Trying to mix the two experiences of sporting events with nature settings is flawed and bad for the city of Barrie. There are plenty of suitable areas other than the waterfront that could be utilized for a sports complex. In addition, The Lake Simcoe Region Conservation Authority will never give their approval for a sports field being built beside the lakeshore. The environmental impact to the shore line will be detrimental and destroy the sensitive eco system there. Barrie city council needs to act responsibly, listen to their constituents and start making plans to address the real issues of this city such as homelessness and infrastructure repair. A sports field on the south shore is not a responsible choice.

Barrie is growing rapidly. Keep as much waterfront as possible for residents of today and the future. We will need it.

Barrie is in desperate need of a long course (Olympic) size swimming pool. Markham, Guelph and Sudbury are the closest facilities forcing adequate training and events to be held away from the city. As well, the city lacks adequate basketball courts. There is an immensely

<p>growing interest in volleyball and basketball and not enough permits to allow the city teams adequate practice times. The current city run recreational facilities are inadequate for volleyball and basketball use and seldom offer permits for practice- it's disappointing.</p>
<p>Barrie is not only the waterfront area. Not all new constructions and developments need to happen at our waterfront! Please consider that nature and access to the waterfront are a priority for many residents of this city.</p>
<p>Barrie is not the city it was! And putting all these things in the downtown core is ridiculous! There is no room for sports areas! Where is ever going to park! People who work downtown have to pay for parking it's ridiculous that people who are making minimum wage even afford to pay for parking!! Putting more expensive places to live is also not right all the building that is happening is not helping the little guy or seniors who are on pension! Wake up councillors your city is falling apart!</p>
<p>Barrie NEEDS a large performance venue- at least 500 seats with no shortcuts taken in the development in music/theatre halls.</p>
<p>Barrie needs a new modern skatepark (in addition to Queen's Skatepark). On or across from the lake would give Barrie a bit of a Venice Beach vibe while providing a safe, highly visible facility for families and young adults.</p>
<p>Barrie needs a racquet facility with indoor squash, pickleball, tennis. It could support a facility like this and think it is needed in our town.</p>
<p>Barrie needs a theatre with more seats than 600 seats. I would support a downtown theatre if there were more seats in it. Barrie has no performing arts centre that is large enough for a city of its size.</p>
<p>Barrie needs outdoor hockey rinks in some of its parks. With real boards! To my knowledge there isn't a single one where kids can go and play. Yes we have small skating rinks maintained by community members. But not one has boards where kids can play pick up hockey in the winter. It's embarrassing that Barrie has not taken hockey into consideration with future sports planning.</p> <p>Furthermore, since the Barrie ball hockey club shut down, the city has done nothing to support the ball hockey community. There are thousands that played at the Dunlop facility and frankly nothing was done by the city staff to try and bring the sport back to Barrie. I'm fact, when the planning was done for the sports complex, the city staff had no idea ball hockey was even popular. We used to have 4 rinks that were packed every night and on all weekends!! It is an affordable sport for children to join and play and the fact that our staff had no idea it was here with thousands of members is a cruel joke.</p>
<p>Barrie needs to be much more than a sporto city. The placement of the proposed Performing Arts Centre at the site of the former collegiate school is perfect. It is a large space, with room for parking and complicates traffic flow less than a location further into the downtown where parking is already an issue. Mr. Green's observation that emergency response vehical sirens would be an issue is bizarre: modern theatre spaces are designed to be both light and sound proof. The proposed design is gorgeous and the placement is well thought out. To quote the sportos: just do it! Mr Green was never mandated to interfere with that process.</p>
<p>Barrie needs to start listening to its residence. [...]</p>
<p>Barrie needs to start prioritizing natural areas before there are none left in the City. The Green report is a good start.</p>
<p>Barrie sports should incorporate INDOOR fields for recreational use. The individual facility the city currently has no longer meets growing demand. With over 30 outdoor fields, and only 3 indoor fields; recreational organizations are marginalized into cutting or condescending programmes for the winter months.</p>



<p>Barrie transit needs a revamp. Service is too infrequent to use to attend sports games.</p>
<p>Barrie transit should be fare free all of the time. Public transit should be free for all or it's not really public.</p>
<p>No public money for these sports entities.</p>
<p>Barrie was being revitalized until the government started going easy on drugs and gave so many handouts and freebies to the homeless addicts. If that isn't remedied, then whatever is put together will be ruined. Stop trying to take up the entire waterfront. Leave it as a place for people to enjoy, not restricting it by putting in businesses. Plus there is already too much traffic and not enough parking to start putting in more waterfront businesses.....unless you take up more use of the green space. Leave it be!</p>
<p>Barrie would be a great market for a Professional Baseball Team. If we build a downtown waterfront stadium with the proper amount of seats 6,000+ there is no reason why we couldn't potentially land an affiliated pro baseball team (possibly the Blue Jays A or AA) or at minimum an independent professional team. This venue would be great for other outdoor events such as concerts, if build properly could also host pro soccer. It would be of great value to the businesses downtown to have a stadium downtown and people would eat or go out before and after games.</p>
<p>Barrie, a city of 150,000 people, is woefully underserved with proper performing arts (concerts, stage productions, etc.) facilities. As such, it gives the appearance of an oversized, unsophisticated "Hicktown" (bluntly put). Consider what is typical of other similar sized communities. Barrie has some catching up to do.</p>
<p>Barrie's city planning is a mess. All parking lots should have been set back at least a block from the lake front which would have lessened congestion on lakeshore and provided opportunity for business to engage with people visiting the waterfront. It would have also provided the community more parkland space. A sports complex on the waterfront will take away waterfront & parkland area from a growing community and result in gridlock when combined with the new condo buildings now erected and proposed. There are not enough current roads in and out of the downtown centre to support the resulting increased population and visitors to the waterfront. Unfortunately there is very little room to change this so future approvals of condo development must take in to account best locations for reasonable traffic flow. The waterfront and downtown (along with added arts community) should be a draw for tourists and support use from the entire Barrie community. It should not become a place only for a few who can reasonably make their way through the gridlock.</p>
<p>Barrie's downtown has become a dumping ground for the homeless, transient, and out of town visitors. A person cannot walk through the downtown without being accosted by way of aggressive behaviour, and/or, asking for money from these people. These people are now grouping in larger numbers, leaving behind garbage, used clothing, and bodily fluids. Some days it's quite disgusting and disturbing. What few shops the downtown has remaining will likely be gone in five years. Weekends along the waterfront is the same. I imagine the cost of cleaning these areas daily is high.</p> <p>Barrie and it's surrounding areas have plenty of space for sports facilities already established, and space that can be used for that purpose without destroying the national habitat in order to build. I would like to see the the focus on what I hear the residents of Barrie talk about every single day; the homeless, the garbage, and the disappointing fact that these huge, unaffordable condominiums are taking over the waterfront.</p>
<p>Barrie's downtown unfortunately has become the place to avoid, due to it becoming unsafe in recent years. The city should take charge and do what's needed to make downtown safe again.</p>

Barrie's waterfront is a NATURAL gem. Keep it that way. Yes, the downtown is crumbling, but revitalizing is more than buildings. The congestion is a glaring issue that needs to be addressed first.

Bay cats at Queens Park is not a good idea for traffic and parking would be an issue! If this was not a problem, then a downtown ball field would be attractive, like other cities!

The homeless situation is a problem for any revitalizing! The Meridian Square is not attractive, as these folks congregate here! Facilities need to be clean and safe for all citizens and to attract participation / attendance! Another city had a problem at a sports park where parents refused to allow their kids to play team sports at the park, with many homeless congregated at the park!

Bay cats belong at their home in midhurst they deserve the respect to remain a part of all the young teams and community growing up around them playing ball on diamonds they once played on as kids not shoved into a crappy neighbourhood on some nasty field next to a skate park that's usually full of people drinking or doing drugs. No one who supports the bay cats wants to bring their family to a field like that, where they feel they are in danger or where their children might be exposed to some sort of drug related danger in the downtown core which we all know there is no shortage of. I think it's great to bring an arts performance centre and a new location for the sea cadets and to make more things to do for people who aren't from Barrie but I think what's important is cleaning up the streets. Putting more officers on patrol stoping the drug problems getting the drug addicts out of town like they should be, take the people smoking crack off the street corners and the people using needles in alley ways water front and fitness trails destroying our waterfront and downtown core with needles and visible drug use. transit and will be eager to eat in downtown restaurants before going to a sporting event or to the performing arts center.

Bradford St from DunlopSt/High St to Tiffin St/Essa Rd should be part of the Downtown Revitalization plan and made a high priority to improve the area and have it connect to Dunlop St making it a cohesive and continuous Downtown core and having it linked better to the Waterfront/Centennial Beach.
Brilliant
Brilliant ideas. There does need to be further indoor sports complex options as our weather only allows for outdoor sports use for a few short months of the year. Another large indoor sports dome needs also to be considered in future. Maybe at the Barrie Sports Park or across the road.
Brilliant revitalization of downtown—this will make Barrie a true city with a heart .
Brilliant! Common sense suggestions.
Build it some place else !!
Build more minor sport areas. Barrie is useless for keeping up with the demand of people moving to the area for recreation. These things should all be downtown and stop playing to the vocal minority that's stopping recreation and cadet and parade areas being built. A public track field so Barrie can host track events! Seriously get things moving. We are looking to move out of Barrie due to the lack of public sporting spaces.
Build the field on lakeshore. Nobody uses the land
Build the intended sports field
Build these places like "they will come" because they will.
Build up the immediate downtown core facing the waterfront. All the bars and restaurants on Dunlop (from the former Hooters down to Bayfield) should have patios and a boardwalk out the back. Get rid of all that parking. Offer people a place they can sit and see the water and have a meal and beverage. This will attract people downtown, not a performing arts centre. This will also bring in tourists.
Building the queens park field for the baycats would only allow hardball to be played on that field, leaving out girls softball and slow pitch. Although I'd love to see the baycats intown for accessibility, queens park doesn't have the parking for those that attend currently and Public transit is awful in this city! They ask for one night a week unlike big clubs taking multiple days and times to be left unused. Sports keeps people occupied and out of trouble! Whatever is decided to

be built, please keep the WHOLE community in mind. This is going to be a big moment for Barrie and I am excited to see what happens!
By moving the sea cadets to a new location we have an opportunity to create something that would attract people on a daily basis, year round, to meet, eat and enjoy the waterfront. We do not need yet another empty arts facility that is publicly funded.
Calling it a "revitalized downtown" is a bit of a misnomer, as when I hear that, I have visions of a vibrant shopping area, complete with grocery and clothing stores, pedestrian walkways, and an overall atmosphere of peaceful beauty. The new condo buildings will mean that stores will have a built-in base to draw from, and that will lead to revitalization. Can the tennis courts at Queens Park be configured for use by tennis players and pickleball players?
Can we make some of these proposals make them have gates for the areas because of Barrie's homelessness problem, they might get in and take over the spot and it might be a dangerous spot for families with young children.
Can we renew the downtown splashpad? It's so old and doesn't work half the time. 1 splashpad for such a huge city is not enough!
Can't stop progress.
Canadian music co-op joining with performing arts downtown

<p>Congratulations to all in the city and on council for listening and allowing Marshall Green to research and provide his analysis and recommendations to us all.</p> <p>City Council does need to reassess its priorities. There are three lists: Must Do; Should Do; Nice to Do. The P.A.C. falls under the third list. The Major Sports opportunity falls under the second. Downtown revitalization is in the first category. I have no brilliant ideas to accomplish that, but until that happens, no P.A.C. is going to bring more people downtown, especially not at night. Our downtown is quite tiny for such a big city, thus the homeless and the users are clustered in a small area. With the Province's new focus on rehab, I believe that every ward in Barrie should be required to have a rehab centre, ones with a phased approach: intervention; education; support; housing. At the moment, addicts encounter each other in the downtown core everyday, which makes it difficult for those who wish to turn their lives around to extract themselves from the situation. There also needs to be an improved aesthetic for downtown businesses and storefronts. Incentives such as reductions in business taxes could be considered or interest free loans from the city to undertake such enhancements. I used to enjoy strolling around downtown, but it has gone so far downhill, I avoid it. I don't even feel like going out to a restaurant at night as I sometimes feel unsafe.</p>

I am assuming that the parade ground will not massively affect this due to the smaller size proposed.

I like the idea of creating a sports complex elsewhere in the city, as long as sufficient planning is in place for parking and traffic increases in the surrounding area.

I don't feel that the Baycats should move to downtown. This particular area of the city is unsafe to visit and as such we would not attend games or even feel comfortable parking in the near vicinity, given the increase in violence, theft and car break ins in recent months. The city needs to resolve the issues downtown so that residents will feel comfortable there before adding any new facilities. There needs to be an increased police presence city wide and a better response to residents concerns.

I agree with using these spaces as multi-use spaces to help boost the community. It's also a great step towards giving our downtown area back to Barrie citizens, especially if we can come up with a solution to our downtown substance abuse and homelessness issue.

I am concerned about the lack of parking in all these proposed projects. It appears approx 40 spots list at SouthShore, a whole lot lost at the proposed performing arts site, very limited parking at Victoria Park, etc.

There is still no information provided on how the SouthShore will be developed for the Sea cadets, how construction will impact the Canoe&Kayak or Rowing clubs both during construction or once complete.

I am excited to preserve our natural areas and have a revitalized downtown area.

I am glad if the city reserves south shore as green space for the use of everyone. Will bring citizens down to enjoy that area of Barrie for all of the right reasons. Most of all keeping the Allandale Station Park area as natural greenspace, an educational place and a place for ALL is the best and most sensible decision!!! Thank you Marshall Green for your common sense input and all of your work.</p>
<p>I am very concerned about parking and congestion. Especially at Southshore, queens park, and the new performing arts location. I adamantly demand that the city allow residents to park for free in more parking lots in walking distance to the area where these new teams and patrons will be attracted to. I also ask that consideration be given to increasing the number of parking spots available along Southshore around the new cadet area.</p>
<p>I am VERY excited that Marshall Green has been involved in this plan but am still wary of Counsel's hurry to rush these plans in the past. The hasty efforts to sneak in a mega sports field by Southshore, without adequate research or planning, was terrifying. This survey gives me hope that the downtown plans may consider our opinions while being rolled out in a slower and more reasonable manner. I get that an international offer from a sports team may bring money and tourists to Barrie, however, shiny things and big promises need to be considered in great detail before we end up decimating the already beautiful community that we have here in Barrie!</p>
<p>I am very happy with Marshall Green's report. It's great that he is actually looking for places for sports teams that don't involve ruining Barrie's waterfront.</p>
<p>I am very thankful that Marshall volunteered his time and expertise to assist with this issue. While I appreciate the funding will be a challenge, it seems a plan with some inclusive vision.</p>
<p>I believe Allandale station has the opportunity to do something other cities cannot do, Preserve nature and should be a place for everyone to walk, observe nature and wildlife. As such allowing educational plaques pointing out native plants, and wildlife. This would be a great field trip location for Primary grades. Potentially becoming an outdoor education site.</p>
<p>I believe implementing all of the Marshall Green report recommendations will create a vibrant city and will attract more tourism dollars. I also believe the naturalized area of the waterfront (Allandale Station Park) should be designated environmentally protected land for future generations and to prevent other future attempts to destroy this vital ecosystem.</p>
<p>I believe it's important to insure adequate parking is available. Also adequate police presence for all these venues. Sadly at present I do not feel especially safe going into the downtown</p>

<p>area. Also PLEASE makes sure the SEATING in the cultural centre is NOT AS CRAMPED as at the Five Points Theatre. Anyone over 5.5 ft has their knees under their chin there!</p>
<p>I believe that the Canadian Musicians Coop and Barrie Film Festival having a central location for creatives to flourish and deliver their art would be enriching to the community and help connect people of all ages and backgrounds. In addition to having a home for all program activities year round, such a large space to host events and help build careers would certainly be exciting.</p>
<p>I believe that the Marshall Green report was spot on when it came to the municipal governments proposal. Kudos for stating the obvious for this location</p>
<p>I believe that these spaces could work amazingly with the collaboration of the Canadian Musicians Co-operative and the Barrie Film Festival. Such a space could lead to exciting and innovative performances and venues for all sorts of artistic mediums.</p>
<p>I believe that this council should listen to what is in the report. Further that they need to have more public consultation on matters that affect the community at large. It's time they listen to what the tax payers are saying and actually listen and not just give lip service,</p>
<p>I believe that with Barrie establishing a Performing Arts Centre it would open up the number of jobs for people searching for a place to call home, especially in the music industry with the Canadian Musicians Cooperative Inc. Considering how much the Canadian Musicians Cooperative Inc. already does for the community and for its members with the resources and funding they have already, as well as the Barrie Film Festival, it is exciting to think about all the wonders they will be able to achieve working together with all-year-round funding. <p>I can't understand why the city of Barrie is responsible for the sea cadets-are they not a branch of DND? Isn't it their responsibility?</p>
<p>I cannot rely on Barrie Transit to conveniently get you to these venues or anywhere else in Barrie especially since TOD started. Far too inconvenient and time consuming. I feel like my high property tax is giving me way less since TID</p>
<p>I commend and thank Marshall for all the effort he and his supporters have put into this report. Every growing city needs a balance of planning for a wide variety of citizens, with anticipation of the needs for the future. I'm not asking or suggesting that sporting events get less attention than they currently enjoy, but I wholeheartedly believe that more attention, planning and finances should be going into the necessary infrastructure to make the Downtown a destination with historical signage, safe and attractive public spaces, patios, art installations, museums, galleries, concert venues, family friendly attractions and pedestrian only walking zones. We need to celebrate the people and ALL their contributions. The arts and sciences are not a threat to those who enjoy and benefit from sports; we complement each other. And, not that you asked, but I think the elimination of safe injection sites is a deadly mistake.</p>

<p>I do believe the waterfront should remain "wild" as far as being open and available to all.</p>
<p>I do like the idea of the Barrie bay cats playing in Barrie, however, this is definitely not the spot for them to play as it would be a major downgrade on all fronts.</p>
<p>I do not agree with any tree removal in the south shore section where the multipurpose field was proposed. Any construction or building should be reusing spaces that are under used as it is, or repurposing vacant lots.</p>
<p>I do not support building ANY buildings around the waterfront park areas. There are other locations for the Sea Cadets. And certainly there are other locations for a performing arts centre. We need the most park space for people--open areas, trees, playground facilities but NOT buildings even if they are for people to use. The waterfront property cannot be restored once buildings are put on it: it is our most finite space. It must be protected as Barrie grows in all directions, especially 'skyward' with condo developments. And the soccer development? I said "Yes" as long as proximity to Dunlop does NOT mean the waterfront.</p>
<p>I do not support the Baycats in Queen's park if it includes building more outbuildings along the creek where more mature growth trees would have to be cut down (Nuttall already removed a considerable amount of tree growth in this park in 2023 for no other reason but to make it inhospitable for homeless people - who still camp there regardless). We need mature, old growth trees in our parks and city to counter climate change and keep our cities cool, rather than the heat trap of concrete they are becoming which is inhospitable to all - not just the homeless. Many homes/apartments in that area don't have air con (mine included), so removing trees is just causing our cities to get hotter and more dangerous for citizens. The Allendale South park should be rezoned as environmentally protected land and there should be active, intentional rediversifying of the passive park with native Ontario grassland species.</p>
<p>I do not support the creation of a parade ground on the waterfront. Additional construction in close proximity to our water is detrimental to our most precious resource from which we obtain our drinking water. A parade ground does not need to be located on the waterfront or dedicated to this organization. A multi-purpose field in another part of the city which can be shared is suggested. Additionally, I don't believe that Barrie can sustain a theatre the size of the proposed construction. This is going to turn into another closed and boarded structure. I don't believe that Queen's Park has sufficient parking however their season is short and their following is not extensive - that seems realistic. Would love to hear more about how the city plans to action item #4 - could you please include mandating the schools to rent out their gym space on evenings and weekends for sports and organizations that desperately need this space? Lastly what research has been done to ensure that these areas do not belong to our Native People? See the train station for details. How many millions were spent restoring a property that has sat literally unused for over 6 years.</p>
<p>I do not support the development or inclusion of any sporting field along the waterfront. Barrie's water front is a gem! It has always been for the people to come and enjoy and explore. The development of features that are for specific uses and detract from the beauty and function should be located elsewhere. I do agree Barrie needs more sports fields, especially soccer, but not at the water front. Bradford Street would be a good option with close proximity to downtown but not detracting from the water. As well, any sports field needs ample parking. Our waterfront and downtown already have limited parking, which hinders access, especially for accessibility. I am a soccer parent, one kid in house league and one in rep. I am also a life long resident of Barrie. I have supported the money invested in our waterfront and the redesign of Lakeshore Drive, but a sports field in this area is a terrible idea. That's a separate purpose and needs to be located elsewhere in the City. I grew up playing baseball at Queen's Park. Traffic is already difficult to navigate in that area, having major sports field there for events would further complicate that. Also, I have no interest in</p>

<p>taking my children downtown on a public bus in the evenings. If the bus was a shuttle service for that event, similar to Kempenfest, I'd consider public transit. Also, I would support an artificial turf field elsewhere in Barrie, or even with an industrial area. I have been to many sports complexes out of province and out of country with my child. Consideration needs to be given for parking! Thank you for taking the time to review everyone's submissions.</p>
<p>I do not think that we should build any sports fields on the Lakeshore. There are plenty of other areas in the city to build sports facilities. An area as special as the Lakeshore should remain as natural as possible and accessible to every citizen of Barrie</p>
<p>I don't agree with removing too many native tree species on the south shore. Many invasive species can be found there, but I think city resources should be spent on maintaining native ecosystems and planting more native tree and shrub species.</p>
<p>I don't believe the decades moving in to the Southshore Centre has been properly reviewed as to how it will impact the existing users of the Southshore Centre (Barrie Rowing Club and the Canoe and Kayak club).</p>

<p>I don't think a sports field at the Southshore centre is a good idea as it would destroy the natural feel and look of the waterfront that so many of us enjoy. I would like to see the waterfront left the way it is and to not see more parking lots. There must be a better location</p>
<p>I don't think a theatre/performing arts centre, where people go to sit in the dark, is the best use for waterfront property. Would love to see an expansion of the marina to include a waterfront restaurant...or some use that would allow for more enjoyment of the view.</p>
<p>I don't think Queen's Park is big enough for the proposed changes</p>
<p>I don't want to see a beautiful, nature filled water front scarred with ugly buildings for sports/parading. Having these so close to the water is a visual eye sore and poses potential risks to the water quality. Those events can happen away from the water front.</p>
<p>I don't want to see a sports park around the water front or downtown area of Barrie. I have been a resident within a block of the water for 13 years and enjoy everyday going down for walks with my family and enjoying the nature and water views of provides. Also enjoy the access to downtown restaurants and cafes. I don't want to see that change and add more congestion and change the beautiful view of our waterfront.</p>
<p>I don't know enough about the Sea Cadet's needs to comment on the location, but I agree we should support their move to a new facility. I feel strongly that the waterfront should remain accessible to the public. Especially with intensification, as the people of Barrie need access to green space, and especially considering our high property taxes, we should all have access to it, and no part should be for private use. I was not able to open the Marshall Green Report in the format provided.</p>
<p>I don't see enough parking for suggested uses</p>
<p>I don't think we need a sports field on our waterfront. You should move it to an open field where there is room to expand.</p>
<p>I don't want to see trees and parkland removed along the lakeshore to put in a sports complex. Please don't take away the beauty of the water front that is already there.</p>
<p>I especially like the idea of having the bay cats actually play within Barrie. As someone who uses public transit, it's highly inconvenient to attend games, to the point that I normally don't even bother</p>

<p>I feel it's important to rezone Allandale Station Park as environmentally protected land, with active intentional rediversification of the passive park with native Ontario grassland species. Thank you very much for the opportunity to share ideas via this survey.</p>
<p>I feel that all of Mr. Green's proposals are excellent.</p>
<p>I feel the downtown core is too developed and busy as it is. I think development should occur on the outskirts for sports activities and leave downtown for small venues, restaurants and the waterfront. Parking is getting harder to find and by adding more venues, it will only make it worse. Right now public transit is very limited but if the frequency of service improved, I would be more inclined to check it out.</p>
<p>I feel we spend a lot of money on projects in the city that are for "fair weather" we live in a city that spends many months of the year in inclement conditions. I would prefer to see projects that could be used in these months. I feel we definitely could use a large performing art center . I feel the center would "revitalize " what ever area it was situated in. I dont feel that the waterfront needs revitalization. [...] Maybe try canvassing the general population next time.</p>
<p>I firmly support Marshall's report and underscore the importance of not putting a multi use sport field near the lake, near Lakeshore or near the Southshore Centre. There are many areas throughout the city for the sports field and its artificial turf. Let's preserve the beautiful park surrounding Kempenfelt Bay - a true jewel inthe heart of our city. Let's work together together to find a humane solution to the homeless situation in downtown Barrie. This above all else will bring people back to the downtown.</p>
<p>I fully support Marshall Green's report with the exception of the location of the performing arts center and the baycats playing downtown. There should be no buildings on the lakeshore, this area should be kept free for people to enjoy. The performing arts center could be built on the parking lot on the NE corner of Bayfield and Simcoe St or on the old Central Collegiate site. Having the Baycats play at Queen's Park will create havoc for parking and crowds, especially, as you noted, with the densification of downtown. They should be playing in a less crowded area that will not impact area residents.</p>
<p>I fully support Marshall Green's report. Humans and animals NEED nature for there well being DO not destroy our water front with this ridiculous sports field. We need as much nature as possible to help fight climate change (trees).</p>
<p>I fully support the meadow and woodlot remaining environmentally protected. The other suggestions sound great if the funds are there, but I'd rather see a reduction in taxes, than all the other suggestions.</p>
<p>I have concerns about the parking at Southshore. There are private events there that block off half of the parking lot all day on weekends even though the events may only be on the evening. It looks like there will be even less parking now where the proposed new site is going to be. Will there be more additional parking spots in the area?</p>
<p>I have lived in Barrie for 25 years. Have worked in the core of Barrie. Used to visit the waterfront everyday and walk along Dunlop downtown. Have not been there for 12 years. Not safe, too congested, can barely see the lake anymore with all the apartments built there. Just nothing there to entice me to go there anymore. Very sad!</p>
<p>I have lived in Barrie since 1958 & celebrate Sunnidale Park & Arboretum plus our beautiful lakeside parks & walking trail. Parking is an ever present problem & I don't want to see any sports venue on any of the lakeside property.</p>
<p>I have not seen his report except for the bits you have quoted.....BUT I hope you will not be in a rush to develop every bit of green space. Green space is lovely as is. We shouldn't be in a hurry to develop every inch of it now. Time will probably help to determine the best use of it.....and that might even be to let it stay green.</p>

<p>I have read the full report and applaud Marshall for the work done to come up with these recommendations. I live in the downtown area and would love to see all of these proposals come to fruition.</p>
<p>I hope greenspace is preserved, and the image remains more for a natural and relaxed environment. I have heard concerns about disrupting the environment and having it replaced with more toxic and less sustainable materials. The public deserves to continue to have refuge from city living.</p>

<p>I like leaving natural spaces in cities rather than overdeveloping. I like the idea of adding sports fields in the newer developments as part of the development planning rather than overloading the current facilities. It would also spread the vehicles out further. Too much on the lakeshore spoils the natural beauty of the lakeshore and just deposits too many vehicles in the city core.</p>
<p>I like the forward thinking, it has been long overdue for some big community projects.</p>
<p>I like the idea of as many outdoor activity and non-sports related enjoying of the waterfront near the Southshore Centre.</p>
<p>I like the idea of Barrie Baycats playing downtown however the current site does not allow for very much parking.</p>
<p>I like the idea of the Baycat's playing in Barrie but there wouldn't be enough parking where the proposal site is.</p>
<p>I liked the proposes in Mr. Green's report very much, especially the Performance Centre- although it should have much more seating, at least 900, and keeping the southern shoreline as a park that everyone can enjoy!</p>
<p>I live at Watercrest on Maple. The proposed plan for 6 bus stops would leave the residents without proper access including garbage. Why can we not find any information about this project on Barrie web site! The whole plan would be better served if moved north of Dunlop. Think about it. Transit free with tickets or additional charge?</p>
<p>I live downtown - I am originally from TO and value a well run transportation system that is frequent and reliable. Issues around parking would be alleviated with a good transportation system. As well, creating a vibrant, fun centre full of cultural events to attract all ages is a must. I remember Toronto before Harbourfront and having lots of activities and creating</p>

partnerships with community groups will help facilitate a vibrant downtown. That also means having spaces for those organizations that need affordable locations.

I live downtown with my partner and 3 small children. As much as we love it, unfortunately, the Busby Centre and the Collier Church breakfast has taken a toll on Poyntz Street where we reside.

Many morning/nights we find people on our front step, used needles in our driveway, waking up to people screaming in psychosis, men screaming at their partners about drug money owed. The list goes on. I find Poyntz Street to be one of the best streets in Barrie. I own a business downtown, I shop at the Farmers Market and try to keep all my expenses to local businesses in the downtown core.

My partner and I struggle because we want to continue to raise our children and stay downtown but what our children see is not what children that live in subdivisions see.

Our neighbour- widower at age 77- lives 5 houses up Poyntz and her home was broken into a few months ago. The neighbour directly across the streets house is vandalized constantly. Our vehicles are broken into and our bikes are stolen every summer.

If you want our City's centre to thrive, we need to move Busby Centre away from it. Living here and seeing what the ripple effect it has had on our businesses, home owners and seeing the influence it has had on our children, is not something you would ever want in your neighborhood.

I love Barrie, it has been my home for the past 3 years. We need more events, festivals to bring in tourism and with that money to our local stores and restaurants. We need a proper farmers market like St. Lawrence in Toronto (big city) and St. Jacobs Market (super small city). We need more food trucks and big screen to watch games together (Leafs, Raptors) as a community. like Rendezviews in Toronto. We need a Christmas market like all cities in Europe, even small ones, so we can still go downtown even in the winter. It's sad to see how the city is empty during winter, and it doesn't need to be. All of this brings the community together and money to our businesses.

Besides that, please do something regarding our safety in downtown. Add a police both, a police trailer, anything to show police's presence. Most of the time we are afraid to frequent downtown because of the amount of chemical dependents wondering in the area.

Thank you for giving voice to the community.

I love downtown Barrie but I genuinely don't feel safe taking my kids downtown anymore with all of the very open drug use and homelessness. As wonderful as these improvements are, I would be hard pressed to use them until the safety concerns are addressed.

I love how development of the downtown is a priority, I think some focus should also be spent looking at streets further up from the waterfront such as Bradford st. Still downtown with ample space but quite rather untouched. Allowing for more smaller business and a unique shopping appeal could allow events like kenpenfest to have a better impact on local economy. Expanding the opportunity to allow people to shop will make shopping in downtown more appealing as it will be more worth people's time to visit. Also as Metrolinx is currently working on having consistent trains running both ways on the Barrie line up to Aurora and eventually Allendale, shortening the gap people have to travel and walk to reach what Barrie has to offer could also pull more tourism towards the downtown.



I love sports and support more community sports parks or centre's. However, please do NOT use the south shore location, it is a wonderful natural habitat and nature needs to be a visible and accessible part of our awesome waterfront. Absolutely open up schools for community use after hours and weekends. It's our tax dollars, give the community access. The above questions about the sea cadets are too vague to answer. there already exists space and a building downstairs of the southshore community centre, it needs to have a very small footprint if it goes ahead.

I love the efforts being made to add amenities and bring more people downtown. The truth of the matter is no one feels safe going downtown anymore. So as much as you try, unless those on drugs and the crazy amount of tents are dealt with no one will take full advantage. Right now so many more non residents use our downtown and waterfront than residents.

I love the idea of bringing more activities for the public downtown and revitalizing the downtown area, but as it stand now my three kids (14,12&10) are scared to go downtown or to the beach because of the homeless population and the junkies erratic behaviour. I believe these issues would need to be addressed first

I love the idea of revitalization, but as stated above, the downtown area needs to have the crime and drug use and unhoused dealt with FIRST.

I love these suggestions! It would be amazing to see a new running track in downtown Barrie as well.

I love this report. Marshall Green's report mirrors much of what I had envisioned for Barrie. I had not given thought to the Theatre and Arts aspect, however that too, is a great idea! The triangle that has been proposed, is an area that seriously needs attention! Queens Park was always a hub of sports activity with baseball teams of all ages, and it is a shame to have the diamond sit idle. I played on that diamond, my girls played on that diamond, and I was a spectator at many games. Then, there is the torn down Central Collegiate with the Fisher Auditorium. It too was a very busy place. Now a very sad site. I attended that high school and went to various productions in the auditorium. To resurrect and bring sports and entertainment to these spaces for our city, is without a doubt, the right thing to do! I am a lifelong resident of Barrie, and recently I considered moving away, but these recommendations have made me feel hopeful, and even excited. I absolutely agree with the recommendation to designate the Allandale Station Park as an environmentally protected area to conserve this very special area. I walk these trails daily. The educational component is a great idea, and I will help with plantings in the area. Many thanks to Mayor Nuttall for listening to the people and to Marshall Green for his time, knowledge, coordination, and collaboration with the many parties involved. I am in awe at how much was accomplished in such a short time to create this report and for his honesty of what will be required by many to make this a reality. I agree that it is going to be necessary for contributions of all sorts and cooperation by many. Many hands, many contributors, the lighter the load. "Eyes" and "Ears" have been opened!! A fresh look at revitalizing the downtown and Barrie sports!!

I moved here from Toronto because of the beautiful waterfront. Keep it as is and use that money to build up downtown. Think Leslieville and Riverdale vibe. It needs to be a place people want to gather. Send Ontario Works office, other social service agencies and shelters away from downtown/waterfront. It will clean up quickly!

I moved to Barrie 10 years ago and one of things that sold me was the gorgeous waterfront and I'm very unhappy about this proposal of a new waterfront sports complex and I know there's plenty of other places to build it.

I noticed the south end lands adjacent to the Sadlon Centre and in close proximity to the proposed YMCA in Barrie have not been discussed in the Mr. Green's proposal. Rather than using this area solely for an off-leash dog park, could this be better utilized as available land next to two large Athletic type facilities (with parking near-by). If this land housed a lit sports field, adequate seating, all surrounded by an all-weather running track I am sure that there could be many top quality area and regional events for schools and colleges accommodated here year round. Would work for the Barrie Rovers, other local soccer groups, perhaps amateur track clubs, YMCA members, and even a cricket field.

Overall, I would fully support Mr Green's report as opposed to what the City of Barrie staff and council were pushing through without the needed consultation with the taxpayers. Greenspace along the waterfront needs to be protected by the City of Barrie for everyone to enjoy. Thanks for having this survey.

I read the Marshall report and feel that I don't fully understand the needs of the soccer club who originally proposed the use of the naturalized south end of the waterfront. I disagree with this location for them but I'm hesitant to provide feedback on using schoolyards etc. I suspect there are restrictions for these kinds of outside usage. If not, then great.

I really like the proposed arts centre. The downtown location by the waterfront is a perfect spot.

I really think that there is other fields that could be used....without building one at the waterfront...great idea to have the Baycats here.

I said no to the question above because I live in the downtown core and have parking here.

I see a great deal of time, effort, vision & expertise has been invested in this report by a number of individuals and groups, congratulations to all of the participants. I see this report/recommendations as being a stepping stone for the City of Barrie to finally start the rejuvenation of the City centre, it's long overdue. Hopefully the Meridian Centre & cenotaph area will be utilized with more respect.

I see no introduction for more pet friendly locations, specifically dog parks. More people means more pets and not all dog friendly parks are accessible for city residents. I feel a dog park in place of another sports team facility is more inclusive for non-sports citizens.

I sincerely hope this council can see many direct and equally important indirect spin-off benefits the entirety of the Marshal Green report recommendations would bring to heart of our city. This bold proposal is legacy building. Be bold.

I strongly agree with Mr. Green's report recommendation #2 - to not develop the Lakeshore Sports Park

I strongly agree with the proposals to give more opportunities to youth and high school athletics.

I strongly disagree with a drill field /sports field on the South Shore. The Cadets could use the Armouries for drill. I also would like to see the beaches & parks better controlled for to keep dogs off the beaches, keep the beaches clear of tents & ensure only city supplied barbecues are used

I strongly support any effort to revitalize downtown Barrie. The shops and restaurants and parks and waterfront are really suffering due to urban poverty - homelessness, drug use, etc. The Bugsy Centre and Salvation Army shelter need to be relocated out of sight from the commercial/tourism/recreation areas. No one feels safe going downtown in Barrie any more - even during the day. There are addicts shooting drugs, leaving their used needles behind and being aggressive to pedestrians at all times of the day. This is not acceptable. There is so much potential in downtown Barrie and the waterfront. Stop prioritizing drug addicts over families and citizens who just want to eat out or go to the park or the beach without being accosted by drug addicts.

I strongly support the recommendation that the Southshore area is not a good location for a new Large Sport Complex. I concur that the area is best suited to passive recreation such as walking trails.

I support Marshall's proposal 100%

I support what Marshall Green has recommended, however, a new performing arts centre should offer more seating. With Barrie growing fast in population, I would like to see the minimum amount of seating available be at least 1000.

I think all of Mr.Green's ideas would be a wonderful addition to downtown Barrie. The west end of dunlop needs some attention and to be revitalized. I live at Toronto St and Simcoe St so I would be directly effected by the changes but I think it would be a great thing. Especially using vacant land to build a soccer field.

I think any development should remain in public hands. The for-profit private sector should be kept away from any waterfront redevelopment.

I think building the performing Arts center on the waterfront is an extremely bad idea. It will block off too much of the waterfront view that Barrie is know for, especially coming down Bayfield Street. It will also separate Heritage Park from the rest of the waterfront. We need to keep the flow and the beauty Barrie currently has. Moving the cadets and opening the sports field near the South shore community center is needed, useful and long overdue. Plus, it will attract wildlife. Not hinder it as the big boxes of the performing arts buildings will do. Why not use the old baseball diamond at Queen's park and put the performing Arts center there? More parking, easy access to busses, a neighborhood that has been revitalizing. An easy walk to downtown and condos. Plus, the tennis courts and playground can be kept for use as well. If anything is going to go where the old cadets is, make it another open, proper, band stand. A spot for all the band's our weekend events draw through the year. A spot that can host the bands for New year's celebrations, and host the OLG sponsored bands during Kempenfest. Instead of having to block roads and build a stage each time. Just please do not block the view of the beauty Barrie is known for.

I think development in stages is key. Any development should carry some sort of revenue generation on that site (not just tourism dollars). Hosting GBSSA Finals and Championships (short and long term) should be a goal for our city as the the largest city in the region, and a good bartering chip with School Board to allow city sports on their fields.

I think having a performing arts centre would be absolutely wonderful and facilitate collaboration while deepening community within Barrie. It would be amazing to see the Ontario Musicians Co-operative and Barrie Film Festival potentially join forces leading to success for creatives and spotlighting Barrie's local talent. I would love nothing more than to be able to see this plan come to fruition. I support it fully!

I think that a collaboration between the Canadian Musicians Co-operative and the Barrie film festival in regards to the performing arts center would greatly benefit our community by promoting the creation of high quality art and culture within our city, attracting talent from all over to come perform, live and thrive in our city.

I think that the theatre is an interesting idea, but we already have Meridian Place and the Five Points performing arts centres downtown. There is a lack of parking and homelessness is a problem down there especially after dark

I think that with the Canadian Musicians Co-operative having a suitable home for programming we could have it run year round. Having a close proximity to the heart or Barrie (Downtown) would be symbolic and meaningful. Being in the same building as a Film studio we could collaborate and make something amazing in Barrie.

I think the bay cats moving down makes great sense than more people could actually get to and enjoy the games. The only thing I don't like is the artificial turf suggestion for the soccer field being downtown near the south shore we have so many other vacant land spots that are eyesore that could be and should be used

I think the Baycats should stay where they're located now and other soccer teams should take advantage of the parks and parking space that has been allotted for our use by Springwater Township!

i think the city should do something to make the tiffin boat launch more functional. The current piers are leaning and hazardous they also need a proper moaring area so that boats are not blocking the ramp when parking vehicles. And making an in and out lane and removing the single trailer parking spot where the current back up lane exists would also increase flow of the launch. Also more policing of the parking lot in general would be helpful as many people not using the ramp park cars there and have zero regard for trailer clearances making it hard to maneuver in the lot

And can we increase the use of the barrie aports complex in the north end instead of moving the baycats to Queens Park? Parking is key. People with kids are not going to haul baseball and coolers and food and chairs on transit.

I think you need to be mire specific about what west Dunlop means. Also think about how tall of a building the performing arts centre would be. Aesthetically speaking do you really want to block view of the bay with something that is not used everyday?

I think: 1. Barrie needs to think about the WHOLE picture ...like space, road access, noise,etc We have some interesting ideas happening lately BUT let's be practical abt some of it.

2. If we start some projects, please, let's finish them!!!!

3. Let's not put alllll this money into these sports venues and have the homeless camp out in them in the end!! We HAVE to address this!

4. I'd really like to see Barrie council START by doing these meetings and surveys FIRST rather than sneak things in and then get stopped and have to back track. The people of Barrie will not trust anything you do if this keeps up. Barrie is still small town and wants to feel like the people are an important part of what is happening here.

5. Other than all that...we have some really great ideas flowing. But my favorite is the Baycats at Queens Park. I would love to see Queens Park used more!! I would see the Baycats way more often.

I thought this was a fabulous report. It provides an extremely exciting vision for the future of Barrie. If we are to grow to 300,000 residents, we need to think long term in planning. This is the time to kick off a vision to revitalize Downtown and really put Barrie on the map. I enthusiastically agree with every one of Marshall Green's recommendations.

I understand that Barrie wants to add more attractions to the down town area but it's not a safe space, the parking is limited in most areas and for the Barrie bay cats to be playing so close to Victoria village and residential area just doesn't seem like a good idea. Maybe focus on affordable housing and build that instead at Queens park. Maybe a rehab centre or clinic to get the users off the streets. A police station downtown to keep a closer eye on what's going on in that area. Barrie is broken and needs to be fixed before adding more to it. MAKE BARRIE BEAUTIFUL AGAIN!

I understand that the cadets need access to the water, naturally. Parade grounds are unsightly pieces of concrete that have no business being constructed near our beautiful water park. Water and all nature are precious commodities that once destroyed cannot be regained. Especially our water

I want to be clear, I am not against building an arts centre downtown, I just think the spot you have chosen now would cut off access to the waterfront and I also believe it will make Maple Ave and Simcoe St very congested when events are on. Given the new bus terminal your building on Maple Ave, it's going to be busy with lots of traffic issues and the arts building will bring more. Not knowing how tall and how big this building will be, have you noticed there are no large structures on the waterfront now, it's kind of nice the way it is! I think you need a spot that can accommodate a building of size and with proper parking space!

I want to commend Mr. Marshall for listening and for doing excellent research.

I went to Guelph, Windsor, Michigan to Florida, this summer. Most of the cities I spent time in, have sports parking near rivers and lakes. It was excellent

I wish for no more pressure to ruin our beautiful bay area with more sports places. It is too precious to take away from every day strolling etc.

I would absolutely love to see a performing arts centre in Barrie to house the musicians and employees of the Canadian Musicians Co-operative year round. They are a non profit organization who would benefit greatly from a facility like this! I am a strong advocate for the arts and would love a space that lets artists come together!

I would agree to the Barrie Baycats being relocated to somewhere in Barrie but Queen's park doesn't have adequate parking to support this relocation. It would be nice to have them play closer somewhere within the city limits.

I would be curious to hear how FNMI communities and partners have been involved in the consultation process for the revitalization plan.

I would consider using Barrie Transit if the service was convenient. If buses are on hourly service in the evenings, that would probably not be a convenient option.

I would definitely take transit downtown for baseball, soccer, concert, unique theatrical performance. I want more water access, high diving boards, tall water slides, fast go karts, mini motorboat rentals, canals channels & rivers, bridges, tunnels, free

I would like the Barrie city council to pass a bill to Protect the conservation of the Southshore parkland in perpetuity.

I would like further info on the sports area on Dunlop Street. Dunlop street is a very large street. would have been nice to know more about this proposition. Parking is always an issue downtown. With the new bollards there is less parking. The proposed performance art center also hurts the parking downtown and it looks too big for the area proposed.

I would like to see a dog park somewhere in downtown as currently the only place to run your dogs is in the south end or in sunidale which is unlit at night and does not feel particularly safe for a single woman to walk

I would like to see Allandale park remain an environmentally protected green space for future generations and never be developed beyond Marshall Green's suggestions. Along with Sunnidale Park these two areas are the gems of our city.

I would like to see Allandale Station Park as protected environmental space so nothing like the sports field can be proposed in that space again.

I would like to see Allandale Station Park declared a protected area and preserved for our community. I think additionally combining a learning opportunity about the first Nations people who once lived in the area would be incredible.

I would like to see cafe's along the waterfront. We love walking along the paths around the bay from Southshore to Johnson's beach. To stop and enjoy a treat or cup of coffee you need to head uptown to Dunlop Street. I'd rather be near the water. We are long overdue for having an area for dogs to have beach access for a swim.

I would like to see more availability of baseball diamonds. My daughter plays softball so late at night, her game and practices start at 8:45 and ends 10:15. Also there is very limited time slots to play volleyball in community centers over summer(it is Sunday only in my neighborhood during summer, maybe due to summer camps?) , which could change if they can use school gyms over summer. I hope this will change if the new proposed facility and school gyms open up.

I would like to see the area south of the south shore centre be designated as environmentally protected so that future generations can have access. This area was discussed by previous City of Barrie as a natural space etc. Then, here we are, trying to protect it from a council decision that felt justified in voting yes to a terrible plan. A plan that did not require public consultation.

I would like to see the city focus on helping the homeless population through more addiction and mental health services as well as affordable public housing.
I would like to see the lake front untouched for development ever. That it always remain natural and open to the public and nature for use and growth.

I'd love to be able to walk downtown without being accosted by homeless individuals.
I'm a big fan of the multi use sports field. Pleas don't get distracted by the few, city first!
I'm a little suspect of your intentions with the survey as there are no follow-up questions to your yes or no questions. Why would you suggest building a stadium at Queens Park when you suggested building a multi used stadium for a Professional support team. Could the bats not use that stadium instead of impacting a park that is already already used. City Council and lack imagination. You're looking for a location for the city that why not work with the Canadian enforces for the use of the armouries and associate Queen Park, which has a long-standing history of holding military parades. Council wants to demolish values facilities. If you were to use a transport for the cats, what would you do with the trails and the sports facilities? Also, what would you do with the residence surrounding that area?. As somebody who lives in the area, I don't want massive stadium while park in a residential area. Also remove the Kids park in the area, which would limit the liability of the downtown core. If Barry wants to make a viable and vibrant downtown I would suggest they learn from the mistakes. The city of Toronto made about the 80s 90s and that they've worked very hard to correct in the 2000s to today
I'm at so excited for the possibilities made by the new performing arts centre. I know the Canadian Musicians Cooperative is making big waves in the industry and giving them access to these reasources will really skyrocket their progress and improvements to the music industry and to the City of Barrie.
I'm happy to see the waterfront parkland in the recommendations. I also think that it should be rezoned to protected space with additional tree planting on a regular basis.

I'm relatively knowledgeable about many of the proposed developments and revitalization proposals and I still found this survey confusing and a bit misleading, to be honest. The survey didn't even really talk about the artificial field that was proposed by south shore. If that is the sea cadets parade ground, then it shouldn't be located there. An artificial field would absolutely have run off of plastics into the lake. Have you ever been to the Massey field at Georgian? My son has played soccer there all summer and I continue to find melted plastic particles and clumps in my car and home entryway. There is no way that an artificial field would not impact our lake. I would suggest reframing this survey so it's clear. It feels like you're trying to pull the wool over people's eyes, frankly.

I'm very glad this report came out and I want to reiterate please leave the natural areas along the waterfront natural!! Thanks

I'd like to see a revitalized downtown with more events geared to families. I think we need to be careful about traffic because the past few years have been a nightmare with all the construction going on around Barrie. More family events in a safe environment may help deter panhandling etc. as well.

If all this was to happen. I hope an increase in police presence and or 3rd party security is had. Our city and downtown core has so much to offer. It's a disgrace with the amount of homeless, panhandlers and drug addicts that are ruining a beautiful safe city.

If putting up large lights or telephone poles near the waterfront, I would recommend putting up osprey nest boxes. This both possibly supports a once endangered bird, and also protects any wiring and lights. They are low cost with a great reward.

If school facilities are going to be used for minor sports teams, the city needs to take care of the property ie. garbage, lawn maintenance, sports equipment.

If space allow I would prefer to see the sea cadets on the opposite end of the parking lot closer to the military park. I hope there are new designs to the performing arts centre that was presented to the community. Need to focus on making the artists comfortable, not just the audience. The downtown baseball diamond land should be used for affordable housing.

If the Barrie film festival and the Canadian Musicians Cooperative work together and join forces I think there could be some incredible results. This would be a MASSIVE benefit to all musicians and artists alike living in Barrie and region. The Canadian Musicians Cooperative has so much to give and could improve their services even more by having a great year round location.

If the bay cats move to queens Park, where will there be sufficient parking to accommodate the vehicles of the players and fans that will not negatively effect the residents of the area

If the Baycats would come to Queens Park, then build the giant sports facility up in Midhurst at Vintage Throne stadium. The county can subsidize transit from Barrie. Or put it in Queens park. Still no reassurances about traffic or parking. What happens when the streets are closed for other city events? People whose children play organized sports can usually afford a car, so they won't use transit. Same with condo owners, and people from out of town. All the traffic increases runoff into the lake, and air quality. A BIG NO to artificial turf, no matter where anything is built. If that is a deal breaker for the "global sports entity" then too bad. The city and county need to first develop a compassionate and empathetic solution to redirect unhoused and insecurely housed citizens away from the downtown core. So far they (and the province) only seem to be trying to cut supports. You can't starve this problem away. They are adding to the dilemma which leads to more desperation, more survival crimes, and more drug use to dull the pain.

Bradford st was supposed to be develop years ago and is now nothing but overgrown fields for the homeless to pitch their tents and trash the properties.</p>

<p>If the performing arts centre is built where the Sea Cadets meet now, what will happen to the Five Points Theatre? I'd like the Five Points Theatre to remain as is. Also, I'd like the city to push the province to open Supervised Consumption Sites, to address the problem of used needles littered in Queen's Park, and other places, but I mentioned Queen's Park because it has a nice baseball diamond that isn't being used because people are afraid of their children getting pricked by contaminated needles from drug users.</p>

Roads downtown are mostly one lane each way, have you looked at what's happening in Toronto, and that's been going bad for along time.</p>

The proposal for a 600 seat venue in the former Sea Cadets location seems too small. There would be minimal parking in this location as well. The proposed Eco Park doesn't need a lot and it should not be over developed. The current land with quiet and peaceful natural trails should be preserved. Whatever gets done with this plan needs to take into consideration the growing traffic and associated parking demands as well. The new condos will continue add to that and the waterfront will also grow in popularity and use especially as visitors from other parts of the GTA "discover" what Barrie residents already know.</p>
<p>If there is a safety issue with existing location for sea cadets site, then why is city not looking into making the site safer rather than moving them? How would the safety issue be addressed/ resolved by converting the area into performing centre? Wouldn't the same safety issue affect kids/ families that would be participating at the performance centre? Development of city of Barrie is important, but what's the point in creating more fields/ structures? I would love to see and support expansion of green spaces/ better utilisation of green spaces such as beautiful Barrie south shore. Already that area is gonna get busy once the bus depot- Allandale Go station opens. My question for city is how are they planning to navigate traffic issue there in the heart of waterfront/ downtown Barrie with this new expansion. Please don't wreck our beautiful Barrie south waterfront in the name of development. Maybe sea cadets can be moved closed to Johnson beach area that could use some upgrading/ development and has water access too.</p>
<p>If there is enough space for the Baycats and seating for fans, then yes, bring them downtown.</p>
<p>If this is the report it is awful. We do not need a field. Every school has a field. But I do agree that there should be no sports complexes were there is not adequate parking. This means no sports at the waterfront. There is a huge sports complex in Springwater. Add to that!!</p>

<p>I'm a coach and a all sports individual that grew up in Barrie that has used all of the playing fields in Barrie. I will be at the meeting to address the reality of what should take place.</p>
<p>I'm disturbed that removing the serenity of our downtown lake is coming. Any Greenspan around the lake should be protected and not further developed. There are many unused spaces in the city that could facilitate traffic and parking. The lakeshore is already congested enough. Maybe try getting a transit system that actually works for those who commute to the GTA and don't want to end up at union station if they are going to Mississauga or an other GTA city. Until transportation is adequate, Barrie will always be a "wanna-be" town that is just too expensive.</p>
<p>I'm just so disappointed to hear that the mayor is considering more development on our beautiful shoreline. We are so fortunate to have a city on a lake with all the parkland and the trees, the wildlife and the peace and quiet. Bringing crowds, noise and scaring the wildlife away is not my idea of the beautiful Barrie waterfront I've known.</p>
<p>I'm thankful that this report was done by Marshall Green and that the city council has taken the time to reconsider how to best utilize the beautiful Allandale Station Park, maintaining it as an important green space preserved for generations to come!</p>

<p>Implement all recommendations and DO NOT DEVELOP the natural oak forest/meadow area east of the South Shore Centre</p>
<p>In addition to local sports and youth programs, a revitalized Downtown Barrie could support local initiatives like the Canadian Musicians Co-operative and Barrie Film Festival. Creatives are often left out when it comes to community planning, so revitalizing such spaces will also benefit artists based in Barrie. The Co-op has artists who perform in the summer, this space could be an innovative place for them to use year-round.</p>
<p>In all. Of these proposals, parking is an issue, but all of these proposals would enhance the downtown. The Performing Arts Centre should not become a barrier to the water. It should incorporate some kind of accessible space to let people enjoy the waterfront - waterfront deck...restaurant/pub patio. Sea Cadets are a bit of a mystery. Who funds them? Are they associated with the Armed Forces? Will we be subsidizing them? What will the addition to the Southshore Community Centre look like? Will the parade ground be used all year?</p>
<p>In my opinion, the Barrie waterfront should not be used as, or for, a sports facility. There are many of these in the city already.</p>
<p>In my opinion, these ideas are short sighted and there has not been enough emphasis on parking to accommodate this proposed density. As it stands, people who work and play downtown have limited parking options and the proposed site for performing arts would impact that even further. While I like the idea of the Baycats inhabiting Queens park (it is underused and I only ever see people there loitering), again we need to consider where all of the visitors will park? Why not focus growth on the parts of Barrie that are just outside of the already crowded downtown so we don't further add to the problems of traffic and insufficient infrastructure? The run down industrial area just west of Centennial park seems like it may have potential to house large facilities and is still close to downtown/waterfront. Lastly, I feel it</p>

would be very short sighted to neglect the impact all of this increasing density would have on emergency service response. Spread Barrie out a bit and make it easier to get around!

In relation to downtown's core, The Barrie Thunder Classic Car club has been hosting events every Wednesday evening on the waterfront and it has been an incredible event throughout the years given that it was at the core of downtown. I hope that this is not permanently removed from the waterfront, the Barrie Library parking lot isn't cutting it and that location is literally hiding these beautiful cars from the public. Myself and many other friends have moved to Barrie since it is indeed a "automotive enthusiast town" especially given that the Canadian Automotive Institute is here. The best event throughout the week is the Wednesday night show. Please bring this back! It is a spot for mature classic car owners to display their rides after many months or years of hard work and wrenching.

In relation to the Southshore center and the sea Cadet's artificial turf, under the fake grass will be millions of rubber balls. Everyone who has played on one knows they have to dump their shoes out right after playing. My concern is that the toxic rubber balls will make their way into Lake Simcoe. I don't care about the trees, lighting, path ways, because all the issues with those can be fixed. I do care about the potentially irreversible effects of toxic rubber going into the lake. I imagine that the reason why the artificial turf got approved and normal turf didn't is because of the fertilizers that would be used could negatively impact the lake. Millions of toxic rubber balls will do the same. I wouldn't appreciate the city dumping car tires in the lake, so why does it think putting an artificial turf right beside the lake is a good idea? [.....] Please reconsider the location of the field.

In response to "Would you use Barrie Transit to attend a sporting event or a theatre production if the transit fare was included with your ticket?": The issue is the schedules currently are a mess, buses not running on time and lengthy routes make a 5 minute drive take an hour on public transit. This needs to be fixed if you want people to actually use it as a real alternative.

Inadequate parking downtown for the Baycats. Transit is too unreliable same time consuming compared to driving, and less safe and clean, I would choose to drive or use a cab/Uber.

Include something for cricket as well. Because of growth in the interest.

Indigenous cultural centre. Barrie has numerous known historical sites. Yaniionen for example. This is something that would draw people to Barrie from off of the highway, children could be educated along with every citizen. Nimble d this with pioneer education (which gets away from blame) and focuses on growing together and building upon our past. It is critical that this is thought through now because we will be a massive city in 25 years. I would also like to see more connectivity throughout the city. Similar London with paved biking trails. I would also like to see a centralized or semi dispersed splash pads throughout the city. Summers are getting hotter. Chatham Ontario has a great example of this and it is a massive draw for kids and families.

Installing lighting on the waterfront trails would make them safer at night, and likely decrease the presence of shopping carts and tents at the edge of the trails. The proposed new buildings should be made with brick and stone and eschew minimalistic design in favour of a more aesthetically pleasing appearance.

Marshall Green's recommendations demonstrate thoughtful foresight, ensuring the best interests of our community as it continues to grow. I fully support this report and am appreciative of Mr. Green's research and hard work.

Marshall Green's report is a refreshing document that offers significant potential to regenerate a vibrant City. Given the City's financial situation any planned development to adopt the options within the report will need to be thoroughly vetted to ensure tax dollars are maximized. We need to start somewhere. This is an exciting opportunity to make Barrie a welcoming City.

Marshall Green's report is more thorough and well-thought out than anything this council has ever done. I pray that the councillors do what's right and take Mr. Green's advice, for the good of our entire city. [.....]

Marshall Green's report is spot on. It recognizes that a sports field should not be wasted on waterfront where the natural beauty is currently appreciated and used as such. A sports field should have easy highway access plus his proposal adds access to downtown restaurants and pubs for after game social opportunities; same for Baycats stadium proposal. Please note that for any of this to be viable, downtown safety and clean up is required. Public drug use, pan handling and homelessness needs to be taken care of. For this, I would suggest institutionalization; a facility not downtown, should be re-purposed to house homeless people and contain all the supports under one roof - safe injection site, re-hab, mental health, employment opportunities etc., and a way to re-integrate them into society once they're able.

Marshall Green's report presented some interesting ideas. However, it is much too early for yes and no answers as to whether residents will support some of his ideas. The City of Barrie has to do its due diligence and provide us with a lot more information before we can be expected to vote one way or the other. Because we do not have enough information, I have voted no to many things. With more information, I would possibly change that vote to a yes. It is up to city council to provide this information so we can make informed decisions. At the moment, we just do not have enough information. We need to know who is paying for the sports facility. How big will it be? What will it offer? If the city is footing the bill, I will not support it. We need to know how parking and noise will be addressed at Queens Park. With all the condos being built downtown that do not offer enough parking for even their own residents, we need to know there will be parking available at Queens Park to accommodate both teams and spectators. In addition, we need to know the noise from the games will still allow condo residents peace and quiet. I will not support any development on the waterfront - period. Even though I love pickleball, there should be no pickleball courts built at the waterfront. The sea cadets should not have a new field built. They do not need a new field. There is no reason why one of the parking lots at the South Shore Centre can't be roped off

for a few hours so they can parade. In inclement weather, they can do their exercises upstairs inside the under-used South Shore Centre. If that is not satisfactory, they can continue practice at the Barrie Armory. No field, no courts, and no fencing at the waterfront. The arts centre can not be built on the waterfront. It would obscure the view of the waterfront from Meridian Place! It would also block access to that part of the waterfront for all pedestrians. The waterfront is for use of all residents - not just ticket-holders to the arts centre. An ideal location for constructing the arts centre would be the Maple Street bus terminal. Patrons can then cross the street on a summer day for a walk at the waterfront, or stroll along Dunlop Street for a meal. There would be no need for the Five Points Theatre and it could be re-purposed. No development will be successful unless the issue of vagrants is addressed. At this time, many women will not go downtown or to the waterfront alone at night, and many won't go alone during the day. There needs to be parking available close to all venues, or women are not going to use these facilities. We are not going to wait at bus stops or the side of the road for public transit because we do not feel safe. In addition, when weather is bad, we are not going to use public transit. Women are a large demographic in the city, many with disposable income and interested in supporting the arts and restaurants in this city, but our safety needs have not been met by city council or the police and as a result, we often travel outside Barrie. As mentioned, I am interested in the report and prepared to revisit the survey when more information can be provided so I can make an informed decision. When we are asked to complete a survey without having enough information, it worries me that city council is preparing to make another decision without properly informing residents. I fear they have not learned from their mistake of approving the waterfront sports field without consultation. This survey is not adequate consultation.

Marshall Greens report sets out an excellent roadmap that many Barrie residents have been thinking about for many years. It is nice to see these ideas being put to paper. We have a number of areas within Barrie's downtown that have been sitting vacant for years and I would be nice to see these areas being utilized and vibrant rather than the existing eyesore of present. Exciting opportunities

More free parking allowed for Barrie residents that are closer to the downtown area

Moving the Baycats into town would allow more people to enjoy the team! I love this idea.

Mr. Green's report was excellent. No sportsfield on the waterfront! The Allandale Station Park should be zoned as "environmentally protected" space asap.

Mr. Green's report, which nobody asked him for, unfortunately ignores more than a year of work done last year by the arts community and the business community on the future of the west end of downtown. His recommendations will cost hundreds of millions of dollars. His report should be ignored, except for the first few pages about the southshore, which he got exactly right. Council, please build the performing arts centre that was promised for decades and drop the silliness about sports stadiums.

Much better plan

Much better plans than putting sports field on waterfront

MUCH consideration should be given to parking, accessibility to areas and traffic flow. All the proposals for tall apartment buildings do NOT do this. In this part of Canada people need cars. There should be 1 parking spot per unit. Then maybe bringing activities downtown will work. Also please remember the people who live there even if you don't.

Much improved plan over what was proposed in May 2024 by council. Would like to see a domed soccer area outside of the downtown and waterfront areas for year round sports. Dunlop West is a good location for that once the Dunlop St exit from highway 400 is completed.

Much more logical use of existing spaces. Please keep the Allandale Station Park as natural as possible. We need wild areas within our city. We love seeing the fox family cavorting in that area. Also they keep the rodent population down. If you doo too much there they will leave.

Multi use multi faceted is the key. What is also needed is innovative housing with tot options for our very large homeless populations

My concern about Queen's Park use would be noise issues late into the evenings because of its proximity to residential areas and the senior's complex. Parking may be an issue if the spectator numbers are large. Fans may be coming from outside Barrie. We have many parks and green spaces that could be utilized. I pass these areas and no one is using them. Small neighbourhood groups could be using them for some sports. Places where kids could be developing sports skills like they used to by playing pick up games. These could be relatively small defined spaces in parks etc. Use of outdoor school areas would be useful too if an agreements could be worked out. I think that spreading these throughout neighbourhoods would be good for encouraging people in those areas to meet their neighbours and become part of the community. We really need a concert hall. We have been too long without one. Too bad that the Fisher site didn't work out.

My concern with the new arts centre taking the place of the old marching ground lies within the inhibition of waterfront views as well as access to the spirit catcher. I have concerns over who this new building would further cut off the water from the rest of the city. I feel it is a waste of money and effort to turn Southshore into a passive park. It is currently a lovely and natural area that is enjoyed by people and wildlife alike. I feel the education stations are a waste of money. I do not support making several accessible paths, which would require paving and destroy habitat. School sports fields should absolutely be made available for community use. There is a brand new turf field in the South End that sits empty almost all of the time. Before we jump to build new facilities, we should be maximizing what we already have. This would save money on construction and labour. I do not support the sports field being developed close to Dunlop St. This area is busy enough, and would only further clog this area, requiring road development and further disturbance. I also have concerns about parking. I do not think the Baycats should move to Queen's Park. Although this area would accommodate the field, I see no plan for the massive amounts of parking that would be needed. Downtown does not have nearly enough space to accommodate all the cars, unlike

<p>their current location that has a plethora of parking. It is a far fetched dream to think that everyone will use public transportation to come to the games. We are not there yet, and to build based on this assumption will only lead to issues.</p>
<p>My endorsement of any of these plans is a cautious yes—all of it needs further consideration and public consultation at the preliminary stages of each individual project.</p>
<p>My main concern for many of these proposals is parking. We already have difficulty finding parking when events are in progress downtown.</p>
<p>My main concern is to keep the waterfront area as Parkland and get it re zoned to Parkland With the huge amount of population change, more Parkland is needed, and preserved for future generations</p>
<p>My only concern is that the proposed performing arts facility is too small for a city the size of Barrie.</p>
<p>My only concern is that the theatre would only accommodate 250 people. I attended Jersey Boys at Kings Wharf today. How is it that a small town like Penetanguishene can accommodate a much larger audience in a town 1/10 the size of Barrie? Let's not be short sighted again and learn from our errors in building an unworkable space like the one currently on Dunlop. (I can't even remember its current name since it has changed so many times.</p>
<p>My only concern was Astro turf beside the water supply. Everything here looks amazing!!</p>
<p>My reaction to Marshall Green's report is very favourable. The downtown Performing Arts Centre is particularly appealing. Locating the soccer facility on the campus of the former Barrie Central Collegiate is also a very good idea.</p> <p>A few areas of concern for me would be the continued protection of the chimney swift roost in the chimney of the demolished high school. Any development and activity on this site should not impinge in any way on the health of this colony.</p> <p>I'm not sure I share Marshall Green's vision for "passive" parkland at the Allandale Station Park. It seems to me that there is plenty of the kind of space Mr. Green mentioned in his brief at City Hall elsewhere in the city. The park should be primarily dedicated to its role as an "ecopark". The establishment of an oak savanna with pollinator gardens, interpretive signage and footpaths will be another jewel for our city's lakefront.</p>
<p>My support for a new sports facility on Dunlop Street is limited, and tempered by the recognition that that the arena where the Barrie Colts play already loses money. As playing fields around the city are already underutilized it is possible, if not likely, that a new facility will also lose money regardless of any built-in flexibility. It is also extremely speculative to assume that fans attending events at such a facility will make a larger contribution to the local economy (hotels, restaurants) than current visitors. If there is research supporting this I would appreciate having it presented to council to buttress the argument in favour of the facility.</p>
<p>My thanks to Marshall Green for the time and expertise that he has brought to this project.</p>
<p>My thanks to Marshall Green for this incredible community gesture and all the work he and others put into the report. Without it, taxpayers like me who support youth activities of all types would not be making an informed decision on an important matter that council approved with little to no consideration of the broader Barrie community. The vision of performing arts centre is too small for a growing city. It needs to be larger by several hundred seats and an appropriate location found. Sea cadets space is too small. I didn't answer Q6 & 7 as too little information. The city needs to invest and improve its current sports fields so they are playable and have at minimum toilet facilities. I would support Baycats at Queens Park if they wanted to move there. Parking is always an issue for any downtown venue so including transit with a</p>

Not sure there is sufficient parking in the Queen's Park area to support Barrie Baycats. The presence of homeless and drug addicted people might be a barrier to attracting spectators to evening games. Do we think the new condos and a ballpark to accommodate the Baycats would help gentrify the area? Is there really sufficient resident interest and support to make a performing arts centre viable, or do we risk it becoming a seldom used facility that cannot sustain itself without significant subsidies?
Odd, or maybe not so odd, that there is no mention of the proposed artificial turf sports field on the South Shore nature trail. Will that just suddenly be added in if this plan is approved? Is the nature park a red herring distraction from the real intent? I'd put nothing past this city council.
Of course, none of this will work unless something is done about the unhoused and homeless encampments. No one feels safe.
On an another note altogether, it would be nice to create a pleasure skating ice trail somewhere down in the Barrie waterfront area. The existing rink at the waterfront is being used only for hockey and I would love to have a skating trail there for families and adults to enjoy. :))
<p>On the whole, I was very pleased with the contents of Marshall Green's report on the multi-use sports field and the proposed uses for various sites within the City - particularly the much-needed performing arts centre I have a few comments and concerns as follows:</p> <p>If a sports field is developed at the Barrie Central site, it should ensure that the chimney providing housing to the swifts be incorporated into the site and plans should be developed for its maintenance. The site development should also incorporate designs that support the continued existence of these birds.</p> <p>I take exception to the report's statement that "...while the LSP might have offended various waterfront studies and plans previously approved by past Councils, these are not "the law" and provided proper procedures are followed, could be changed. And, in view of my recommendations which follow, land use planning concerns, at least for the time being, were moot." Municipalities undertake strategic plans and master plans, often with considerable community engagement and certainly supported by taxpayers' dollars, in order to determine and reflect the community's desires regarding the City's future development. Specifically, the Waterfront Strategic Plan was adopted by Council in 2023. As such, it is a current reflection of the community's vision and should be considered a highly relevant document. Of course, it, like any other strategic plan, is not a legal document but, it nevertheless has significant value that should not be discounted.</p> <p>In contrast, Barrie's Official Plan is a legal document that has been approved by the Province and the municipality is obliged to adhere to that content. In that Plan, the community vision</p>

statement includes, "greater environmental stewardship, a commitment to climate action and lowering emissions". Its founding principles enshrines " the city's Natural Heritage System as a core component of the community structure, and fully embraces sustainability, the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions to reach a net-zero goal and climate action and adaptation." In addition, the Official Plan recognizes that the City's green spaces and natural heritage "are essential to the landscape and the community – they contribute to the overall environmental and social values and health of the city and wider region. This Plan provides policies to ensure the features and functions are protected so that they can continue to perform their vital ecological functions and provide ecosystem services for the city."

I quote from these documents to illustrate how the Marshall Green report recommendations support two of the key plans that relate to this specific site. I hope that Council will re-consider their original decision and will reflect on the need to align future decisions with municipal plans based on community engagement, best practices and long-term vision for the City.

One hour per week weather permitting for parades. Use the parking lot.

One of the biggest issues I see with the proposed developments in the downtown area is parking. Is there additional parking planned for the theatre or the ballpark? The theatre is also smaller than I thought it would be, we already have venues of those sizes. It would be very nice to have something here to rival Toronto, at least a little bit. Not sure how viable an additional theatre is, though I'd personally love a large theatre here. Love the proposed eco park!

Only concern is downtown parking for baseball games.

Only that I wish to see the natural grass trails and meadows to the East of the Community Centre be left alone, and nor urbanized...ever!

Our beaches are at capacity no where to sit and enjoy because they are overcrowded. Please build a larger beach area in south shore also a winter ice skating trail unlike the one in collingwood would be an incredible asset the skating rink and the new rinks are not enough for this growing population and outdoor skating is important for our heritage.

Our city waterfront needs to be protected from big construction projects.

Our concern is the cost and the amount of congestion to the downtown area especially considering the added high density condominium housing

Our downtown already has a traffic and parking issue and the fact that the town is allowing these horrible high rise condos that offer next to no visitors parking is going to add incredibly horrible traffic to an already horrible traffic issue . No way do we need the bay cats downtown barrie, nor another sports areas on our beautiful waterfront where parking and roads are already poorly built

Our downtown and lakeshore footprint is too small to cram as much in as are being proposed. We are going to loose the allure of our beautiful water by building more buildings. Use existing buildings and appropriate spaces to redevelop into some of these things. Use the old race track for a sports complex (with both new professional team and Baycats), redevelop southshore centre or the old Roxx building for performing arts centre, etc. Our downtown is not limping along because of homeless people, it is limping along because it is choppy and not a welcoming community. Store owners treat their businesses as it they are their own homes and not as a privilege to be part of a downtown community. No one stays open past what time they was to go home. There needs to be investment in better lighting and development of connecting east and west Dunlop as a whole. Barrie keeps trying to make things classier to appease the rich but are not enriching the community vibe. It feels lifeless.

Take notes from some Toronto and other ontario communities that are developing and doing this well without leaving anyone on the economic continuum behind. Community means all. We need people who have no ties or influence to our city to come assess our needs and make recommendations. Thank you

Our Downtown needs to be cleaned up before bring more infrastructure to Dunlop. I'm a new resident of downtown Barrie and I'm terrified to walk on Dunlop to shop or go to a restaurant. These twin condos that are being built on Dunlop are the ugliest buildings I've ever seen. Never should have been built on Dunlop st.

Our downtown should be a safer space with less open drug use. There should also be more opportunities for the city and local business to earn income from the non-residents that come to our waterfront on the weekends.

Our lakeshore is a treasure and the natural elements should be protected. We are fortunate to have it. It is very shortsighted to develop it when other more suitable locations exist within the community.

Our lakeshore needs to remain looking like a lakeshore and be easily accessible for use by all city of Barrie residents.

Our roads and infrastructure are falling apart at the seams. There are many streets I avoid using as to avoid damaging my vehicle they are so poorly maintained. Barrie has many parks community centres and sports fields including school fields that are not used year round and can be used in addition to city properties as in my mind they are still public lands. Fix our roads and manage traffic better. Stop building high density housing and just rebuild the existing sea cadet building to remove safety concerns. These expansive plans are a massive waste of tax dollars

Our waterfront is a major treasure for the city of Barrie and its residents. Planning is very important. Entertainment and sporting facilities can support it but don't need to be blocking the view when they could be a block back on Bradford St and west end of Dunlop Street by the old central highschool property and close enough to Queens Park. The Armouries and Queens park could facilitate the cadets parade grounds.

Over this past summer I was involved with the Canadian Musicians Co-operative which is based out of Barrie. I believe that the Co-op and the Barrie Film Festival could join forces in the future and lead positive outcomes for artists and creatives in Barrie and the region surrounding. It is becoming more crucial that Co-op members have a suitable home for programming year round.

Overall I was very impressed with the plan, especially the sporting aspects of it. However, I do feel like there is no need to spend money on over developing an Eco park with infrastructure, let it be natural. Also, I believe the city's art community deserves a bigger presence to match the investment in sports. The parade grounds shouldn't take away from desperately needed parking, and should be as minimal as possible to suit the cadets needs, without limiting it to one or two other functions. It should be as multi-functional as possible. There should be a waterfront shuttle bus that connects all ends of the waterfront to Dunlop, some of the new proposed sports facilities and the two bus terminals. It should be easy to get to the beach, and then to a game, and then go for dinner, before transferring to a route that would take you home. Lastly, better plans need to be put in place to provide ALL the housing and programs for the homeless community that are there. Unfortunately, as we are failing to provide them with the support they need, it is creating unsafe situations for everyone. It doesn't make any sense to do any of this if we aren't taking care of the people who are on the streets and providing them with support, safety and security. Let's help them first before we spend money on all this "fun" stuff.

Overall safety is the biggest problem in the downtown core which includes all of downtown. Until a fundamental plan is established to ensure citizens safety all revitalizing is a waste. Citizens do not feel safe downtown

Overall the report was well done. I did not support the Astro turf field. In future city council needs to ensure there is full disclosure to these types of proposals instead of just hearing from special interest groups.

Overall, I agree that a sports/event complex is needed. Queens park is a good option to be refreshed for minor sports. No sporting arena or grounds should be located along the waterfront, south shore, Simcoe Street or anywhere along the dwindling crowded shoreline that will inevitably be developed with housing or business. There are other locations surrounding the downtown area that would be more suitable, walkable or a short distance. Could the Sea Cadets be located at Tyndale Park? They would have full access to the water and sufficient parking and space. Creating a parade ground on the south shore that would only be used by few seasonally and sporadically would be another waste of valuable waterfront and would create more traffic and over use of the remaining natural small park land. Barrie Transit is NOT a reliable and time efficient service and would only be feasible if shuttles or dedicated buses were assigned to the events.

Overall, I agree with Marshall Green's report. Barrie has an absolutely beautiful and well-used waterfront and creating opportunities for Barrie residents to enjoy downtown in various ways is a wonderful idea. The overall safety of downtown is my biggest concern. Bringing more things downtown would definitely highlight the growing safety concerns that exist. For example, if the sea cadets are looking for a new space because of safety concerns, putting an arts centre in its place seems dangerous and the safety concerns would still exist. My family and I love visiting the downtown library, the art gallery and Tulip Cafe and city hall skating rink but often do not feel safe when we're there. It is a big deterrent from going downtown. Further details on what the arts centre would look like and how it impacts the waterfront, skyline, etc would also be greatly appreciated. I am worried this may close off the view/access to the waterfront which should be free and accessible to all. If anything is to be built there, it should be the library for everyone to access and the arts centre can take over their current building.

One other suggestion to bring more families and residents down is creating more park space. The children's park at centennial beach is so well used and having more park space (splash pads, even integrated with cafes, etc. as is done in other parts of the world) would encourage residents to come down. Open Air Dunlop is a great start to this! Having a dog beach, dog park/area would help as well. Barrie does a great job at providing free bathrooms along the waterfront but there are none downtown. Adding more bike lanes would encourage residents to come downtown and help to alleviate parking/traffic congestion in the downtown core. Thank you for being so considerate and thorough in the next steps for Barrie. It is a wonderful place to raise a family and can only get better from here.

Parking and traffic are a major issue for any revitalization. It's already difficult to find parking when events are going on at the lake or downtown. The lake should be developed to best serve as many demographics as possible. Sports is not key to everything. Moving the Baycats back into the city is a great idea but there is no parking around the proposed diamond. Look at harbourfront in Toronto for inspiration. Where are the artisans in these proposals, or creative studios not just performing. Focus on bringing more businesses to downtown especially west of Bayfield.

Parking and traffic would be increased dramatically for those who live locally - in no area of this survey does this parking requirement get addressed. All lots around the lake are always busy, winter and summer. Further, this could impact residents who will see increased parking

<p>on side streets for people looking to park. The congestion would be incredible to an area already encumbered. While I appreciate the need for a new Arts Centre - there are many properties that are still undeveloped due to various reasons , i.e. the old high school which is now a giant empty lot. There are two I can think of on Bradford street that could lend itself perfectly. Leave our waterfront ALONE. Buildings are not required or wanted to block the water or access to it.</p>
<p>Parking availability will be CRUCIAL to the success of ANY revitalized downtown. Those of us who live near Barrie's boundaries, we are furthest away from the downtown core and cannot use Barrie Transit in a meaningful or efficient way. PLEASE PROVIDE ADEQUATE PARKING SPOTS within close proximity to the proposed downtown vision!</p>
<p>Parking for the performing arts centre will be a major issue. Parking for the bay cats will also be a major concern. We also need a restaurant on the lake with a marina that people can park at. Why not include that in the theatre proposal.</p>
<p>Parking for the proposed Baycats Facility at Queens park would not be adequate. Downtown parking around queens park would be difficult to accommodate the influx of visitors. A benefit to the current facility in Midhurst is ample free parking keeping cost for attendees down.</p> <p>Clarification on the professional sports facility on Dunlop street is required. Is the City required to fund the project and maintain the facility or is this going to be a private venture by the sports team to construct and maintain? Will this facility be open to all minor sports without exclusions? for example: Soccer facility only allowed to be rented to Barrie Soccer teams? or can an alternate sport like lacrosse/field hockey/rugby use the facility?</p>
<p>Parking for the proposed Performing Arts Theatres is a serious issue. Typically 60% of the attendees would be seniors who would not walk more than a block nor would they inclined to get there bus.</p>
<p>Parking is a big issue for most of these ideas. Adequate parking is necessary. If the soccer fields was at south shore, more green space would be used for parking, which is a waste. Angle parking should be added to Lakeshore drive near south shore instead of the parallel parking there now. In front of Sunnidale park should be changed to paved angle parking also. Can old Barrie Central land be used for soccer fields and baseball for the Baycats? Is there enough room for the Baycats at Queens park, with parking? I wouldn't go if you had to park blocks away in a residential area(where they don't want you to park) and must walk blocks to go to the baseball game.</p>
<p>Parking is a hot button topic especially in the downtown core and on the waterfront. I can't support a performing arts centre with allowing for parking for 200 vehicles. Around Queens park and the surrounding neighbourhood could likely handle the parking needs for the Bay Cats.</p>

<p>Public Lands MUST only be used for the benefit of all city residents and not for special interest groups. Waterfront lands MUST respect ecological rules, while maximizing the benefit to city residents, not individuals or special interest groups, of such a resource</p>
<p>Public safety is a consideration for any event/theatre downtown. It's a no for many people for good reason. Free bus rides is ludicrous. How cheap can people get? Stop that now.</p>
<p>Public transit is horrendous in the city. The new system is deeply confusing, infrequent and frankly hellish to deal with. More people should be forced to use it.</p>

<p>Put the Sea Cadets out towards the Barrie Yacht Club, which has space and also access to water. Enhance the greenery of the Soutshore and leave it alone. Expand the boat dock, parking and then leave the green space alone. Let us have natural green space.</p>
<p>Put the Sports field in Midhurst.</p>
<p>Put the sports in the area that families live and could use without having to be driven to the event.</p>
<p>Putting a sports/football field by the waterfront is a terrible idea. Traffic, loss of green space etc.</p>
<p>Putting Fisher at the Spirit Catcher is one of the worst ideas that I have heard for Barrie, it will cut off all of the water front sight lines that have been so carefully preserved. Also parking will be a huge issue at this location. An Indoor Performing Art Centre is not the best and highest use for waterfront. People will travel to it wherever it is and it should be used to anchor another part of the City. When the theatre is not in use (95% of the time), it will be a big lump that just obstructs the flow of people and our connection with the water, people point at the Sydney Opera house, but that is out on the water on a tidal island and does not occupy valuable, community shore land. <p>Putting the Baycats within the area of a nursing home and residential area would have a concern for noise late into evening.</p>
<p>Queens park baseball diamond is less used due to health and safety concerns. Finding needles in the washrooms and around the diamond. I played baseball there for years and only ever once went into the washroom once and then never did again. If people felt safe then the teams would book this diamond. Isn't meridian place supposed to be used for performing arts? Why do we need another space?</p>
<p>Queens park has a well used and loved play ground that needs to be kept for the local neighborhoods. Sports are great, but bringing the Baycats into the downtown area will mean increasing traffic congestion, lack of parking and additional noise. Please consider this space for quieter space, picnics, tennis and so forth.</p>
<p>Queens Park has been the best baseball field since I can remember since the 60's. would be great to have that back! There are so many places we can use as soccer fields that are not being put to use. School fields would be a great use of unused space.</p>
<p>Queen's Park has parking limitations, as does much of downtown Barrie. Transit improvements to connect Lakeshore with downtown are necessary to revitalize the area and make these visions a reality. This may be improved naturally over time with the bus terminal being relocated to Lakeshore/the Allandale GO improvements.</p>

<p>Queens Park is part of historic Barrie. As the report has demonstrated, the park is used by local residents heavily. Living in close proximity to Queens Park, I walk there every day with my dogs and my child. The impact of a sports field for the single purpose of a baseball diamond is beyond ridiculous. Where do residents, children, the elderly, who live in the nearby seniors facility, go that is safe? The park is used all year round, with the area that is contemplated by the "new" facility being used in the winter for skating. Groups use the field area for many different purposes, including the military who uses the area for their cadets. The impact to the landscape would also be significant, given that there is the creek that runs through the park. What environmental impact would there be to an increase in people? The impact to the history of the area, as well, would be severe. Given that the park is part of the 9 mile portage, it is an area that needs to be protected. It is a part of colonial and First Nation history. If the city is looking to use the baseball diamond that currently exists there, make it an urban dog park. There are so many dogs who live in the area who have no where to go run and play off leash. The Barrie Baycats have an extensive site in Midhurst. It would be poor planning to move them from Midhurst to downtown Barrie. There is no need. The change would be for a small group of people compared to a significant impact to a historic neighborhood. The city needs to contemplate protecting its history and not erasing it. Green space downtown needs to be protected. We can only look to other cities, especially Toronto and in Europe, to see the importance of green spaces - to climate change and enjoyment of life. It would be extremely disappointing to see the City ruin such a lovely park and the history that exists there</p>

<p>Queens Park too small for Baycats IBL team. Little parking. Footprint too small. New sports field should never have been considered on Laleshore. Failure of council to recognize the ants of the people of Barrie (except for the 2 who voted no to it).</p>
<p>Queens park us less used because of the druggies around. Same reason no one goes down town anymore .don't feel safe</p>

Queens Park would need significant changes to host the Baycats....I think it would be wonderful to have this downtown.

Question # 1 : All the Cadets programs are a federal government responsibility, operated by the Canadian Armed Forces. The city government should stop interfering in federal government jurisdiction. It is the federal government's responsibility to pay for Cadet program expenses, not municipal governments and their residents. If the Cadets need a new property or building (to March on etc.), the federal government should pay for it all, not residents of a municipality where a group of Cadets happen to be located. Stop wasting municipal government (residents') money on silly, wasteful and frivolous projects that another government is responsible for paying for. / Q2 : No. Why did City council waste all that money on the McLaren Art Gallery and the Five Points Theatre, if they are just going to be abandoned anyway? The City doesn't need another massive pet project in the form of another "performing arts centre" or the building and decades long continuing costs associated with it (after it is built). Stop wasting residents' money on silly, wasteful and frivolous pet projects that only a small portion of the people who live here will ever be interested in or able to enjoy anyway. There are much more important (real) issues which need to be dealt with in Barrie than this kind of frivolous nonsense. / Q4 : While using school sports facilities may be suitable for some events, schools are the property of School Boards, not city government, so their use will be at the discretion of the School Board, which needs to be considered. / Q5 : City Council should not be holding secret talks, [.....] about public property. It should be transparent, open and honest with residents about what it is doing and why, what organization it proposes to control the public property and how much of residents' money it will cost us, over the long term. [.....] Residents should not be asked or expected to sign over a blank cheque to the unidentified "sports entity" or to the City for a mysterious, unknown secret project. City Council must [.....] open, clear, complete, fully honest and accountable communication and interaction with residents (the people who pay it's bills). / Q8 : While transit tickets (one for each person, to get to and return home from each event) should be offered with each such event; it should not be mandatory to buy transit tickets. City Council has recently begun gutting regularly scheduled transit service and has abandoned entire neighbourhoods now (and plans to reduce transit service even more next year), so many people can't wait for Council to get it's act together and have given up on the City and it's woefully inadequate and unreliable transit service, which City Council has now decided only some people in some neighbourhoods should be allowed to have access to. The City's backward, antiquated ideas about how to get things done has forced many people to buy a car and clog up the roads with even more one-person vehicles. The City's clear intent is to turn Barrie into an unlivable toxic pollution zone which nobody will want to live in, just like Toronto has become. The City should promote transit use to all visitors and everybody who wants to buy a ticket to an event as an add on to the ticket price for each event, by offering a big discount if a person leaves their car at home and takes a bus. The only problem is that the City has abandoned thousands of residents by cancelling regularly scheduled transit service in many neighbourhoods and those which still have it, may be unable to get such service close to their home (or workplace) at the time they need it, to get there and then back home, due to the city's recent cuts to regularly scheduled service, which has made the remaining buses even more late and "off schedule" than before. Perhaps the City should put on an entire singular circular shuttle bus route before and after each event just for event attendees with designated stops at common locations along the route, create an atmosphere of fun for similarly minded people (a team's fans or arts event fans) with some kind of extra features or performers on the bus, for which each patron would pay a possibly premium price (for the unique experience). The City could also promote safety in numbers (everybody in the

same bus together to attend the same event and no need to worry about needing to leave one's car behind and pay for a taxi to get home, if one has had a few drinks). The current level of service provided by the city (for transit) will deter most people from leaving their cars at home to attend such events, especially after the City has cut so much of the regularly scheduled service and abandoned so many residents in so many neighbourhoods and may deter people from attending such a events if it is linked to the current transit service. / This is a wasteful, frivolous project which was rejected by most city residents the fiirst time it was proposed (2017) and has been rejected again by most city residents again this time. Where will the City get all this money from residents for all these (others too) multi-million dollar pet projects, which ost residents don't want anyway? How many generations of city residents will be stuck with the bill for these projects? It is unnecessary, wasteful and frivolous, not to mention destructive to nature. City Council needs to get it's act together and prioritize residents' real needs before such needless, wasteful and frivolous projects are ever considered (for funding) again.***

Question # 1 : Military Cadets groups are operated by and the responsibility of the Armed Forces and the federal government. Stay in your lane and stop interfering in other governments' jurisdiction. Why is a municipal government wasting residents' money to pay for something which is a federal government responsibility? Question # 2 : Barrie has spent large sums of residents' money on the McClaren Art Gallery and the Five Points Theatre already. Why waste more of our money for an overpriced, frivolous pet project (such as another "performing arts centre" downtown, a few minutes walk from the one we already have)? Stop wasting our money on silly, pointless, frivolous projects that only a small fraction of residents will ever be able to or be interested in using. / Q4 : Schools are not City property. This would leave City residents dependent on School Boards for permission and availability to participate in sports and other events, at extra costs to City residents, only when schools are not scheduled for use for School Board events. / Q5 : No resident should be asked to write a blank cheque (for tens of millions of dollars?) to City government for an unknown corporate company (sports team?) to take over public property for the purpose of taking millions of dollars (event tickets fees, etc.) for corporate profits. [.....]Tell residents all the details first before asking us to write a huge cheque [.....] / Q8 : The City continues to make massive cuts to organized, scheduled transit service, so transit service tickets are useless to many

residents because there is no scheduled service available now, and even in the remaining neighbourhoods which still have scheduled service, it may not be available now (after all the service reductions) at the right time and right place for a person to get from where they are to the proposed sports field. Such tickets should be offered but only by resident's choice and at a discounted price (to encourage transit use and get more personal vehicles off roads and encourage event attendance), in addition to event tickets and transit use must be fully and properly promoted with such events (or this idea will fail). Transit service is so unreliable and bad in Barrie that many people have surrendered to what the City really wants - billions of dollars of costs to maintain and repair overused roads and roads always clogged up with thousands of personal vehicles, just like the pollution toilet the provincial government has turned Toronto into. Our addiction to personal vehicles is strangling Toronto and half of it's residents would live elsewhere, if they could. This is, apparently, what City council wants to turn Barrie into - an unlivable pollution toilet where nobody wants to live anymore. Invest in decent, safe, clean, regularly scheduled transit service which is mostly on schedule, to all parts of the city and encourage people to leave their vehicles at home, so we can one day transform Barrie into a livable city, where people want to live, instead of a place where everybody wants to leave.

Question 8 does not ask if the Baycats should move to Queen's Park, it asks if they should move to a downtown location. Which could mean any downtown location. Please leave the waterfront as parkland. It is the jewel of our city. A theatre does not need to be on the water and any large building there cuts off more of downtown from the waterfront.

Rather than building new sports facilities, it is more important to make good use of existing sports facilities.

Re #5 I do not approve of the original plan for a proposed field at the waterfront. This proposal is better.

RE #3 the lakeshore should be left accessible to the residents of the city, not blocked by a performing arts centre

RE #7 above. There is an extensive field sports facility locate at Nelson St and Georgian college. Has negotiation for use of this been considered?

There are 2 soccer fields at Eastview that are rarely used. Is yet another field really needed? If the professional sports team wants a facility that will really only benefit them, then let them pay for it. RE#8 Moving the Baycats to Queens Park may not work because there is no parking at Queens Park.

Re question 1: what is meant by "parade ground"? I support the cadets using the existing parking lot or open lawn area for this. I do not support any additional paving or hard surface treatment replacing existing lawn for the parade ground.

Re the use of Queen's Park: Convert to/add pickleball courts or a cricket field.

Add more parking at South Shore Community Centre

Bike rentals downtown

A revitalized downtown is more than just Dunlop St. A larger performing arts centre is needed, but not on the waterfront (parking is already difficult to find when there are events), especially if there will be 800 or so seats.

Re use of school facilities for sports teams. If used in the evening after school hours would the fields be properly maintained/ cleaned so that this would not become an extra job for school staff? If so I like the idea.

Re Zone Allandale Station Park as environmentally protected land and actively and intentionally diversify the passive park with native Ontario grassland species

Re. public use of outdoor school sports fields - such use may present logistical issues re. potential for damage/wear & tear/garbage clean-up, as well as liability, etc. that could impact, for example, next day school use.

Re: #3 - please consult with performing arts organizations and experts about the design, lest we end up with another not-terribly-useful-to-the-performing-arts-committee facility like the Five Points Theatre (i.e., only one large change room, no room in wings, terrible shape for sound, etc.)

Re: #6 - how is it a "community" sports facility if it's being built for a private sports organization? I do support it if it is actually a community sports facility – if it's for a private sports organization, then they need to pay for it, not taxpayers.

Re: #9 - I would certainly use it if I lived further away, but those areas are within walking distance for me.

Re: Community Arts Centre (Centre for Performing Arts) I would likethose involved with this project MAKE A VISIT TO THE STOCKEY CENTRE IN PARRY SOUND on Georgian Bay!! I have extensive information on this Arts Centre and am willing to share info and take those interested to this fabulous performance space. The acoustics are the best anywhere and the facility attracts TOP performers/entertainers from all over the world. [...]YOU should not miss experiencing this facility & all that it is. I can make connections to the Artistic Director, Designer, Management. I will just say that the facility made use of Muskoka Stone & Wood in its Construction & the seating can be transformed & utilized for banquets etc. Please consider viewing this facility. [...]

RE: performing arts centre — View of the Spirit Catcher from Maple Ave should NOT be obstructed. This sightline should be protected and a building there would block this iconic symbol of Barrie. The new building should not go past where the parking lot is currently because of the sightline, NOT because of parking. The proposed building is too big for the space. Perhaps the building should be split into two separate buildings to preserve the Spirit Catcher sightline. Or the land to the west could be investigated as a possible alternative for one large building because it has more room and is also a parking lot. I also have concerns about the walkway to the east of the Spirit Catcher that connects the waterfront to downtown. This path is a vital connection between the boardwalk and downtown (the other path is bicycles only) and is heavily used. If the shoreline path must be diverted, the new route should be shorter and more direct (instead of going around the far side of the Spirit Catcher). Regarding the other proposals, I am in favour of all of them with the exception of the performing arts centre.

Re: Question 8. Most of the current transit schedules would not facilitate the ability to attend any event that ends after 8 or 9 pm. The cost of adding a transit option to a ticket should fall to the city not the event organizers.

RE: sports teams playing in Queen's Park: more parking needs to be available and the amenities need to be cleaned up to ensure absolute safety for players, children, etc., free of used paraphernalia, broken glass, and garbage on an on-going basis. The mental health & addictions crisis in Barrie needs to be addressed more efficiently to ensure this area of the city is safe for tax-paying families to enjoy. I tend to avoid downtown as I am a woman with a baby. There are wonderful things there but it's extremely disturbing to walk around downtown, I can't imagine watching my nephew play baseball in a park where addicts are stumbling around or

<p>Really appreciated the extensive report. Mr. Green has really transformed how Barrie can incorporate the needs of the community and still remain thoughtful for our much needed green spaces for people but the wildlife too. Thank you for offering this survey.</p>
<p>Really positive and optimistic about the report and all the recommendations made. Some issues were insightful to learn about. One issue I think will be increasingly important to accommodate crowds, traffic and population growth along with these and other developments, will be ensuring alternative methods of transportation. Sidewalks and bikelanes (as a sidewalk expansion rather than a traffic hazards) like a mini version of the waterfront path would make a good model. Additionally the transit system might require some area focused design. The downtown area could offer free transit with parking passes, as an effort to free up space and traffic and boost transit usage in high density areas like the waterfront.</p>
<p>Recently went downtown and am actually appalled by the number of homeless and transient people downtown. The bushes are littered with needles and other garbage. It's great that all these progressive ideas are happening downtown but it doesn't feel safe. Barrie being over run and we seem to be turning a blind eye</p>
<p>Recommend that the seating capacity for the performing arts centre be increased. 250 and 600 seats are not enough for large events.</p>
<p>Reduce spending, reduce taxes. Barrie taxes are not a slush fund for special interest groups</p>
<p>Regarding the performing arts centre, my understanding is that seating is supposed to be 600. This is less than Fisher Auditorium which had seating for about 900. Seating should be at minimum 900. I'm also concerned that the arts centre will be available to local groups at a rental cost that is affordable. One reason Fisher Auditorium was not used by these groups was the cost of rental was more than these groups could afford. Local performing groups need a place that is affordable and can accommodate the needs of the group. Adequate parking is also essential. I'm agreeable to a new sports facility but how close to Dunlop is being considered. This was not explained. Bring the Baycats back to Queen's Park isn't ideal, size and again parking needs to be considered. Another site needs to be considered for the cadets. Part of the appeal of the waterfront is that it's green and accessible to the public. Has another site been proposed? Transit in Barrie is not great in my opinion. To include the price of transit makes no sense. What about those who plan to walk if they're near where the event is or drive. Are two sets of tickets going to be issued? One for transit costs and one not? Confusing and not fair.</p>
<p>Remove the services that homeless rely on from downtown. Create a large facility/campus that has housing, medical access, mental health services, and job assistance programs. Everything they need can be there. No need for them to be on the streets downtown.</p>
<p>Report was well thought out and addressed my concerns about Lakeshore location. Appreciate that residents and taxpayers are having opportunity to add voice to the decisions made by council for special interest groups. It seems that revitalization always hits snags eg. <p>The downtown area needs to take into account the volumes of traffic that will follow these developments. More time and effort needs to be spent on making Barrie public transit more streamlined and make downtown less of a parking lot.</p>
<p>The downtown core is a scary place for many. I think all of these are wonderful ideas but until something is done with the encampment, drug addicts, the trash everywhere, [.....], and bring in more police and get another police station going... honestly... I don't think many people will attend. The new bus system that has been implemented is terrible, it is too complicated to figure out for many.</p>

<p>The downtown needs a public pool, 50m because a city of this size anywhere else outside of Ontario would have a proper pool. This included swimming (25m is 30 years outdated) water polo, diving, kayaking/canoe training, scuba, community groups, etc.</p>
<p>The downtown needs to be cleaned up before spending any money building arts/sports fields. I used to enjoy the downtown, but now the last thing I want is to take my children to walk/shop there. There are always people drunk/drugged arguing with themselves, etc. it doesn't feel safe at all. Spend more money on policing the areas and then talk about building anything there.</p>
<p>The drug users are out of control in downtown Barrie. My family recently went for lunch [...] and everyone on the street were walking zombies. We felt unsafe during the middle of the day. We need a significant increase in police in the downtown before any developments.</p>
<p>The existing Sea cadet property on Simcoe Street is definitely not the place for a performing arts centre. It should be where the Barrie Central auditorium was situated.</p>
<p>The existing downtown is something that I try to avoid, even though I live not far from the area. There are too many cannabis shops, tattoo parlors and vaping shops. Also, there are so many homeless people wandering the streets. I don't know how to fix this, but I think that we need to try.</p>
<p>The fact that council approved the original plan without commissioning such a report is embarrassing, and shows a stunning lack of due diligence by council and city staff. It calls into question how many other projects have been approved by council without appropriate research and study. Do better. Additionally, a lot of these issues (safety of the current sea</p>

cadets location, utilization of the baseball diamond) stem from the large population of drug users and addicts who have been running rampant through the downtown core. These issues need to be solved - a new sports field and theater will not change the fact that people don't feel safe getting to / from these locations. Finally, all of these plans do not provide for adequate parking. I feel like there is an assumption here that people will use transit. Barrie is not a transit-friendly city. Therefore, significant parking needs to be considered in these projects, as well as all other projects in the downtown area. Council should also open all parking lots to residents for free.

The footprint of the proposed baseball diamond is pretty tight. There would need to be high nets to catch stray balls landing by people homes, parked cars etc Love the idea of this park being used.

The former Barrie central lands are now an open watercourse? Is it even possible to build a stadium there and at what cost? Same question about the theatre. It's reclaimed land. Is it possible to build and what is the cost?

The green report is quite clear that the parade ground and or sports field should not be at the Lakeshore proposed site ... And it is somewhat embarrassing that city Council approved the direction of developing the site even though the green report indicated that it was unsuitable for the primary purpose of a parade ground because the surface was too soft. Many have suggested that the second parking lot at the South Shore center be utilized on the occasions that the Navy group requires a parade ground, upon availability (... Not developing a third hard surface beside the two parking lots)

I fully support the development of a theater complex, but I am concerned that it might be too close to the waterfront, possibly impede waterfront access, and that consideration should be given to a site across the street ...note - the yes/no aspect of the survey head severe limitations because conditions couldn't be added

the green space to the east of the south shore needs to be permanently designated as an environmentally protected area so it can never be developed on.

The height restriction was removed on the new condos going up downtown and along the waterfront. I live in a highrise, so obviously not against them. The 35 & 45 story buildings going up look ridiculous along our waterfront. I lived and worked in Toronto for years, that is what happened there, ruined downtown and waterfront. Where I live in Barrie, the proposed projects at 158 & 151 & 153 will cause huge problems re: traffic & infrastructure support. It seems that the only thing that mattered is jamming as many people as possible into skinny talk needle-like buildings

The homeless situation downtown and the encampments need dealt with. We can't all shrug our shoulders about it until the next election.

The idea of having a centre for performing arts on our waterfront would enhance Barrie's landscape and it would enrich cultural activities and connections with other cities in our region as well as internationally.

The initial plans proposed and voted on by city council [.....] generated a great deal of distrust in the community.

The kempenfelt Conference Centre was turned over to the province in 2017 has the city considered opening discussions with the province to seek a partnership with innisfil to move the sea cadets there for safety, provide sports centre and performing arts centre -multiple events could be held at one time , parking and parks and trails on the 20 acre site with a transit line -all wouldn't happen immediately but more people could be accommodated multiple events run ii be a better use of taxpayers money that cluttering up Barrie's waterfront - we need to address the high crime rate, move the homeless and drugs out of downtown ,limit the # of bars cleaning up the main-street - even Creemore with its small boutiques, restaurants, pubs and

craft stores offers more enticement to tourists than downtown Barrie with its old storefronts bars, tattoo parlours empty lots- we don't need any more skyscrapers downtown we are not New York or Toronto - you will lose the sense of community and identity otherwise Barrie just becomes a larger extension of the GTA

The lakefront should be left as is. Natural spaces are in short supply in Barrie. Sporting areas should be built on existing brown sites (e.g: the old Barrie Central site). The costs of the proposed fields and cadet drill areas are exceptionally expensive. Artificial turf should be ruled out due to its toxicity, lack of drainage, cost and lack of functioning as CO2 sinks. Performing arts centre does not need to be built on valuable lakefront parkland.

The land use applications proposed all make sense and seem reasonable. However, the primary issue with all of these developments is traffic congestion and parking. Moving some of the developments off lakeshore and to other downtown areas can help alleviate some of this without needing to pave over waterfront green space.

The lands to the west of Meridian Place to Bayfield Street, if City owned, should be converted to parkland. Lakeshore Drive, from Minets Point Road to Simcoe St., should be renamed Lakeshore Promenade and the speed limit be reduced to 40 kms. (and enforced).

The last couple years I have stopped almost completely coming to downtown Barrie, and I used to be a frequent patron of all shops and restaurants. Unfortunately the downtown no longer feels safe and has so many people doing drugs and setting up their spots that it feels so unsavoury. When you sit on a patio, so many people that are high and drink are walking past that makes it not enjoyable. We did still use the walking path along the water frequently, but not on weekends as it is so busy. The 2 concerns I have with adding more to downtown is how to deal with all the drug/homeless situation? I would not allow my girls to go downtown and use a public washroom or even some public spaces downtown due to safety concerns. I would certainly never let them take a bus that has to go to the downtown station not worth the free ticket. The second concern is congestion and parking for what you are suggesting. Bus terminal is not an option for safety. I also would like to see Barrie's only rubber track be available to the public for use. They have made it like Fort Knox to be able to access it, and there are ways to make it accessible to the community. Other communities have done it- the one near Humber College always has 2 lanes open for community use during the evenings and weekends. There are ways the school board can help make a beautiful turf and track more accessible

The location for the Barrie Baycats is not a good one. If they get moved there should be adequate parking. The transit system in Barrie is terrible

The Mayor & Council should follow Mr Greens suggestions and LISTEN to the public. LEAVE our waterfront alone. Prime example of stupid decisions is Molson Park. Very shortsighted! I refuse to vote for stupidity!

The most interesting question in this survey is the performing arts centre. There seems to be a lot of talk about sports in Barrie but not a lot about the Arts. Perhaps this is because there are only a few, less-than-ideal arts venues in the city. Adding the performing arts centre would be a wonderful step forward.

The new Sports Centre should be located along Bradford Street at the furthest edge from Dunlop Street. Preserve the Dunlop area for future development.

The number one problem downtown is the homeless population. Specifically Dunlop, Collier and Mulcaster streets. Something must be done. It's becoming very scary, especially for the large senior population downtown.

<p>The old Barrie Central property needs to be put to a productive use ! Red Storey field could be put back in play and expanded for track , soccer and football .</p>
<p>The old sea cadet location should be used for an eating establishment with a very large patio. Unlike just about every other waterfront city there is nowhere in Barrie to sit and enjoy a coffee/lunch/glass of wine by the water. And I'm not talking yet another large chain restaurant. It should be uniquely Barrie showcasing local produce (to tie in with the farmers market when it finally moves just over the road). It would be somewhere both locals & visitors would be attracted.[.....]</p>
<p>The only things that should be located downtown are things that will enhance the atmosphere and draw more people. Proposals for soccer and baseball stadiums, while romantic, will not do this. As for the waterfront, don't build anything between the water's edge and Lakeshore Drive - leave this areas as 100% park land.</p>
<p>The organization, Canadian Musicians Cooperative has supported so many musicians. By joining forces with the Barrie Film Festival, they're creating an exciting new platform for artists and creatives in Barrie and surrounding region. This is a thrilling opportunity that will not only enhance the community engagement but also provide Co-op members to showcase their talents and engage with the community.</p>
<p>The PAC could be built on the Smart Centre land on Bradford/Lakeshore lands in a cooperative effort. A partner such as Alphabet (Google) could help fund an expanded vision for a PAC/cultural hub.</p>
<p>The PAC should not be located where suggested, should return to green space. The increase in density in the City will require more green space for folks to enjoy. Currently our waterfront especially around Centennial Beach area is over used between May-Sept. This area should be extension of Heritage Park especially with water access for canoe/kayaking/paddle boarding. Maybe a small concession of some kind. Considering the whole impetus for this report was to looking at the Parade ground and Multi-use sports field initially, not sure how/why this grew into revitalized downtown with pro sports and PAC, All good things but need to be dealt with separately to understand all the financial impact and details. How can we be expected to do a survey without more detail. Why would the Baycats move from a location that has amenities? Queens Park should be maintained with the minor league in mind. We need to do better in maintaining our parks for people. Please ensure the Spirit Catcher remains where it is. If a professional team is looking to relocate to our greenspace and be shared I would hope the professional team would be paying for all of it. Can't imagine a pro team would want to share the space?</p>
<p>The parade ground for the cadets could be a parking lot when not used as a parade ground. As well, a first-class hotel and convention centre needs to go along the lake shore. There is no facility in Barrie to feed 500 hundred people. We have no convention facilities, yet we are only 45 minutes from Pearson. We can't hog a meeting for 1,000 people.</p>
<p>The parade grounds being located where Mr. Green suggests would negatively impact the passive space to the west of Southshore, impact the existing community centre parking, and impact the ability for Kempenfest to hold concerts in their usual setup. The parade grounds should be integrated in the lower grass area between the Southshore Centre and the Kiwanas Pavillion.</p>
<p>The park area be re-zoned as protected land</p>
<p>The parking seems tight for many of these suggestions. I would consider shuttle busses for these events from a proposed pickup spot. I would definitely commit to a shuttle service.</p>

The performing art centre was supposed to be at the old Central location. Now it's suggested to be squished into a tiny space at the waterfront. What? We already have an art gallery in the old library that is a ghost town. A theatre at 5 points that can't hold 50 guests and now tons of money more should be used for another similar location?? Within a kilometre or so? Why can't we have a waters edge restaurant that welcomes boaters to dock at the door? Think the dock in midland, or Boston pizza on the waters edge in Keswick or Gravenhurst or Huntsville. Please use our downtown shore to its most attractive potential!!! Another art gallery?? Big no for me.

The performing arts center should be located on the original site on Dunlop St. The argument that sirens from the adjacent fire station would disturb patrons is absolute rubbish. This station is open Mon-Fri 8:30 am to 4:30 pm, closed Sat & Sun.

The Performing Arts center should not be located on the waterfront. It blocks the view of the lake and the passive enjoyment of residents. A better location would be on the properties adjacent to the Main Library building. Delivery vehicles and loading docks should be kept off the waterfront where pedestrian traffic is promoted. Access Bars and restaurants in the downtown area would be easier and patrons would not be subject to waterfront traffic congestion. The Sea Cadet relocation to the South Shore Community Center hampers the launch and storage of dinghies regarding on water activities. Access to the water is hampered by the natural embankment.

The performing arts center would be a massive addition to the city that would hugely benefit artists, musicians, technical workers/producers/engineers in the music industry. It would also be a huge addition to hosting live events in Barrie at a more professional level. The proposal looks great, looking forward to having more parks directly backing the waterfront.

The Performing Arts center would really revitalize downtown Barrie. I think it's an incredibly good plan. Thanks so much!!

The performing arts center, though a nice idea typically does not have outside views. It would then block lake views and the spirit catcher which can actually be seen all the way up to Wellington Street by residents. To hide the spirit catcher would be a shame. That parking lot should just become more park space and remove the building currently residing there for something useful.

The performing arts centre location is completely unacceptable to me. The focus of a The focus of an arts centre is inside the building, and shouldn't be using prime real estate. This city is desperate for a dining establishment with full height views of the the bay and its activity. It could have two distinct levels accommodating a coffee style bakery or cafe similar to heritage bakery and a good quality restaurant where people would come to dine and take in the views of the bay during all seasons. WE NEED A TRUE WATERFRONT DINING ESTABLISHMENT.

The performing arts centre must have a stage large enough for band and orchestral concerts. It should have a backstage large enough for operas, musicals, and plays. Seating must have enough leg room so that patrons are comfortable when attending performances. If the space on the waterfront is too limited, would the parking lot beside the library or another downtown location be more appropriate? A positive step forward for business in Downtown Barrie!

The performing arts centre needs to be able to accommodate up to 1,000 people, to provide relief to and an alternative to Georgian College Theatre.

The Performing Arts Centre should include 900 seats.

The Performing Arts Centre would be an excellent way to support and foster Barrie's growing culture of creatives and strengthen its community. Everybody will be able to get use out of such a place from the creatives themselves, to those who just enjoy entertainment (which is basically everyone.) Collaborations such as that between the Canadian Musicians Co-

operative and the Barrie Film Festival will bring many people together and foster new connections that will lead to a prosperous community of dedicated, passionate people. As many creatives have begun steering away from the big cities such as Toronto, Barrie has the opportunity to create for itself a hub that will attract many different people who will bring positive and exciting possibilities.

The plan was for the performing arts Centre to be at the old Barrie Central location. So I don't know why that would change, that area can accommodate parking, and is further removed from the direct waterfront, where there are non stop festivals. That location on the water doesn't have enough parking and it going to carry and even bigger price tag, not to mention building two performing arts Centre so close (5 points théâtre). I understand the scope of how they are different, but still.

The problem with a lot of the parks is bathrooms are no longer accessible so people like myself with disabilities that require a bathroom no longer see any park as any option as well as if you're bringing sports teams to the area they're going to need those bathrooms

The problem with the Baycats using Queen's Park would be that there is limited parking in the area, and I don't think the area of Queen's Park available is not large enough for a baseball stadium with stands, etc.

The proposal of the soccer field sports field should be before station one the old high school location. Where the new YMCA was supposed to go! [.....]

The proposed eco-park should be zoned Environmentally Protected so that the community never again has to go through this horrendously divisive process regarding this parcel of land.

The proposed multi-use sports field area needs environmental protection and the passive park needs diversification with native Ontario grassland species.

The proposed space for the Parade Ground will interfere with Kempenfest if the surface material is not adaptable and suitable for multiple purposes.

The Queens park baseball field is no longer being used due to the mass amount of needles, etc found in this field, making it unsafe for our people, especially children. The City of Barrie needs to clean up our land, remove the encampments taking over our parks and stop the panhandling on every corner. It is disgusting and unsafe. Turning Queens Park into the home of the Baycats is not going to fix the needles and garbage issue that area currently has.

The downtown area is unsafe. There is no way I want my children down there playing. There are drugs being done out in the open for our children to see, disgusting and unsafe messes left on the ground, intoxicated people roaming the streets - often in the middle of the road. Bikes are being stolen at an alarming rate, theft rate has increased, people don't feel safe, nor are they safe in our parks and in the downtown area. I am disgusted by what I see happening in the city I have lived in for almost 50 years. The state Barrie is becoming is disgusting and embarrassing.

There are soccer fields all over the city. We don't need another one. Clean up and improve the fields we already have. Why not put these funds to better use? Such as building the much needed YMCA or another community recreation centre which caters to various sports and not just 1 sport? Clean up the drug addicts roaming our streets. Make it safe to leave your bike locked up or walk through the forest trails without being stabbed.

I do not want a large theater built on the waterfront. What an eye sore that would be. It would also block the beautiful waterfront view. No way I would take public transportation to an event downtown. I certainly would not want my ticket to include the cost of transit.



The City does not need a dedicated building for the cadets; especially when it rarely is being used by people. Other youth groups don't need a dedicated building, nor do they have one.

The ideas in this report are horrible ideas and a waste of money and the waterfront.

The reality is navigating Lakeshore and the surrounding streets do not support the current and growing traffic in Barrie. Yes Barrie needs more events and cultural activities, but squeezing them into a centralized area that is already highly congested with limited parking and nowhere to go when an emergency vehicle is trying to use the same roadways is not going to be beneficial for anyone. When reviewing these projects, we need to better realize how the city is currently used and the impacts to navigating the city with its ever growing population and traffic. I have not touched public transportation in the city and over 20 years and refused to for my personal safety. Someone who has lived in Barrie for over 30 years. I also ignore Lakeshore and the events downtown now due to the congestion and lack of parking. Looking at adding these new areas, the committee also needs to look at the economical impact that hosting event like Kempenfest bring to the city. I think the performing art centre would be better suited to some of the available lands along Bradford Street that can accommodate adequate parking for its location.

The recurring theme is that the sea cadets need a parade ground. Are they going to parade in January at 20 below on an open air parade ground. Why not look into a deal with the armories that would provide a 12 month inside parade ground I am not aware of anything ever being said about all the boats and paraphernalia the sea cadets require. Where will all this stuff be stored and have access to the bay and how does this affect the south shore buildings and area

The reduction of parking at Southshore is a concern. The parking lot is often half closed for wedding and other private events. Please consider finding a way to allow for a similar amount of parking to be available at Southshore since construction will remove a good chunk of available parking in the lot

The removal of trees for a walking park is taking away from the nature experience and feels more like a stroll in a neighborhood. Also would draw more attention for people out of town to setup picnics and leave garbage and more space for the city to maintain

The report and recommendations are excellent. City council needs to follow these recommendations.

The report focuses on community based activities with particular attention to sports, entertainment, and the environment. The downtown core also has serious issues that must be acknowledged in any plan for revitalization. What positive solutions are being considered for those people who are homeless, suffering from mental illness, or living in poverty? Ignoring the problem does not erase the issues. Revitalization must include thought and consideration of all issues including the challenging issues. I would like to read Mr. Green's ideas from an expanded, inclusive perspective. Thank you for the opportunity to comment.

The report is a great plan for the City of Barrie Congratulations

The report is a great plan. Fully support all the motions presented. Thank you for listening to the community feedback.

The report is intelligent and well-researched. I love the idea of the theatre spaces at the current sea cadet location. This, combined with changes to the usages of Queen's Park, will elevate the downtown core. Existing parking exists. I don't think the report clarifies where the sea cadets' indoor space will be. Apparently the Barrie Canoe Club will be impacted. I'd be interested in the answer to that question, but that aside, the report is comprehensive and

<p>forward-looking in a very positive way. Barrie could be a wonderful city with some of this type of informed, progressive development.</p>
<p>The report is well thought out, comprehensive and should endorsed by the elected officials of Barrie</p>
<p>The report seems to provide logical approaches to meeting some community needs.</p>
<p>The report should be adopted in its entirety. We need to have safe spaces downtown , With this useage plan we can hopefully take area back from drug users- but city will need to oversee areas so needle useage does not keep people away from area. The sports group need to come together and look at plans to share facilities- gone are the days fields can b one use only</p>
<p>The report was logical and well informed. Unlike that original plan to destroy the area near southshore. I think Mr. Green's report supports a revitalization of downtown that could help reduce crime and the disarray currently in that area.</p>
<p>The report was refreshingly readable. Mr Green was able to do what others, constrained by silos, could not achieve. Barrie has been waiting for a suitable Performing Arts Centre for many years and I am hoping this will result in action by the City to get this in the ground. Arts groups are very supportive and have proven their ability to work together toward this goal. Yes, economics are challenging, but this new venue will revitalize the downtown and strengthen the local economy.</p>
<p>The report was well thought out to creatively find solutions that do not jeopardize the pristine environment of Barries Lakeshore. Plastic turf has no place near natural environments. Housing and community centers are more important that a soccer field and soccer team. Our community needs basic services(housing and transit etc) prior to a professional sports team arriving. Many of us do not want my tax money going towards a soccer field.</p>
<p>The revitalizing of downtown cannot be the only solution to drug use or unhoused populations using Queens park and downtown. Subsidized housing, mental health and substance abuse support, and other social issues cannot be pushed aside because a new baseball diamond is getting made. Money from new builds should go back into the community and specifically help vulnerable people in Barrie.</p>
<p>The Sea Cadets are hardly EVER on the water. Move them elsewhere, but not at the expense of our waterfront.</p>
<p>The sea cadets could use the proposed sports complex for practices or the proposed baseball field as it's within walking distance</p>
<p>The Sea Cadets moving to the basement/shared location with the rowing club at Southshore is brilliant. The parade grounds is not. It is not required as they can use other locations for such activities. Plastic turf on a naturalized, waterfront area just adds insult to injury. A sports field should not be on the waterfront. There are plenty of unused spaces that would make a better fit. I was both appalled at the lack of consultation and aghast at the speed (with lack of environmental consideration) when this first passed by City Council. I was then furious. I am still at a loss for words.</p>
<p>The shoreline of Kempenfelt Bay should remain as natural as possible to protect Lake Simcoe. Once it is altered or more pressure is put on it we threaten that resource. Keep biodiversity and the health of the lake at the forefront always when making decisions that impact such a valuable fresh water lake that we as a community are so fortunate to have as our city backdrop. Protection and preservation should always be first when considering impact to such a valuable resource.</p>
<p>The shoreline park area should be protected from any further sports facilities but kept for the passive use by residents and not adding to mass traffic issues on Lakeshore.</p>

The south shore centre is not the proper location for the cadets or any sports field. There is not enough parking, no change room or washrooms. The former sea cadets site is also no appropriate space for a performing arts centre. Barrie needs to stop building for 2 years from now and building for 10-20 years from now. A 200 and 600 person theatre is a very awkward amount of people for the arts scene that Barrie wants. Parking is a huge issue as well. We keep tearing up parking lots to make room for condos or buildings. The parking tower is a disaster and scary so I would never park there. I think the bay cats would draw huge crowds if they were to play at queens park. It's such an underrated space that will be revitalized and revamped with their presence. I think the skatepark should actually be located by the water if we were looking to move anything. People need more than just bars and clothing stores to get them downtown. When the movie theater was there you could go watch a show and then go for dinner. There isn't anything like that anymore. This could bring that back.

The south shore community will be very displeased if the City uses our tax dollars for a privately owned soccer team stadium or field of any kind. Keep the south shore waterfront environmentally protected.

The south shore is a great place for the cadets. However, there is no need for a parade ground. They can block off the parking ground and march there. The money for a parade ground could be better used elsewhere.

The South Shore should be left as a natural space. Barrie has so many in sports areas. Lampman Lane the Huronia Park sports areas the new fields surrounding Painswick park, the facilities at the new high school. These need to be more fully used or projects that require land development planned as multiuse, this would have been a great idea for the old playground site that sat vacant for years over developing green space.

The South Shore Waterfront should continue to be non commercial and open access for everyone to enjoy fully and free of charge. Non Barrie residents could be charged a fee to park to offset costs of road maintenance and staff to protect the land by forest management,

The Southshore area is not a place for a Sports field. I agree.

The Southshore park should be actively and intentionally renaturalized with Ontario native species.

The Southshore should be left alone. No one asked for it to be built up. It's the only green space we have left downtown barrie, many family's who grew up here have enjoyed that space to walk and observe nature. I myself grew up walking through it with my mother.

The Southshore should stay as is and there needs to be a major work project to house/move the homeless and drug dealers from the downtown core. I know so many people who won't go downtown because of this. A lot of business being lost.

The sports field should not be down at the waterfront

The sports issue and the performing arts issue are separate issues. Keep them that way. Other fields around the city I understand, are under-utilized and many have washroom facilities. Sorry, but some of these sports groups are acting like petulant children about this and as entitled ones at that! They need to work together for the benefit of everyone. Also why don't the sea cadets use the armories? Other cadets do. I was a sea cadet 1000 years ago and we paraded in an armories. I don't get that. They can use the South Shore for boat work in the summer and the, "parade square," is useless in the winter. The whole south shore area is reclaimed railway lands and the remediation is important. As of now, those lands need to be declared as sacrosanct and legislation put in place, that can't be undone, not to develop them in the future

The Survey is not giving an option to say 'NO' to the sports field location at the Waterfront. Why was this not included in the survey so that Council can assess the number of people that agree that it should NOT be located there. This issue is the basis of the recommendation report. It also does not touch on alternative sites for soccer fields within Barrie. It is absolutely imperative for City Staff to prepare a report that assesses other soccer location options and identifies the number of sports fields required due to population and demographic projections and potential priority locations and timelines for these fields to be constructed (NOT INCLUDING THE WATERFRONT FIELD). We asked for this before the vote in May...and it is still very very important.

The synergy of the Canadian Musicians Co-operative and the Barrie Film Festival being resident arts tenants in the new performing arts centre is very cutting edge and creates many opportunities for them to work together for the benefit of the community for the long term.

The theatre needs to be larger than 250 seats somewhere where there can be lots of parking. The former sea cadet property needs to be a bustling restaurant mid priced

The transit service is terrible. The police are not doing their job. This city is in trouble. Thank you Mayor!

The undeveloped areas of the Southshore must be kept safe from commercial exploitation and remain a passive park with nature trails to be enjoyed by residents and visitors. Once the last remnants of the natural environment are lost to pavement and sports fields you will never get them back.

The value of the overall proposal is the integration and linking of the ideas with the overall goal of serving the diverse needs of the community and enhancing the quality of the city core. Whatever is decided should be in context of this and not isolated aspects that addresses only one opportunity.

The water front should be left as an undeveloped space for everyone to enjoy freely.

The waterfront area should Definitely NOT be used for sports groups-that would only accommodate a small percentage of tax payers, while causing even more congestion along the waterfront, and the single lane roadway.

The waterfront area should not be overcrowded with buildings and uses that do not use the water. Overcrowding causes the natural beauty to be degraded and lost. The downtown Arts centre should be placed in another place not on the water. There is no advantage for such a building to be there versus on Dunlop Street or near the city Hall. The downtown would benefit from the revitalization of an arts area where there are creative studios that residents can take part in or showcase their work. Also using Queens park as a sporting area would make sense.

We need to make the downtown safer for residents to make all of this possible. There are many homeless and drug using individuals that make the area inaccessible to families or women generally and particularly in the evenings. This is the first thing that needs to be addressed before any of these other projects can be successful.

The waterfront attracts so many visitors that there is no parking. It's too busy. Keep Barrie Bay cats where they are. What's wrong with the theater locations now? We need to clean up downtown. Nobody goes to queens park because of drug paraphernalia.

The waterfront in Barrie must be kept for public use!!!! Green spaces and parks must take priority as all mobility levels and age groups can use them. Parking for pro soccer games will be difficult to create on the lakeshore. Therefore, plan to create a pro soccer facility farther out in the Barrie limits.

The waterfront is beautiful there is a lot of land on Bradford and Dunlop that could be built up the waterfront should not have a sports field or other big more commercialized facility on it

The waterfront is no place for a sports field, as it would create too much traffic and take green space which is important to preserve. That area is already overcrowded on weekends. A good place would be the old fairgrounds. Although purchased by developers, it has been an eyesore for too many years. If the developers can't build, then the city should take it back. Another area for a sports field could be the land once occupied by Prince of Wales School and Barrie Collegiate. Queens Park is not large enough and too close to a residential area to accommodate the Baycats. As for the downtown... We have lived in Barrie for over 30 years and all that time we've heard the downtown will be fixed up. From what we see, it is worse. Individuals with homeless and/or drug and/or mental health issues who want to be helped, should be. Those who don't want help should be taken elsewhere. It is unsettling to be downtown at an any time of day and see groups hanging around. The older buildings need to be cleaned and painted. There are too many cannabis stores. The downtown could be nice as it has a great location.

The waterfront natural area should have an environmentally protected zoning, and should include purposefully planted gardens/meadows with native pollinator supporting plants.

The waterfront needs public washrooms. otherwise, it is a highly used public space that is already successfully supporting the city.

The waterfront needs to be protected. The building of large facilities only increases the number of risks to the waterfront and the many animals that occupy the waterfront. Building a performing arts center on the waterfront is a waste of money, the current theatre at the five points is barely used, if it still exists. Why waste my tax dollars to build a facility that won't get used. Better to spend the money at the Georgian College facility. I've grown up in Barrie and now live here as an adult with my family, I ask that you leave the waterfront only and focus on increasing the natural habitat for the citizens of Barrie to enjoy and the wildlife to flourish.

The waterfront should be about nature and parks for everyone not special interest projects

The waterfront should be deemed untouchable and to be preserved for what it is, a water park and natural environment at the south shore.

The waterfront should be maintained for water related activities. The city should infill the existing developed areas with other developments for soccer, baseball etc. Greenspace should not be sacrificed for built recreational areas.

Bike lanes and transit should be considered or expanded in areas with sports fields.

The waterfront is NOT an appropriate place for a large sports field.

The whole city is against the sports complex being right on the waterfront, will destroy the habitat and wildlife will lose their homes. You really need to start listening to the citizens who actually live here. Parking is already brutal with out of towners at the lakeshore and this will make it worse. Not to mention you're not doing anything to make the lakeshore area safe for us to walk with the amount of open drug use there. Take the funding for the sports complex and put that towards helping the homeless.

There are a number of questions that don't appear to be available to residents. Why weren't residents, generally, and those who reside in Ward 2, specifically, consulted when the report was being developed? It looks very sneaky, on Council's part, to have a report undertaken for very specific purposes, without public engagement prior to the report being finalized and shared with Council.

Who is Marshall Green? Why was he specifically retained to undertake this report? What is his background? Did Mr. Green review the comprehensive community plan for Barrie? Is this report why zoning changes are being made? Why was the Mayor so heavily involved in "suggesting" where Mr. Green should focus his report and research? From what I can tell, Mr. Green is not a planner and simply composed the report because he initially disliked it.

What is the cost associated with adopting the recommendations in the report? How are they going to impact taxes for Barrie residents and those specifically within Ward 2?

How does the City plan to fund these projects? through raising taxes? Mr. Green's report specifically states up front that he has not proposed how these projects would be funded and would seek to recommend some fundraising opportunities. This seems poorly planned from Council's perspective and I would argue strongly against moving forward with any reports or projects that DO NOT consider how such projects would be funded.

How do these projects benefit the community at large? Would it make more sense to take the funds that would be devoted to these projects and put them into other community programs and services that would benefit all residents - children, youth, adults, seniors?

With the influx of people moving into the downtown over the next 5-10 years, the City should be doing a much better job of planning how infrastructure at large will be addressed; as well as green spaces, etc for those individuals to utilize. The use of these areas for very specific projects (ie the Baycats) puts much stock in the assumption that all residences will like baseball or go to the field at Queens Park. In my mind, this is not an assumption that should be made in the positive.

The fact that Mr. Green's report - as it relates to Queens Park - is all opinion is not comforting. It appears he spoke to one individual - that of the Baycats President who would not bring an unbiased view to consultations on this matter. Mr. Green believes, naively, that bringing a larger stadium to Queens Park (and by assumption more people) will eliminate or remove those "unfortunate" people from the area. Let's call it what it is - those suffering from homelessness. Mr. Green's approach is to cover this wound with a small bandaid and make it someone else's problem. The fact is - the current ball diamond was used extensively prior to the pandemic. As the pandemic played out and more people suffering homelessness came to Barrie due to the shelters/hotels that opened, more people were in Queens Park. It was the CITY who REMOVED the bleachers from that ball diamond so that those people suffering homelessness would not congregate there. How is building a NEW ball park, etc going to help with this? Suggesting that more police presence in the area raises a number of other issues; not only around an increase in possible violence due to police presence, but also around the operations of the Barrie Police (an issue for another day).

My suggestion is that the City retain a actual planner to do a full feasibility study on the downtown core and how the City should address growth in population, use of infrastructure, etc rather than base its decisions on the whimsy of what appears to be an individual, who was in the right place and right time, to get the Mayors attention and who, from what I can tell, has very little experience in municipal planning.

There are four areas in the downtown core that have been addressed in this survey:

1. Queen's Park – established large area, baseball has previously been played there, just need more parking.
2. General John Hayter Southshore Community Centre – Cadet's would be better suited for their needs in that area across the bay. It is far enough away from the downtown core. Other amenities listed would be suited for the area, just need more parking.
3. Performing Arts Centre – Location by the bay is good. Probably a 1,000-seat auditorium would be more in keeping with the growing size of the city. If parking cannot be addressed,

<p>then a location that can accommodate parking should be found.</p> <p>4. Community Sports Facility – This would be too big for the downtown area, with everything else planned. Plus, a lot of parking would be required.</p>
<p>There are lots of positives in Marshall's report. The former site of Barrie Central would be a good location for a small to mid-size stadium...another location for consideration of a sports facility should be the former location of the Barrie raceway...lots of space and potential for parking and right off the 400 with easy access.</p>
<p>There are many many fields in my area to consider for this field eg. lennox park which currently has numerous soccer fields which could be reconfigured to support this project</p>
<p>There are plenty of places in Barrie for sports facilities to be built. The waterfront is NOT one of them.</p> <p>Parking must be a consideration for any new facility. Putting the Baycats in Queens park will reduce the amount of available parking from the stadium they currently use. If you're expecting people to wait at a bus stop in a sketchy area of town, perhaps rethink that.</p> <p>Perhaps consider moving the David Busby centre to the South end near the go station and build an entertainment centre near City Hall, the Art Gallery and the library. It would be nice if these places were safely accessible to taxpayers and not just the homeless drug users that now utilize the facilities.</p> <p>The Yonge Street area near the Go station offers an easy way for those homeless folks to hop on a train back to Toronto. That's where the Food Bank and Shelters should be relocated to. Why are we making life so convenient for people to arrive here and take advantage of our services?</p>
<p>There are plenty of ways to revitalize the downtown without sacrificing our peaceful access to nature along the south shore area. Not to mention the further encroachment on wildlife in the area that a sports complex would impose. In the 20+ years I have lived in Barrie we've already seen a change in the wildlife in the same area as a result of the military heritage park. I'm all for honouring the military but now we have a fox den that has been disrupted forever. Please do not further disrupt wildlife by developing the south side area even more - we need our peaceful places close to nature and the water</p>
<p>There are so many unused fields in Barrie as it is. There is NO need for a new field downtown. Use/update/revitalize already designed spaces in the city!</p> <p>More washrooms along lakeshore would be a great asset for the city. With all of the people lakeshore attracts more washroom facilities are needed.</p>
<p>There are some beautiful old maples and oaks that would be cut down in queens park if you had to make room for a baseball field of that size. Those trees are probably older than the city itself. Please think of them when you are considering this plan.</p>
<p>There are too many people doing drugs on the water front. My family I can no longer walk the water front without being heckled or being asked for something by these individuals. Clean up the atmosphere of the waterfront, that would make the biggest impact.</p>
<p>There don't seem to be many options presented, but feel this is more asking for agreement with only one option. A more thorough and public consultation process would be helpful to engage better with the residents for these big projects using tax dollars. Do not recommend any global partnerships and recommend prioritizing Barrie business and residents wants and needs.</p>

There is a concerning lack of information about resources for the homeless population in this survey. The information circulating about proposed strong-arm policies is inhumane and isn't a problem solving strategy. I like most of the proposals here, save for the conversion of the used green space at Allendale station, but we can't have a vibrant, walkable, well-used downtown without providing more support to the people forced to live on its streets and in its parks. Failure to plan these two things alongside one another is failing to assist our most vulnerable residents and will result in disappointing outcomes for much of what is hoped for in this proposal.

There is a lot of vacant land behind the waterfront, use that land to build condos. stop putting ugly condos close to the waterfront. you're ruining a beautiful area for the benefit of developers and it does not benefit the vast majority of residents. Meridian place deserted most of the time because of the homeless issue. Put some money towards fixing housing or all your plans will go to waste.

There is a need/demand for additional docks/boating space in the downtown waterfront area with clubhouse, restaurant, lockers, showers etc. A theatre could be built on a lot that doesn't require a waterfront view...people will be indoors watching performances. Theatres typically don't have windows in the concert hall or auditorium. Transit might be offered to the proposed new venues but most people will still drive so plan for parking.

There is absolutely not enough space for the Baycats to play at Queens Park. As a member of the organization, we have always hoped to move the stadium into Barrie proper, there is not enough room for out of town parking, team bus parking, and fan facilities.

There is already no parking downtown...why try and cram more stuff downtown? You also need to do something with the homeless people and the drug users...I do not feel safe even in a group being downtown during the day and especially at night

There is an empty building across from the Bradford street mall, that I feel could be used for performing arts. Or taken down and turned into the cadet field area.

There is enough stress on the waterfront as is. Leave it be. But, Dunlop is a good place for the performing arts centre and the sports field, etc...

There is far too much traffic congestion down town, lakeshore is an absolute disaster for traffic... adding all these proposed changes will make traffic insufferable, there is already limited parking, there is no way any of this will work... there should be more park space and café along the lake shore...

Where on Dunlop do you plan a sport center? Out side of Ferndale maybe, that would work... the old barrie central grounds that might work, but again parking nightmare... you guys are trying to add attractions that could draw thousands, but have no where to park.

The baycats downtown, seriously? Where do the spectators park? There isn't even enough parking for rec league games.

Terrible idea putting the sea cadets at South shore center, at least in the proposed location, put them on the water, give them direct access to the water, then the building won't obstruct views from the road, won't interfere with festivals etc.

Terrible location for the arts center too, again no parking, obstructing views and uses of the water front, lakeshore cannot handle the current traffic it has.

So many vacant lands all over the city, no need to be cramming everything downtown and on the waterfront, pretty soon there won't be a waterfront to enjoy... City should be spending more money to clean up the homeless people and drugs, there is no police presence DT, and what is there is useless not doing anything to make it safer. Needles, drugs, violence, murders, stabbings, the list goes on.

There is hardly enough parking now, Nevermind adding the marching space for the cadets. I can't always find parking, & I'm a resident with a pass.

<p>There is no emphasis here on the downtown revitalization; the majority of this proposal relates to sport or theatre. There needs to be a bigger emphasis on cleaning up the downtown- fewer addicts, less homelessness, more support for the SMALL BUSINESSES, including shops and restaurants so that families can go and enjoy things like open air Dunlop without fear their young children will be exposed to addiction and fear for their safety. We hate to see restaurants and stores closing because the support all seems to favour those with substance abuse and mental health issues- let's provide those individuals with supports and resources they need to get them off the street and support our small businesses and entrepreneurs so that we can all go downtown and enjoy the water front, theatre and sports that you suggest we could all enjoy with these upgrades. First we deal with cleaning up the downtown THEN the rest follows. Please cleanup the bus station and transition it into the market that has been promised for years. Please support small businesses and the infrastructure so that our downtown can flourish</p>
<p>There is not enough information provided to vote for these things. For example: To have a baseball diamond at Queen's Park, there is currently not enough parking. If parking is not going to be increased, then no, the Baycats should not relocate there. If parking is increased, then possibly they should relocate once probable noise issues have been dealt with. The cadets do not need a special marching field. One of the parking lots can be closed off when they are marching. Or they can march inside the Hayter Centre or continue to march where they do now. Nothing should ever be built on the waterfront. The arts centre can be built on site of current bus station and can have patios and decks that overlook the water. It must have good, safe parking for patrons. When more information is provided, I would be interested in re-doing this survey.</p>
<p>There is too little parking available. Consider addressing the homeless and marginalized people that are dwelling in downtown Barrie to make public transit safer in the area.</p>
<p>There must be some creative incentives to attract people to use Barrie Transit instead of taking their own vehicles. There wont be enough parking and as it stands Barrie Transit would not be effective. Overall I like this plan. We do have a housing crisis and homelessness crisis that needs to be dealt with in a proactive and humain way. Wrap around services for housing and mental health in the same bulding/locations. Top priority.</p>
<p>There needs to be adequate parking planned for any sports arena. This parking should be free for minor sports events and practices but paid if for larger concerts or professional paid for sports events. The arena should include food and alcohol services. There needs to be an indoor sports dome so that games/concerts can occur year round.</p>
<p>There remains the question of parking. Building a sports field or moving the Baycats to Queen's Park will bring commuters no matter how you try to promote transit. This was one of the major flaws in the last proposal for a waterfront park (Baycats/ Jamie Massey). Revitalizing downtown is a great idea but parking needs to be addressed. And... has anyone asked why we would consider building a soccer pitch 500 metres away from the windiest spot in Barrie, Minets Point? Great for kite surfers and wind sports but terrible for skills development for minor soccer.</p>
<p>There should be more basketball courts in the northeast end</p>
<p>There should not be a sports soccer field near the waterfront.</p>

<p>There wasn't a space to comment about the Barrie Baycats and the use of Queen's Park. I think it would be great to have them in the downtown if they want to be there. However, Queen's Park should be a neighbourhood park for everyone to use, including a ball diamond or sports field. If it's underused, what could be done to encourage people to use it? If more people are moving into the downtown, we need more park space not less. Also, it appears that the size of the diamond and stands for the Baycats requires more space than just cramming it in according to the diagram. The impact on the neighbourhood should also be considered.</p>
<p>There will need to be parking created. The safety issues created by people using drugs in public and encampments needs to be addressed. This is urgent as we work to invite more people to our downtown. I'm embarrassed by our beautiful city currently.</p>

<p>These options all sound good...just don't plan too much for our beautiful and pristine waterfront</p>

<p>These recommendations are fantastic, and a great way to revitalize the downtown core. As someone who owns a business across the road from Queen's Park, I believe strongly in all of these proposals. Thank you.</p>

We do not have the road set ups and parking areas to handle large crowds. The safety of downtown would need a major improvement before you bring in more people. Think we are a very long way from a rivitalized downtown. How about we work on people being comfortable to actually visit our downtown, let alone the city itself. Not exactly the best reputation it has.

They could March at Queens Park maybe
Area needs to be very much improved....lots of drug use in the area....but if better monitored would work for them.

We don't need another performing arts centre where sea cadet building is ...for one it is too small and too close to existing performing centre ...5 points.
Use it with the marina....boat cruise head quarters....etc.

Also Barrie Baycats in Queens Park...again area needs very close monitoring...frankly it is scary down there...Baycats are fine where they are....but could we have a BayCat Bus to transport from Meridian Place up t Midhurst
If Queens Park has a big retrofit and people feel safer....then yes viable option to consider

This city is all about sports. We have been trying to get a performing arts centre in Barrie for years. I went to an open house meeting a few years ago that had a site already picked out but nothing seems to have come of it.

With all the new condos going in and under plans that are basically on the street, the city isn't even touching on the fact that we can't support the number of people coming to the downtown core for proposed Baycat games, performing arts centres, etc. Single lanes of traffic in and out, lack of parking. You're setting it up for failure. Where is the proper planning and long term vision? Approving these massive condo buildings with inadequate parking, limiting expansions of roads, it'll be a nightmare.</p>
<p>Traffic nightmare. What used to be a quick trip across town, no longer exists even without adding additional sporting venues. People wanting to watch sporting events do not need to do that on the waterfront. Choose carefully as getting waterfront back will not ever happen. Parking for/to venues also negotiate flat rate for taxi, Uber, etc. as optional extended hour operation. All proposals - sensitivity to surrounding residential uses/communities also required.</p>

Waterfront Eco park should be environmental protection so that no one can ever build on it.
Waterfront space should be maintained for residents' enjoyment of the lake. Park space and more access to the water (beach? Dog beach? Public swimming docks?) should be a priority. A theatre complex which is mostly indoors should not use up waterfront space. If I were a downtown resident I would not want the Baycats or concerts creating noise and parking problems.
We absolutely DO NOT need a soccer park of any kind downtown. Clean up the homeless camps before you build anything else. What about all of the homelessness + crime in Barrie, specifically downtown? All of these plans sound good, but there are other really big problems in our city, specifically safety.

What about parking for those who come from out of town for such events?

What an exciting vision Mr Green has outlined his report! I do hope we will finally get a performing arts center. I moved to Barrie in 1981 and we were being promised one then..... Still nothing. :-(

I particularly am thrilled with the idea of leaving the south shore area in its natural state and using it for perhaps interpretive walks using audio, education on the history of the area etc. Preserving, maintaining and enhancing the natural beauty of the area.

What an incredibly important report that sought taxpayer input! My issues with City 'progress' are two: The renaming of the Southshore Community Centre and the City's [.....] not embracing the unique market positioning of Barrie-By-The-Bay. An official launch to brand Barrie would make national TV news and even inform new south Barrie residents that Barrie is actually located on the Bay. [.....]

Why are no other areas in Barrie being looked at?

Why did I not see anything about more parking lots to accommodate all of these things?

The waterfront is already BUSY! Friends could not even come cheer us on at the Dragon Boat Festival on Saturday because they could not find parking.

Why do we want to make this worse?

I would never attend a Baycats game in the worst part of Barrie full of homeless people, drug addicts and violence.

The waterfront has been a place that I have enjoyed for years but it has become too crowded and unsafe once you pass the beach and get into the downtown core. It is littered with homeless people setting up camp, making you feel unsafe, watching them do drugs on park benches, stealing etc. Residents are the ones who pay taxes to use these facilities and we are now not wanting to.

How about you clean up the City first??

Where is the survey about making Barrie safe again?

Stop ruining the waterfront.

Build this stuff elsewhere. It doesn't need to be by the water.

Noone wants to walk down Dunlop anymore. It isn't safe. This stuff isn't bringing any business to downtown. People will come and leave and eat elsewhere. They aren't taking a leisurely stroll afterward to Dunlop to be harassed, robbed, stabbed!, by the people you keep allowing to do this.

Why do you give into a small group of whiny citizens who will attend nothing that you put there not be happy with anything that you do unless it is trees it's Canada. There's 50 billion trees.

Why does this survey not allow more open answers to the questions related to the proposed locations? A yes or a no is too absolute when it comes to major changes. I might be in favour of more sports locations in Dunlop but not paying a large sum of money to entice a team to come or building a stadium that will never recoup the cities investments.

Why have another performing center right next to the Pratt homes performing center.

Why is current location unsafe for Sea Cadets but okay for performing arts centre? That doesn't make sense! Taking away green space at the waterfront is a shame in my opinion, as answered in #3. Traffic would be crazy & parking a nightmare. Why is the Barrie Sports Complex not suitable anymore for the Barrie Baycats? If I was a resident in the Queens Park area, I would be devastated if this idea proceeded. It's a quaint, quiet neighbourhood not to mention the retirement home & long term care home across the street. Lots of facilities & parking at the complex. If no transit is offered to this location - why not? You're suggesting it for the new proposed location on Dunlop West. Please keep the lakefront a peaceful, park setting for the city & visitors to enjoy. The Sea Cadets is a very worthy organization. I would like to know what other location choices are available to them.

Why is the current location for the sea cadets considered unsafe yet it is safe enough for a performing arts centre? Why can't the sea cadets have parade grounds as part of the

performing art centre. The solution for them is not to move, but to make their location more safe. I assume redevelopment would do that?

Why need a parade ground for 1 hour per week weather permitting when we have a parking lot that is mainly empty when cadets meet.

Why not build pickle ball courts at Queen's Park. Participation in the game is exploding and there aren't enough courts. For the Baycats.... why not look at Bradford Street strip of land where "Harmony Village" was going to be located?

The following comments are very important.

There are all kinds of plans for the downtown area (including cultural center) to expand, beautify and showcase Barrie. There has been a concerted effort to build more condominiums and populate the downtown. It is apparent that some of the salient issues related to both the downtown and bordering areas have not been addressed and require solutions. This includes the significant increase in the downtown population of the homeless, addicted and mentally ill people.

Downtown Barrie and the bordering streets have changed significantly over the past few years. The changes have become more visible and salient and have escalated even more significantly over the past couple of years. Issues and deteriorating environmental conditions were evident before but unfortunately were not adequately addressed. They have escalated dramatically, and it is directly related to the location of the Busby Centre which is located on Mulcaster Street directly across from the courthouse. We know this firsthand as we are personally living with them because of where we reside. We have grandchildren who visit us and our neighbor has young children. There are also many seniors living nearby. We have lived in the same location for many years and in the past felt safe in this area. This is no longer the case. I will describe some of the occurrences which I believe you may already be quite aware of.

In the city plan, the east side of the Collier has been designated for professional use.

At times we have been awakened in the middle of the night with screaming, swearing and arguing. On one occasion 911 was called as the noise was so loud and worrisome that I thought someone was being assaulted or might be murdered. Sometimes at night or in broad daylight, it is a person (or persons) walking up (or staggering) the street shouting, arguing, swearing with self or others.

Frequently there have been individuals lying on the edge of the property at the Collier Street United Church. There are often people congregated outside the church either heavily mediated or on drugs.

There is a house beside the dumpster on the Collier Street church as well as a stairwell. The house has been rented a couple of times to older people who have had some bad experiences. The latest one terminated her lease as someone tried to break into her backyard and she was terrified. She was elderly and lived alone there. Sometimes there are people hiding and/or sleeping or "shooting up" near or beside the dumpster. I have seen people changing their cloths there. Walking by the Collier Street United church is uncomfortable as there are many people sitting/lying and some obviously stoned on the property.

Recently, I was having coffee in the morning, and I saw a man crossing through our backyard. I was quite startled and screamed out at him. He quickly rushed to the side of our house. He seemed to know exactly where he was going. There is a gate there and a lock on it. He exited very quickly so we thought he may have jumped the fence. In checking this out we found that the lock on the gate was cut. When we investigated where he got through, we found that he was coming from a gap between our fence and the neighbors. To get through to our property he had to climb up on a few stones which were strategically placed by him to do this. At the site of this entry point there was a lighter and our neighbor found a "crack pipe." This entry point is not visible from our backyard, and it is sheltered. We believe this person had been gaining entry and maybe even sleeping there over a period of some time.

A few months ago, another elderly neighbor who lives alone on our street called the police or 911 as she heard someone breaking into her house at night. She was terrified and was guided on the phone what to do. The police got there quickly and were able to apprehend the person who entered her home. Apparently he was out of jail on parole.

Often when walking along Collier Street we have seen individuals coming from some of the business buildings. We used to shop on Dunlop Street but are now aware of three businesses that have left or are in the process of leaving the area because of what is happening on Dunlop and the surrounding area.

Other things noticed include garbage strewn along Collier and the surrounding area. People camped out at the courthouse, the Busby and the surrounding areas ie. Berzy park etc. A friend who rents an apartment close to the downtown told me that there is an issue with homeless people finding refuge on the property or in the lobby when possible. Apparently, they have defecated in these spots as well. When we go for a walk, we must be careful not to step on vomit. This is not only on Dunlop but also along Collier Street.

It is so bad that we now need to have paid people from the Group One Community Program, walking the streets to look for syringes, needles and other drug related paraphernalia. They walk around between 8 am and midnight. Apparently, that isn't enough, and I believe they plan to increase their time. I am told that by mid-morning they have almost filled their protective containers with needles and syringes.

There was a time we really enjoyed living close to the downtown and walking to the downtown centre, stores and waterfront. There are many issues as I have outlined that are impinging on our quality of life, safety and comfort. We have a right to continue living here and we should be able to feel safe.

Barrie needs to address these issues and although the downtown should be enjoyed by all this will never happen unless these long-standing issues are properly addressed. I believe that it is critical that our concerns and those of other long time residents (including the bordering areas) should be properly addressed before expanding.

Why not develop it over by the area of the Sadlon centre

Why not make the south shore centre a Small Craft Boat Access for the public? Partner with BRC and BCKC to use their dock. Add a secure, attractive fence with racks for the public to pay a fee to store their kayak, paddle board or canoe (for all the people in condos or apartments) to easily get on the water without using their car to carry boats everyday. Add a bigger fenced area for boats from Cadets so they don't have to be stored inside. See a great (secure, attractive fencing) example of this in Fredericton - easy to google. Move bike rentals to this area too for visitors from out of town.

Build a building for cadets with : secure area for cadets uniforms, storage, and workshop PLUS a larger water view meeting room/classroom that could be rented by the public and cadets.

Partner with city of Barrie and BRC and BCKC to offer small water craft day camps out of the 'new' meeting room. While your building it, why not build TWO big meeting rooms beside existing south shore centre (underground-ish) with secure rooms at the very back for cadets and bathrooms. They could used by cadets, rented by public and kids or summer camps.

Why not tear down existing cadet facility and build a new facility on the same grounds and upgrade their docks. As a longtime resident I have had to drive my kids out to the Barrie sports complex for all summer sports. Why can't the cadets march on vacant fields at the sports complex.

Why spend so much money on plans for the theatre centre on Dunlop to change it to downtown. Traffic in this downtown area is already bad. Bringing in more people with these ugly high rises and then adding sports teams seems ridiculous planning. Having the bay cats play at queens park you'd need to build a wall for security reasons, correct? Which would take away from the openness of the park. There isn't much green space currently. Why take it away. You'd also have to deal with parking and there really isn't a lot of on street parking or people will try to park at Victoria village. Maybe do something about the people who do drugs in the park first

Will not spend any time downtown [.....] Feel very unsafe. Would like to see the city spend less money on "revitalization" of downtown and lakefront and focus on cleaning up the real problem. [.....]. Also dismantle and remove encampments. As a long time tax payer, I do not support allowing this situation to continue. The city is not addressing this glaring problem. That is why people do not frequent our downtown. I am extremely disappointed city council sneakily passed the parade grounds without public input. Disgraceful! Recommendation #1 – Move the Sea Cadets to the General John Hayter Southshore Community Centre
