Canadian Sporting Arms and Ammunition Association (CSAAA) -- Hunting and Sport Shooting

- Parliamentary Press Gallery Report (2019):
 - Canadians spent **\$8.5 billion** on hunting and sport shooting
 - Hunting and sport shooting contributed \$5.9 billion to Canada's GDP
 - Hunting and sport shooting accounted for 48,000 full-time equivalent jobs in Canada, resulting in \$6.4 billion in labour income

The Conference Board of Canada (2018) -- Sport Shooting

- Sport shooting is growing in popularity
- An estimated **1.4 million Canadians** participate in shooting sports
- \$2.6 billion spent on sport shooting



Canadian Commissioner of Firearms report for 2018 --Positive Trends (2015-2018)

- When the Trudeau government was elected in 2015, the registered restricted & prohibited firearm count was **978,347**.
- At the end of 2018, the number of registered firearms was **1.16 million --19% increase. Decrease in Prohibited by 1.78%**

- Biggest change is in the number of registered restricted firearms which went from **384,888 in 2004 to 795,854** in 2015, then a increase to **983,792** in 2018.
- That is a **23% increase** in three years.

Why the growing popularity?

Firearms advocate Tony Bernardo, executive director of the Canadian Shooting Sports Association:

- predicts the **number** of restricted firearms will **continue to rise**
- rise in gun ownership is in part a result of the growing popularity of target shooting
