## forward

This document was produced by concerned Kingswood residents wanting to voice our opinions on the fate of our beach in the face of challenges it has faced recently, and how best to coordinate the city's efforts to prevent ongoing damage while considering the overwhelming desire of residents to retain the sandy beach that has been the most cherished feature of the area and the reason they moved here.

Though a number of residents have been more closely involved with this developing situation for years, most only became aware of the plans to remove the beach very recently. This document is a reflection of a grass roots effort that began Friday, April 2 with the creation of a facebook page, @saveourwilkinssand, a door-to-door flyer drop over Easter weekend and collection of "deputations" into this document on Tuesday April 6 for delivery to the City April 7. At its onset the authors were unaware of any formal groups with similar goals, though we've become aware of some coordinated efforts with complimentary goals to ours that will join together in the near future.

This document is a collection of comments and letters collected to be presented to City Council on April 12. Though many are accompanied by "Deputation Forms" we aren't clear on what those are so we ask the City's patience with our ignorance of procedure and that you take this as an effort to illustrate to you the overwhelmingly positive sentiment for the preservation of our sandy beach in concert with remediation efforts the City proposes.

## history

This history is written by Linda Campbell, an original resident of Capp's Drive.

Mayor Lehman, City of Barrie Council and Barrie City staff...

I find the staff report almost too extensive and detailed for a layperson to fully understand. My hope is that you hear the history of our community and allow us to be part of the solutions. As Mike McCann said on CTV news, "I need to know how we got here, why we got here to determine those facts so we never get here again."

Let me share a brief history of our community. The community adopted the trails, parks and beach in 2003 for 3 years. We cleaned and maintained this area with the amazing support of Mona Boyd. We came together and celebrated our community by putting our hands to work. Significant relationships developed during our involvement. We came together for our neighbours through cancer diagnosis, the loss of a loved one, fundraisers, pot-lucks in the park and activities our children created and implemented. For instance, making bio degradable Christmas decorations for the park followed by an evening of Christmas caroling. This community said good bye to neighbours but welcomed the new ones. We watched out for one another and always offered support and a helping hand. That's the definition of community.

## history

In the past, our community experienced large teen parties on the beach. In response, Mayor Hamilton orchestrated community meetings at the South Shore Centre with Barrie Staff and Police representatives. Wilkins beach was defined by City Parks Department as a "Community Beach", meaning people who use the beach would primarily live within walking distance as there were no washroom facilities or parking. This was consistent and constant until 2016.

The Fall of 2015, several neighbours met with Mike McCann, Ward 10 Councilor, to discuss the issues of parking once Capps Dr. would be joined via the development of Mr. Fein's property. Mr. McCann offered to complete a survey asking neighbours south of Capps Drive what changes they would like to see. He reported back indicating no one was interested in changing the current parking status. Note: In the summer of 2020 a request was made to see copies of this survey. We have not received a copy of the analysis.

By the summer of 2016 the community experienced an increase of all day visitors on weekends. At the end of the day the visitors left their garbage on the beach, parks and our properties. (Examples of items; dirty diapers, toddler / children's soiled underwear, beer cans and wine bottles, paper plates and food items.) Parking issues began to become problematic. Parking in "no parking" zones and very close to the end of driveways make it challenging to exit your driveway. We discussed these issues with Mr. McCann and he told us to take pictures and call the by-law office. The community did exactly that. Each year we witnessed an increase in people visiting the beach on weekends. There was a difference though. People arrived at 11:00 am and remained until 8:00 pm. They dumped charcoal from their BBQ in the creek, wooded area or the lake, washed soiled clothing and washed dishes in the creek. The visitors left behind garbage that animals dispersed into the forest by the next day. Yes, the community went into the bush and gathered garbage then paid for garbage tags to get rid of it.

From 2016 to 2019 we continued to call by-law and update Mike McCann. During the summer of 2019, Mike McCann was contacted frequently asking for help. The number of people attending Wilkins Beach on weekends had become overwhelming. The issues surpassed the previous years. The trend was not only environmentally concerning, but the safety of the roadways surrounding the beach and walking trails had become problematic as well.

On October 4, 2019 several people attended a meeting with Mike McCann. The following issues were discussed and the points mentioned are excerpted from a letter sent to Mayor Lehman and Cc to Mike McCann on Oct 9, 2019

**Peopled parked cars at Wilkins Beach in a no parking zone**. Emergency vehicles have to park in the middle of the road to respond to emergency calls. Parking in Valley View Court due to nowhere to park at Wilkins Beach.

**People were coming in large groups**, setting up large tent shelters on the beach and Upper Park. They arrived with coolers, BBQs (charcoal or propane), and stayed for the entire day into early evening.

**People changed clothing in the woods**, used the woods for defecating / voiding, left their sanitary napkins and tampons in the woods as well as children's' underwear filled with feces.

**People discarded dirty diapers on our lawns**, park, garbage cans, woods. They threw their charcoal into our wooded area or dumped it on the sandy beach. Sometimes garbage was picked up but often our community was required to clean it up. If they left food animals foraged for it from open garbage cans on the beach. We find broken beer bottles on the beach, wooded area and upper park. People that parked in Valley View Court returned to their cars via the back path and disposed of their garbage along the way.

**People smoking** cigarettes and pot was a regular occurance.

**By-law officers ticketed cars parked illegally but didn't penalize other violations**. Once a car had a ticket it remained in the illegal spot causing issues for emergency vehicles. The penalty was a small price to pay for a day of fun at the expense of our community.

People caused environmental damage to the grass, beach area and walking trails.

It's unlikely that these people purchased anything in Barrie. They came with all their plastic, food, drink, diapers and bodily waste, then left it all for us to clean up actually costing the City of Barrie and our community a significant amount of money, time and frustration.

## Community Suggestions offered during the meeting with Mike McCann on Oct 4, 2019

**Extend parking regulations** to include Crimson Ridge to Royal Park, all of Valley View Court, all of Blue Water, Royal Park to Tamarac, Capps Drive, with Barrie Resident Parking Permit only signs.

Increase the parking violation fines in these areas significantly and tow vehicles in no parking zones.

**Provide residents with two additional parking passes** per household to allow visitors to park without being fined.

**Increase the number of by-law officers** that will not only give warnings, but will fine people for violations. Smoking on the beach, drinking on the beach, dogs off leash, barbecuing, large tents erected and parking illegally should all be penalised.

### Take Wilkins Beach off the City of Barrie website.

Dock Road Beach, Tollendale Park and the Gables are not currently on the website. Dock road has a parking lot and port-a-pot on site. Tollendale Park is identical to our beach area with water access but no parking or washrooms. They have been spared the grief we have experienced. Gables has parking but they remain off the website. Mr. McCann has not been able to clarify why these other beaches are not highlighted on the city website as Wilkins Beach has. We don't wish this on any other community but would like an explanation for this decision.

**Changing the name** or removing the word "beach" from the sign and Barrie City website.

### A few notable responses from Mr. McCann...

Request for additional city support staff (by-law or garbage clean up) would increase our taxes.

Wilkins Beach could not be taken off the city website because they test the water.

Our community needs to start calling Service Barrie if we have parking violations or to address other by-law issues. Mr. McCann shared the phone number to Service Barrie for the first time in 4 years. He indicated that we needed to call this number with all and any issues to demonstrate the need for more service in our community.

If you would like a copy of the meeting minutes from October 4, 2019, we had a stenographer attend to document the discussion and responses from Mr. McCann.

## Following this meeting nothing further happened regarding the above issues.

Fast forward to spring 2020. Mike McCann was contacted frequently by the community in the spring of 2020. With Covid 19 social distancing protocol in place significantly more people came to the beach all day, every day. Mike didn't provide any solutions to the issues we experienced daily. In mid June 2020, I spoke to Mayor Lehman on the phone for 20 minutes. He told me that he would call me back by the end of the day. Mayor Lehman indicated that Andrea Miller would be dealing with the issues and would contact me the following day. Within 3 days Andrea met with the community and listened to our problems. Many community residents were disappointed that Mike McCann did not attend. Shortly after the meeting I discovered Wilkins Beach being promoted on the Tourism Barrie website.

I sent this information to Andrea and in less than an hour she replied Wilkins Beach was removed from the website. Later that day Mayor Lehman made a post on social medial regarding this incident. Our community discovered that Mike McCann is the city's representative on the Board of Tourism Barrie and Wilkins beach had been promoted on their website for years.

During the summer of 2020 Barrie City Hall responded to the exact same issues the community identified to Mike McCann in the summer of 2019. It took Covid 19, additional people abusing the beach and trails and CTV News to get the support we had been asking Mr. McCann for for many years.



## going forward

Wilkins beach is now before council to determine if it stays sandy or rocky. (The following are Linda's suggestions and not the consensus of any committee or group of community members overall.)

I support the closure of the beach for 2021 to replant necessary vegetation to help stabilize the creek embankment and not allow people to have access to this area.

I feel the staff report didn't explore less intensive changes to the beach. Why can't we explore less invasive solutions and engage the community to help support remediation. Are boulders and cobble the only answer?

### Suggestions:

A small area of access to the water remain open for the summer 2021 to allow people to enter the water to swim, kayak or paddle board.

**Fix the forest at the bottom of the stairs** and the path off Capps Drive that has drained directly into Kempenfelt Bay since the start.

Enforce by-laws immediately - no warnings.

**Establish tow zone for parking in no parking zone** and significantly increase parking fines on roads near all entrances of the trails and beach.

**Appoint one or two community representatives** to attend meetings so the community at large takes on ownership of park and beach care through a collaborative approach.

Appoint a Barrie City Council member that will not promote Wilkins Beach on the Tourism Barrie website.

Let's give the beach a chance to heal and re-evaluate in a year. Establish goals for the recovery of the beach and evaluate the healing process' progress on an ongoing basis.

Surely the irreversible, man-made installation of boulders and cobble isn't the only solution available to us.

## by Linda Campbell

We have been protecting the beach, creek and trails for years with our hands and voices. This community is strongly invested in the future of the beach and walking trails. We have addressed our concerns to the wrong person for years, but we've learned where to go when we need issues heard and resolved.



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I am a local resident on Sumac St and Royal Park for 20+ years, born and raised in Barrie for 43 years I will never leave and I choose to raise my family in this area because of the trails and beach. This beach was a hidden gem, not known by anyone outside of the area. The community going back 20 years would gather to clean it up and cut fallen trees to keep it accessible for our families. My children grew up swimming on summer nights at that beach and playing in the creek with paper boats. Families would walk with towels and floaties at night down to the beach for a nice swim, no one knew it was there and it can be that way again. When the notice arrived at the door my 16 & 17 year old daughters were most upset and shared on social media to gain support. This area is special to our families and our children and should be saved for future generations. I write further to this outstanding motion. I am a homeowner and business owner in the area, having lived on Bluewater Trail for over 20 years. I've seen this area develop from some bush paths surrounded by builders lots to the current well-maintained combination of parks, trails and beachhead. It is enjoyed by the residents of the area, who see it as a definite feature and boon to the neighborhood.

I reviewed staff report DEV008-21 with some concern and surprise, given the speed with which this somewhat drastic action is not only been proposed, but is intended to go forward.

The provision of only 3 options; do nothing; permanently close the shoreline to public; or drastically alter the shoreline, gives the impression of a lack of creativity and the failure to: a) fully consider the entire situation, b) include any residents' input or wishes, both those in the immediate area and those within the greater Barrie area.

While there was consultation last summer, it was very generalized and did not focus any discussion on the possible options and actions proposed for this area. Residents were certainly not asked or consulted about a possible move to completely alter and redefine the waterfront area.

The report states:

"The increasing use of the beach in Wilkins Park, which occurred especially during the summer of 2020, has affected the environmental integrity of the area."

This is a conclusion without any data, reports, or other objective evidence that this in fact occurred. The beach has been regularly used for decades and endured weather-related washouts and changes throughout that time. To lay the blame for "affected environmental integrity" upon a few weekends of overuse, without actual environmental study or data seems ludicrous.

The feared or predicted "continued overuse of the shoreline area" can be prevented a number of ways including the proposed delisting of the beach, closure of the waterfront area for the next year perhaps, to allow natural regeneration to occur.

Rather than attempt to let nature take its course and take active steps to prevent overuse, motion proposes a complete overhaul and destruction of the current sandy beach in order to replace it with cobbles and boulders, in a very unnatural way, in the hope of deterring residents from using it as a beach.

I suggest to council that some time and effort be directed to at least researching and considering options other than the 3 proposed, to look for a solution that provides similar benefit or result, without the necessity of terraforming an entire beach.

Removal of the sand at the beach is not acceptable. Will our taxes be reduced now that the sandy beach is removed?

We find it absurd that the restoration of the area would translate into having to remove the sand from the beach. It is an area that so many local families enjoy.

People are experiencing frustration, depression and hard times right now and this is just making it worse. It is beyond our comprehension why the City would want to remove something that actually brings positivity to people lives.

We have personally observed City By-Law Officers patrol the area, but be reluctant to enforce legislation to protect the land and local residents from mischief, pollution, and public health restrictions due to COVID-19. The removal of a local public beach should not be based on the lack of legislative enforcement.

There surely must be other options to help protect the area, rather than removal. Why not install barricades temporarily during COVID? Close the beach for a year or two as required to stave off the crowds.

Or keep the beach open but actually enforce no parking and ticketing legislation that has not been adequately enforced. Have more bylaw officers present in the area to enforce these laws.

To permanently revise the landscape so no sand remains will cause more harm than good. Frankly, it seems like the City is seeking a permanent solution to a temporary problem, which is never an excuse and may led to further mental health issues for local residences.

When my wife and I learned about what the city wanted to do we were very upset. We moved to this area instead of springwater because of the beach for us and our kids and we were ok with paying the double property tax of the springwater property we were considering for the proximity and use of the beach and the excellent local school. We use the beach extensively with our 3 kids through the summer months. We love coming home after work and going for a dip or waking up on the weekend and heading down for a few hours of sun and relaxation and we thought that paying higher property taxes was fine because of the nice proximity to the beach and excellent school. Otherwise we would have spent our money in Springwater and installed a pool but seeing as my wife and I are from Barrie we wanted to continue to support the Barrie community and lifestyle we both grew up with and loved so much. We were looking forward to our kids growing up with these experiences and are disappointed that due to the city not handling this situation quickly it has gotten out of hand and now the solution they have come up with is that nobody gets to enjoy the beach? Does this mean then that they are going to flat tax property taxes in Barrie then and we won't have to pay higher to live close to the water? If I can't enjoy the beach then why should I pay more tax than my parents house which is the same size as mine and they live in the Ferndale/Essa area.

My solution for this is that they should close the beach this year to restore it and once every 5 years to keep it from becoming run down. This will also show people coming to the beach that it's no longer a destination they can come to. After the year of restoration I would have bylaw officers going to these small beaches in Barrie to check and see if they are residents from the area and if they are not residents then they should be asked to leave. These gems should be for residents of Barrie only. Beaches in Tiny township, Midland and surrounding area only allowed local residents to visit the local beaches and you were asked to leave if you weren't from the area. We tried in previous years to visit beaches in these areas on camping trips and were asked to leave if we were not residents. Our children have access to a great school, we have amazing neighbours, and moreover an unparalleled sense of community. As I work most weekends, our time


outside of our neighbourhood is limited to camping trips and socially distanced visits with relatives. One of the greatest privileges is going to the beach after work on weekdays.


Thank you for taking the charge on this fight! I am behind all you the way. I don't want the City to change Wilkins Beach in any way.

Mayor Lehman and Barrie City Councilors

I find the staff report rather hard to swallow and ask that you hear the history of our community and allow the community to be part of the solutions.

I would like to Quote Ward 10 Councilor, Mike McCann on CTV News, "I need to know how we got here, why we got here to determine those facts so we never get here again."

Let me share a brief history of our community. The community adopted the trails, parks and beach in 2003 for 3 years. We cleaned and maintained this area with the amazing support of Mona Boyd. We came together and celebrated our community by putting our hands to work. Significant relationships developed during our involvement. We came together for our neighbours through cancer diagnosis, the loss of a partner, fundraiser, pot-luck in the park and activities our children created and implement, for instance making bio degradable Christmas decorations for the park followed by an evening of Christmas carolling. This community said good bye to neighbours but welcomed the new ones. We watched out for one another and always offered support and a helping hand. That's the definition of community.

In the past when our community experienced large teen parties on the beach, Mayor Hamilton orchestrated community meetings at the South Shore Centre with Barrie Staff and Police representatives. Wilkins beach was defined by City Parks Department as a "Community Beach" meaning people would be within walking distance as there were no washroom facilities or parking. This was consistent and constant until 2016.

The Fall of 2015, several neighbours met with Mike McCann to discuss the issues of parking once Capps Dr. would be joined via the development of Mr. Fein's property. Mike McCann offered to complete a survey asking neighbours south of Capps Drive what changes they would like to see. He reported back indicating not one was interested in changing the current parking

status. Note: a request was made to see copies of this survey in the summer of 2020 and have not received a copy of the analysis.

By the summer of 2016 the community experienced an increase of all day visitors on weekends. At the end of the day the visitors left their garbage on the beach, parks and our properties. Examples of items; dirty diapers, toddler / children's soiled underwear, beer cans and wine bottles, paper plates and food items. Parking issues began to become problematic, parking in no parking zone and very close to the end of driveways making it challenging to exit your driveway. We discussed these issues with Mike and he told us to take pictures and call by-law office. The community did exactly that. Each year we witnessed an increase of people visiting the beach on weekends. There was a difference though. People arrived at 11:00 am and remained until 8:00 pm. They dumped charcoal from their BBQ in the creek, wooded area or the lake. Washing soiled clothing, dishes in the creek was witnessed frequently. The visitors left behind garbage that by the next day the animals dispersed in the forest. Yes, the community went into the bush and gathered garbage then paid for garbage tags to get rid of it.

From 2016 to 2019 we continued to call by-law and update Mike McCann. During the summer of 2019, Mike Mc Cann was contacted frequently asking for help. The number of people attending Wilkins beach on weekends had become overwhelming. The issues surpassed the previous years and the trend was environmentally concerning let alone the safety of the roadways surrounding the beach and walking trails.

### On October 4, 2019 several people attended a meeting with Mike McCann.

The following issues were discussed and the points mentioned are cut from a letter sent to Mayor Lehman and Cc to Mike McCann on Oct 9, 2019

- Parking violations- Parking at Wilkins Beach in a no parking zone. Emergency vehicles have to park in the middle of the road to respond to emergency calls (picture attached). Parking in Valley View Court due to nowhere to park at Wilkins Beach.
- People are coming in large groups, setting up large tent shelters on the beach and Upper Park. They arrive with several coolers, BBQ (charcoal or propane), and staying for the entire day into early evening.
- They are changing clothing in the woods, using the woods for defecating / voiding, leaving their sanitary napkins and tampons in the woods, children's' underwear filled with feces.
- At the end of their lovely day at the beach they discard dirty diapers on our lawns, park, garbage cans, woods. Throwing their charcoal into our wooded area or dump it on the sandy beach. The garbage sometimes is picked up but often our community is required to clean it up. If they leave food by the next days the animals have gone into the open barrel garbage can on the beach. Yes, we find broken beer bottles on the beach, wooded area and upper park. Please note, people that park up in Valley View Court walk the back path and dispose of their garbage on the walk to their car.
- Smoking of cigarettes and Pot is frequently happening and is very frustrating.

- By-law officers will ticket cars parked illegally but do no other violations. Once a car has
  a ticket it remains in the illegal spot causing issues for emergency vehicles and is a very
  cheap day of fun at the expense of our community.
- Environmental damage to the grass and beach area and walking trails
- These people are likely not purchasing one single item in Barrie and come with all their plastic, food, drink, diapers and bodily waste and leave all of it here for us to clean up. Actually, it is costing the City of Barrie and our community a significant amount of money, time and frustration.

### Community Suggestions offered during the meeting with Mike McCann on Oct 4, 2019

- Parking: extend parking regulations to include Crimson Ridge to Royal Park, all of Valley View Court, all of Blue Water, Royal Park to Tamarac, Capps Drive, with Barrie Resident Parking Permit only signs.
- Increase the parking violation fine in these areas significantly and tow vehicles in no parking zones
- Provide residence with two additional parking passes per household to allow visitors to park without being fined.
- More by-law officers that will not give warnings BUT rather fine people for violations. Smoking on the beach, drinking on the beach, dogs off leash, barbequing, large tents erected and parking illegally.
- Take Wilkins Beach off the City of Barrie website. Note: Dock road beach, Tollendale Park and the Gables are not currently on the website. Dock road has a parking lot and port-a-pot on site. Tollendale Park is identical to our beach area with assess to the water with no parking or washrooms but they have been spared the grief we are experiencing. Gables has parking but they remain off the website. Mike has not been able to clarify why these other beaches are not highlighted on the city website in the same manner as Wilkins Beach. We don't wish this on any other community but would like an explanation for this decision.
- Changing the name or removing the word beach from the sign and Barrie City website.

A few notable responses from Mike McCann,

- Request for additional city support staff (by-law or garbage clean up) would increase our taxes
- Wilkins beach could not be taken of the city website because they test the water.
- Our community needs to start calling Service Barrie if we have parking violations or to address other by-law issue. Mike shared the phone number to Service Barrie for thefirst time in 4 years
- He indicated that we needed to call this number with all and any issues to demonstrate the need and necessity for more service in our community.

Following this meeting nothing further happened regarding the above issues.

If you would like a copy of the meeting minutes from October 4, 2019, we had a stenographer attend to document the discussion and response from Ward 10 Councilor.

### Fast forward to spring 2020.

Mike McCann was contacted frequently by the community in the spring of 2020. With Covid 19 social distancing protocol in place and significant increase of people coming to the beach all day, every day. Mike was not able to provide any change or results for the issues we experienced daily. In mid June 2020, I spoke to Mayor Lehman on the phone for 20 minutes and he told me that he would call me back by the end of the day. Mayor Lehman indicated that Andrea Miller would be dealing with the issues and she would contact me the following day. Within 3 days Andrea was meeting with the community and heard many issues. Many community residents were disappointed that Mike McCann did not attend. Shortly after the meeting I discovered Wilkins beach being promoted on Tourism Barrie. I sent this information to Andrea and in less than an hour she replied Wilkins beach was removed from there website. Later that day Mayor Lehman made a post on social medial regarding this incident. Our community discovered that Mike McCann is the cities representative on the Board of Tourism Barrie and Wilkins beach had been promoted for years on this website.

During the summer of 2020 Barrie City Hall responded to the exact same issues the community identified to Mike McCann in the summer of 2019. It took Covid 19, additional people abusing the beach and trails and CTV News to get the support we had been identifying to Mike McCann for many years.

Did I answer Mike's need to know how we got here, why we got here to determine those facts so we never get here again.

Now Wilkins beach is before Council to determine if we stay sandy or rocky.

- I support the closure of the beach for 2021 to replant necessary vegetation to help stabilize the creek embankment and not allow people to have access to this area.
- I feel the staff report has no flexibility to explore less invasive changes to the beach. Why can't we explore less invasive most affective and engage the community to help support restoration. Does the current status of the beach have only one solution ROCKs?

### Suggestions;

- A small area of access to the water remain open summer 2021 to allow for people to enter the water to swim, kayak or paddle board.
- Fix the forest at the bottom of the stairs and path at Capps drive access that has been draining directly into Kempenfelt Bay since conception.
- · Enforcement of by-laws immediately no warnings.
- Establish tow zone for parking in no parking zone and significantly increase parking fines on roads near all entrances of the trails and beach.

- Have a partnership with the community and appoint a community representative to attend meetings and have a collaborative relationship and ownership with the community.
- Appoint a Barrie City Council member that will not promote Wilkins beach on the Tourism Barrie website.
- Let's give the beach a chance to heal and re-evaluate in a year. Establish levels of recovery for the beach and evaluate the healing process. Is the Rock Plan the only PLAN?

We have been protecting the beach, creek and trails for years with our hand and voices and this community is strongly invested in the future of the beach and walking trails. We have been screaming to the wrong person for years but now understand where to go when we need issues heard and resolved.

Thank you, Linda Campbell We understand that Wilkins beach must be repaired for the environmental damage done by large crowds last summer. Please do NOT close the beach by installing cobble, boulders and bushes .As local tax payers we enjoy riding our bikes for a dip on a hot summer day. There must be a better solution. Do not advertise it as BEACH to out of towners. Instead of investing in boulders and rocks use the money to pay someone to enforce the rules at the shore on hot days. For years there have been signs that dogs are not allowed but many dog owners continue to walk their pets there without enforcement.

Dear Mayor Lehman and Barrie City Councilors,

I am writing in opposition to the recommended motion that was passed by General Committee on March 29 regarding shoreline issues at Wilkins Park. Specifically, I am opposed to the significant nature of the restoration work proposed, which will permanently change the composition and experience of Wilkins Beach.

Wilkins Beach is a beloved part of the culture and community of the Kingswood neighbourhood. People and families of all ages make memories there. It is a key reason why people want to live in our neighbourhood. To close and permanently change the beach would have a huge impact on our community.

**Proposed alternative:** Implement a series of less severe measures designed to discourage heavy beach usage by non-Barrie residents, while also preserving the ecosystem. Test effectiveness of approach post 2021 season to determine whether additional measures need to be taken.

- Maintain the sand beach area for use of local Barrie residents
- Continue to maintain beach area, including sand, swim buoys and especially garbage pickup
- Fix the drainage issues from the reservoir on Crimson Ridge and ditch at the bottom of Crimson Ridge that cause the washout/flooding in spring when there are heavy rains
- Fence the creek / river line from the bridge to the water line, blocking the peninsula
- Implement a signage program, similar to 2020, enforcing rules and regulations within the Wilkins Beach / Wilkins Park areas
- Enforce a no warning system for bi-law infringements
- Increase fines for cars parked on streets near beach access, possible tow zone
- Remove any specific reference to Wilkins Beach from the list of City Beaches and all corporate communications channels, social media, mapping, and materials
- Implement an educational signage program promoting the ecosystem, why it's important to processe and how to processe it

it's important to preserve and now to preserve it

Until 2020, Wilkins Beach was a hidden gem. Barrie residents came to the beach for an hour or two max, and for the most part treated it with respect. The 2020 season changed everything. Out of towners came in record numbers and abused the beach. There's no question that damage was done, which is why our neighourhood came together to raise awareness and work with council to implement solutions to limit the traffic. Once those solutions were in place, the traffic decreased. My proposed solution today is for council to meet us halfway – to implement measures that will mitigate environmental degradation and deter out of town traffic, while keeping the beach open to Barrie residents to use with respect. If we can do that, there is an entire community behind you who is willing to help protect the beach. 2020 was a year like no other, and it would be devastating to lose Wilkins Beach as a result of it.

I live on and just received your flyer.

I was very disappointed when I saw and read in the news about Council's "solution" to the problem that we had at Wilkin's Beach last summer. Wilkin's Beach has long been used respectfully by local residents as a quiet, out of the way beach at the end of a lovely trail through a ravine. The overcrowding and destruction that occurred there last summer was directly related to the pandemic and the advertisement of "our little gem" in Tourism Barrie. It's lovely to see the families with their young children enjoying an afternoon at the beach, having a sandy spot to play and rest. Dear Mayor Lehman and Barrie City Councilors,

I am writing in opposition to the recommended motion that was passed by General Committee on March 29 regarding shoreline issues at Wilkins Park. Specifically, I am opposed to the significant nature of the restoration work proposed, which will permanently change the composition and experience of Wilkins Beach.

Wilkins Beach is a beloved part of the culture and community in the Kingswood neighbourhood and City of Barrie. People and families of all ages make memories there. It is a key reason why people want to live in our neighbourhood. To close and permanently change the beach would have a huge impact on our community.

Proposed alternative: Implement a series of less severe measures designed to discourage heavy beach usage by non-Barrie residents, while also preserving the ecosystem. Test effectiveness of approach post 2021 season to determine whether additional measures need to be taken.

- Maintain the sand beach area for use of local Barrie residents
- Continue to maintain beach area, including sand, swim buoys and especially garbage pickup
- Fix the drainage issues from the reservoir on Crimson Ridge and ditch at the bottom of Crimson Ridge that cause the washout / flooding in spring when there are heavy rains
- Fence the creek / river line from the bridge to the water line, blocking the peninsula
- Implement a signage program, similar to 2020, enforcing rules and regulations within the Wilkins Beach / Wilkins Park areas
- Enforce a no warning system for bi-law infringements
- Increase fines for cars parked on streets near beach access, possible tow zone
- Remove any specific reference to Wilkins Beach from the list of City Beaches and all corporate communications channels, social media, mapping, and materials
- Implement an educational signage program promoting the ecosystem, why it's important to
  preserve and how to preserve it

Until 2020, Wilkins Beach was a hidden gem. Barrie residents came to the beach for an hour or two max, and for the most part treated it with respect. The 2020 season changed everything. Out of towners came in record numbers and abused the beach. There's no question that damage was done, which is why our neighourhood came together to raise awareness and work with council to implement solutions to limit the traffic. Once those solutions were in place, the traffic decreased. Our proposed solution today is for council to meet us halfway – to implement measures that will mitigate environmental degradation and deter out of town traffic, while keeping the beach open to Barrie residents to use with respect. If we can do that, there is an entire community behind you who is willing to help protect the beach. 2020 was a year like no other, and it would be devastating to lose Wilkins Beach as a result of it.
